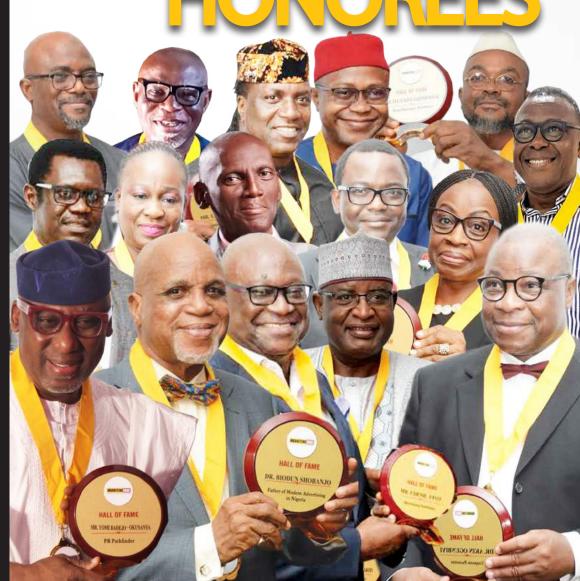

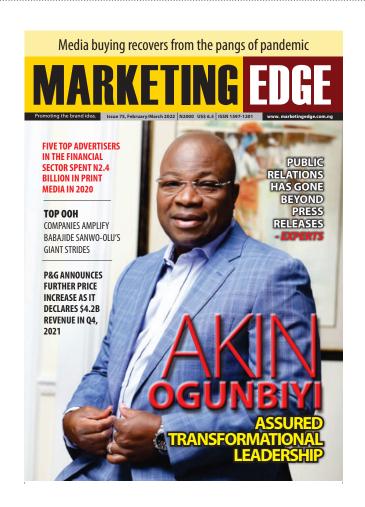

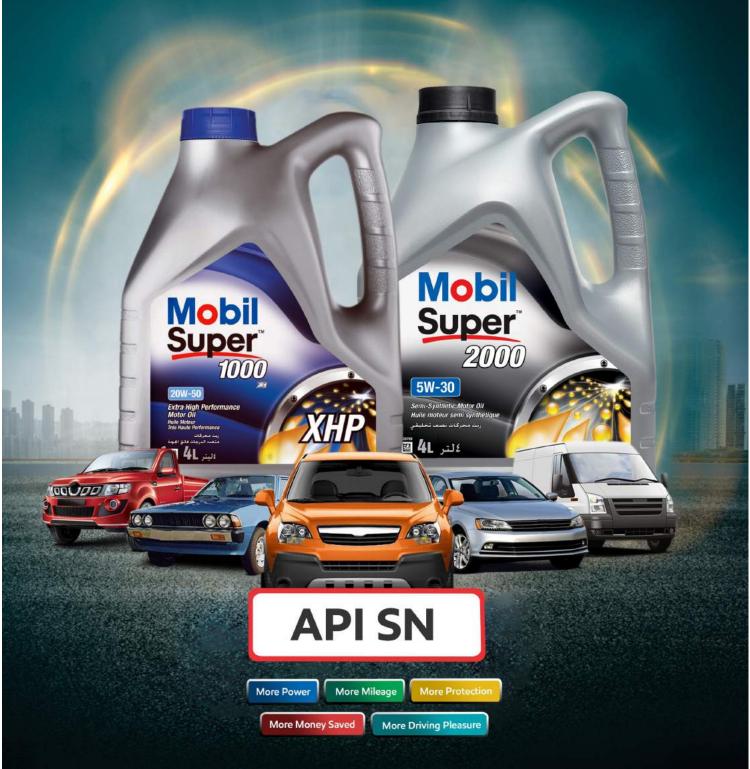

The media guru is confident that 2022 will be better than 2021 for the IMC industry as there is hope to develop local expertise amid the weak naira challenge the country is facing now.

"With regard to the challenges for 2022, we will still have to pay attention to government policies regarding trade, manufacturing, media and other key areas.

We will have to watch the economy with regard to inflation, interest rates, and exchange rates," he said.

"For instance, a weak Naira makes it more costly to pay for international collaboration in content production. But that may also be an opportunity to develop local expertise in certain areas. Altogether, when we compute the hopes against the fears, it looks like 2022 will be better than 2021 for our industry," he noted.

edia planning and buying expert Rotimi Bankole, CEO, SBI Media, the foremost Next-Gen media planning, branding & digital marketing agency, has reaffirmed the role of marketing and advertising as contributors to the creative economy.

The media expert said this in an exclusive interview with MARKETING EDGE magazine, while noting the positive role of the integrated marketing communication (IMC) in the national gross product (GDP) in 2022.

His words: "Aside from being a core element of business, advertising and marketing are also key contributors to the creative economy. The contributions made by the marketing communications industry will be seen in all areas of business, from manufacturing to healthcare, from transportation to hospitality, from fintech to agriculture, and, of course, media and the creative economy."

Speaking on the challenges advertisers face, Mr. Bankole said when other sectors of the economy are down, it affects the marketing communications businesses a great deal. He is, however, optimistic that 2022 being an election campaign year and with the ease in travel restrictions, business will return to normal.

"The challenges faced by these industries are usually felt, sometimes extremely intensely, in the marketing communications business. Therefore, 2022 being an election campaign year, the sector will become quite busy with increased political advertising, public relations, and media buying.

"Also, the world is gradually easing COVID restrictions and we hope that this will result in increased cross-border business activities across industries, which

Poor technology investment, bane of effective media strategy

The Nworah, Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer of Anambra Broadcasting Service, has noted that poor investment in technology and manpower by brands and agencies are the bane of effective advertising strategies. He, therefore, urged them to adopt a technology or social media strategy that will harness and pivot their business accurately and professionally.

"We set the trends, we should also monitor and follow the trends. With content consumption and distribution trends shifting speedily, brands and advertisers who have not really migrated online should start thinking about that. The challenge we have in Nigeria is that brands are not investing enough in technology because it costs a lot of money," he said.

The brand and marketing expert also noted that winning companies are investing in technology, while advising every brand and agency to operate on a digital-first philosophy or mantra, with cutting-edge technology to strengthen their positioning and prepare for the new era.

Reviewing 2021 adspend, the advertising expert stated that there has been a tremendous shift, propelled by huge audience in digital penetration.



"I may not have figures for you but I can say we are beginning to see yearly that advertisers are migrating more online, though radio is still strong; but based on the trends we are seeing, television is not doing too well and that is for obvious reasons because we live in an internet age," Chief Nworah said.

Commenting on the pre-election year and its impact on advertising spend, Chief Nworah predicted that participation by media houses might be a little bit challenging.

"This has been happening; in an electioneering year, we see some of the FMCGs and financial clients take back seats to allow the politicians take over the space. This year and 2023 will be a little bit difficult for media houses, but that is what is already happening."

Digitisation heralds shift in consumer lifestyle - Experts

comprehensive consumer data analysis across all touchpoints is vital to the success of marketing efforts. It is imperative for brand owners and marketers to understand their target audience by analysing, and keeping track of consumer behavior as it is critical for the success of businesses. Experts in the **Integrated Communications Industry** have re-emphasised the need for brand managers to follow consumers along their journey to decipher habits, behaviours and most importantly acquaint themselves with valuable information through an understanding of the footprints of the consumer in his journey.

According to them, digitisation has led to a paradigm change in consumer behaviour and brands must be where their consumers are, be abreast with the changes in terms of preference, passion points, purchasing habits, and use of technology to create memorable strategies required for the attainment of marketing objectives.

Founder of O2 Academic, Ozoemena Mbanefo, said for brands to deliver value and get a return on investment, they must understand the psychological status of their target audience as well as the changing patterns necessitated by technology and the evolving economic

landscape.

He said: "Brands should understand the consumer's motivation, likes, and dislikes, the things that make them be. The more you appeal to them from the motivation point, the more you will get their attention and when you get their attention, you can have their retention, and from their retention, you will have their conversion and when they are converted they can now be evangelists to help you bring some other people."

According to the renowned advertising expert and trainer, understanding a person's way of life, thinking pattern, and digital footprints will be a very good strategic road map to reaching him.

"There is something we call a day in the life of the consumer. We talk about a day in the life of a consumer. In analysing the consumer, we are talking about when he wakes up to the moment he goes to bed. What does he do, where does he go, what does he listen to, who does he interact with, how does he live his life?" he added

Similarly, Mobolaji Martins, Chief Operating Officer of Slice Media, affirmed that brand positioning in the digital age is attainable when brands evolve along with their consumers and that brands should continue to invest in consumer data to get insights into their changing behaviours.

"It has always been a scenario where you evolve along with your consumers. We just had a conversation where we spoke about what brand positioning should look like in the digital age. For me, the issues have always been around like not understanding who your consumer is or where your consumers are, or what lifestyle habits they have changed. As long as you are a brand owner, there has to be a real investment in understanding where your consumers are, who they are, and what they are doing at this point."

According to the seasoned professional, without investment in consumer data, brands will not be able to keep up with their changing behavioural patterns.

Commenting on the rapidly evolving market realities, Strategy Lead, SPV Communication Solution, Sheriff Akinpelu asserted that understanding the consumer journey is critical to the success of any brand and should be taken into cognizance in every marketing effort. He advised that brands should be deliberate in acquiring the requisite knowledge about the daily activities of their consumers.

In his words: "What is very important for us is the way human beings behave. I think human behaviour is what we marketers need to focus on. What behaviour did we have before the pandemic? What behaviour do we currently have now? Are there any differences and how can we tap into the opportunities that abound in the new way that consumers are behaving? Therein lies the secret."

While re-echoing that the customer is always king, the communication experts urged marketers to put their eyes on the consumers at all times and deploy data to make a vivid and mental impact as top-of-the-mind awareness will facilitate increased patronage and brand loyalty.

Advertising has democratized, consumers now wield power - Experts

onsumer sovereignty has evolved beyond just the consumer buying power or their influence over the number of goods that are produced. Now, consumers also wield the power of communication which can make or mar a business.

Procter & Gamble Director, Scott D. Cook once said: "a brand is no longer what we tell consumers it is—it is what consumers tell each other it is."

This sovereign power has allowed consumers to be able to influence not only their own purchase decisions, but also the buying behavior of others.

"Brands do not have the autocratic power anymore. It's now communication for the people, by the people and for the people, just like you have it in government" said Ozone Mbanefo, CEO 02 Academy Lagos.

Describing how advertising used to be about brands speaking to the people and telling people what they want them to hear, Ozone noted that now, brands cannot decide what the consumers should think about their brands anymore.

Continuing he said: "Brands have been forced to speak to the people through the people, and that has changed the dynamics of communication. Consumers are now

producing communications by themselves and that's why somebody will just go on Instagram and film something about a brand that he feels very cool with and put it out there and people start sharing it and the brands get free media. And the same way it can happen on the negative side. You see something in a bottle of a Carbonated Soft Drink brand, and you say 'these people are poisoning us,' you put it out there, it goes viral. So, you can see that consumers are now producing communications by themselves."

Leveraging digital technology tools, consumers now set trends or hop on trends to promote their favourite brands, products, personalities, and celebrities by making viral pictures, videos, and retweeting posts that pique their interests; the same way others utilise such platforms when they feel a social responsibility to alert other consumers on certain errors of these popular brands. The communication chains therefore becomes strengthened.

In agreement, Dolapo Otegbayi, Specialised nutrition's director at Friesland Campina opined: "The challenge we have as marketeers is that we always try to listen to our own voices, if you are too close to what you do and you don't step back from time to time you might make mistakes. It is important for brands to drive that distinctiveness in the minds of consumers."

comprising £41.7 billion in cash and £8.3
billion in Unilever shares.

Disclosing that the company rejected all three proposals on the basis that they fundamentally undervalued the Consumer Healthcare business as well as its future

IMC experts express divergent views over 2023 elections

s the socio-political atmosphere becomes charged ahead of the 2023 general elections, experts in the IMC industry have expressed divergent views on what the election portends for the industry and how to align their expectations with the national exercise.

In separate exclusive interviews with MARKETING EDGE, the advertising experts advised agencies to become more relevant by jumping on the digital transformation bandwagon as well as shifting gears to innovative marketing. According to them, this will help agencies chart easier pathways during the election proper.

Projecting what the election heralds for the industry in 2023, ace advertiser and marketing professional, Babajide Fagade, Managing Director, Ocean Outdoor Ltd., noted that the influence of politics on the economy is very massive as it impacts on economic life of both individuals and businesses. He, therefore, urged IMC practitioners to make salient impact through innovation for the task ahead.

"In terms of outlook, it is a very hopeful one. We just have to keep innovating. We need to engage in the use of technology the most. We have a huge audience size in Nigeria because of the population of the country. So I believe that if IMC practitioners can continue to innovate and become more creative and then engage the use of technology; the industry will be better for it," he

"I think most of the consumers' touch points that will be used by candidates will have an exponential growth. We can't put our fingers on how our advertising platforms will be engaged by politicians in the coming elections. But, by and large, it will add

to what we have in the marketing space because brands are still active. It will be a bumper year," he added.

Steve Babaeko, President of Association of Advertising Agencies of Nigeria (AAAN), said Nigerian agencies are strategically positioned for relevance and in terms of ad growth. He revealed that there is a huge opportunity inbuilt in an election cycle, but expressed concern over the penchant for foreign agencies by Nigerian politicians.

He advised aspiring candidates to embrace Nigeria agencies for better storytelling and right delivery of content.

"Our politicians sort of have acquired this foreign taste when it comes to advertising. If you look at all of the memorable campaigns that in the annals of politicking and political campaign in Nigeria, some of the memorable ones were the ones created by local agencies like Rosable, the Insights of this world and all of those agencies.

"If you remember the "Hope 93, MKO Abiola, till tomorrow, that is a classic political advertising. It portrays the nuance and the cultural understanding of our people and how best to speak. I will still encourage the political class to patronise local agencies and we can keep the money in the family and build a better Nigeria," Mr. Babaeko said.

Israel Jaiye-Opayemi, Managing Director/Chief Strategist of Chain Reactions Nigeria, said that the year 2023 heralds a boom for the industry and urged members to be well positioned.

"It is going to be a better year and I will tell you why. There is going to be a swing in public sector spending and therefore, government at different levels, including state and federal governments will need to explain what they have been doing and the smart ones will engage the services of public relations firms to be able to get those messages out clearly, concisely and accurately. They will need the services of public relations firms.

"In the build up to the election itself, and for the election proper, I can also predict that more aspirants and candidates will engage the services of public relations firms to be able to help them in managing their campaigns. I see a good year for a lot of companies and public relations firms," Jaiye-Opayemi said.

Kayode Oluwasona, CEO of 1201 Brandsway Ltd, on his part, predicted that with the elections in view, the economy may be opened. He, however, advised agencies to tread with caution and not to be too hopeful.

"There are implications, it is expected that the government will inject funds into the economy. What has been tied up before will become a bit loose, more spending will be happening. Political spending is like a funeral, they come and go. Political spending in 2019 was not as much as it was in 2015.

"So possibly, we should not even put much hope in political spending because the threshold has been established. The days of those slogans and campaigns when they were new and captivating were fine," Oluwasona said.

Brands should be people centric, not customer centric - Ozone Mbanefo

EO O2 Academy, Ozone Mbanefo has reemphasised the need for brands to be more peoplecentric in their marketing strategies than customer- centric.

Reiterating this during the MARKETING EDGE Fireside Conversation themed "Marketing and brand positioning in a digital age", Ozone submitted that a people-centric brand will go beyond the transactional relationship to developing a more emotional involvement with their consumers, in order to build a lasting relationship with them even after a purchase has been made.

He said: "The customer is the person who pays for the product the consumer consumes. However, where there is no consumption, the customer has no reason to pay for your product. And this is where you realise the power of the consumers, and why brands need to be more people- centric."

According to the Provost of the leading brands and advertising school in Nigeria, people-centric marketing shouldn't just end in promotional materials, it should be consistent in the mind of the brand and the minds of the people interacting with the business.

Becoming people-centric requires that brands ditch the product-driven and sales-driven marketing strategy to become more consumer-centric in all their dealings, by focusing their marketing strategies on providing a positive personal experience for their consumers through getting to know them, understanding who they are, their buying behavior, carrying out researches on what they need, and also launching platforms that enable personalised interactions and feedbacks.

Ozone further emphasised that becoming people-centric will drive profit for the brand as it will enable them to gain a more competitive advantage over others, and as well enable a continuous cycle of engagement, consistent patronage, awareness, loyalty, and even emotional attachment from the consumer to the brand.

In his final submission, he buttressed the significant impact of "word of mouth" and how far it can go beyond creating the perfect ads, sharing that a true peoplecentric marketing strategy should start outside of a campaign and inside the business through feeding the consumers with the motivation and support they need by reminding them that there is a brand that cares for them and identifying their needs without simply relying on the products to tell the brand's stories.

"Design thinking is the best thing that can help a brand builder to navigate his consumers. You must understand the pain points and passion centers of your consumers," he concluded.

2023 elections: Rebranding is best PR for parties -Obinna Inogbo

s the upbeat to the 2023 general elections gathers momentum, Obinna Inogbo, Founder & Principal PR Executive of Worktainment Limited, has urged political parties to focus on efforts to rebrand themselves in line with the expectations of citizens ahead of the next election. He gave this advice against the backdrop of a perennial trust deficit between the electorates and the politicians.

The PR professional while recounting some of the errors in brand building initiatives of political parties in recent times advised that political parties

rather than try to sell their manifestos and persuade Nigerians to connect with their vision for the country, should build credibility by acknowledging their past failures in terms of delivering good leadership and dividend of democracy with a promise to do better.

"Be honest with the public. Say you have failed. Don't say anything that you've done, don't mention any project, and present younger faces, not the old ones. That is very important. Let the people be younger and let the message be that we have failed. Let the message be that we have failed and we want to do better", he said.

The PR expert who decried the use of foreign agencies as reputation and campaign managers by politicians affirmed that Nigerian PR agencies have the requisite skills, knowledge and cultural nuances to deliver enduring, engaging, and result-oriented political campaigns.

According to him, engaging the services of indigenous PR agencies will improve significantly on the growth of the sector and the Gross Domestic Product, GDP of the country.

He noted further that the PR profession should maximise the electioneering season to optimise its offerings and reaffirm its position in the marketing and communication business.

Dolapo Otegbayi opined that positioning is how the consumers perceive a product or service in relation to competition. She however, advised that it is important to strive for distinctiveness in the mind of consumers.

During his presentation, Segun Ogunleye noted that brands should have insight that drives the intelligence of business strategy.

On his part, Sheriff Akinpelu posited that the very first step for any brand is to identify their objectives, and also emphasised the need for brands to build penetration by increasing their mental and physical availability.

Oti Ukubeyinje, who drew the curtain on the conversation, stated that consumers at different stages of their lives aspire to be better than where they were. He highlighted the need for brands to pay attention to how these consumers' lifestyles are changing and how to adapt their messages to suit them at each stage of the shift.

MARKETING EDGE on TV: promoting the brand idea.

Brands need to understand the metrics of reach - Experts

xperts in Nigeria's marketing communications space have asserted that for brands to grow, amongst other key imperatives, they have to better understand and execute the metrics of reach which includes building salience, penetration, top of mind awareness, and setting trends in the categories they operate.

In their submission during the MARKETING EDGE Fireside Conversation themed "Marketing and brand positioning in a digital age", they agreed that the above assertion can only be achieved when brands immerse themselves in the changing lifestyles of their consumers, the evolution of their buying behaviors and changes in preferences, and investing in the functional attractiveness as well as emotional attractiveness of their offerings to the consumers.



"Marketing should not be static, because the consumers are not," said Oti Ukubeyinje, VP Product marketing and Growth, Terragon.

"Consumers at different stages of their lives aspire to be better than where they were. So you have to pay attention to how these consumer lifestyles are changing and how to adapt your messages to suit them at each stage they shift to."

According to the digital marketing guru, different brands have their own approach to reach especially FMCG brands whose products aren't from the digital consumption category or solely based on digital interaction. It becomes a function of how to constantly reach people with their brand and message at least once per time, and constantly do it to drive salience, which will in turn translate to top of mind.

"That's why sometimes brands will do crazy stuff just to increase memorability, so that the next time they associate that action with that brand or that memory with that brand, when they are at a moment of choice to choose between one

product or the other, the memory you have will help you shape your judgment. So If you have a good memory of the brand or interaction, you will most likely reach for the brand in your moment of choice. That is what you want to translate salience and top of mind awareness into. Top of mind awareness comes to play when consumers have choices, between similar products from different brands and then there is that," Oti shared.

Validating the above information,



Dolapo Otegbayi, a seasoned marketer and Specialized nutritions director at

FrieslandCampina buttressed the importance of positioning in the metrics of reach.

She said: "First you need to understand your positioning. Positioning is how the consumers perceive your product or service relative to competition. And it is important that you fight, you strive to get that distinctiveness in the mind of consumers."

"Profile and review your target market, where is your size of opportunity, who will deliver the highest return on investment. Taking COVID for instance, everything has become unusual to a new normal. Life in 2019 and life now, you'd see that a lot has changed, and who are the biggest part of these changes, the consumers, the people. The world is changing at a very fast pace, and It is the onus of the brands



to evolve into the current realities of the consumers," Otegbayi noted.

On his part, Sheriff Akinpelu who shared that the very first step was for brands to identify their objectives, also emphasized the need for brands to build penetration by increasing their mental and physical availability.

He explained: "Reach is divided into two, there is the physical reach which is physical availability and there is the mental one which is in your mind. Mental availability means that you build a memory structure that allows customers when they are in that space where they have to pick a product, yours comes first in their mind, and not only does it come first, it also compels them to reach for it amongst other choices. So first you understand your objectives, what you want to achieve, and when you know what you want to achieve, then you focus on lifestyle; how consumer behavior has changed over the years."

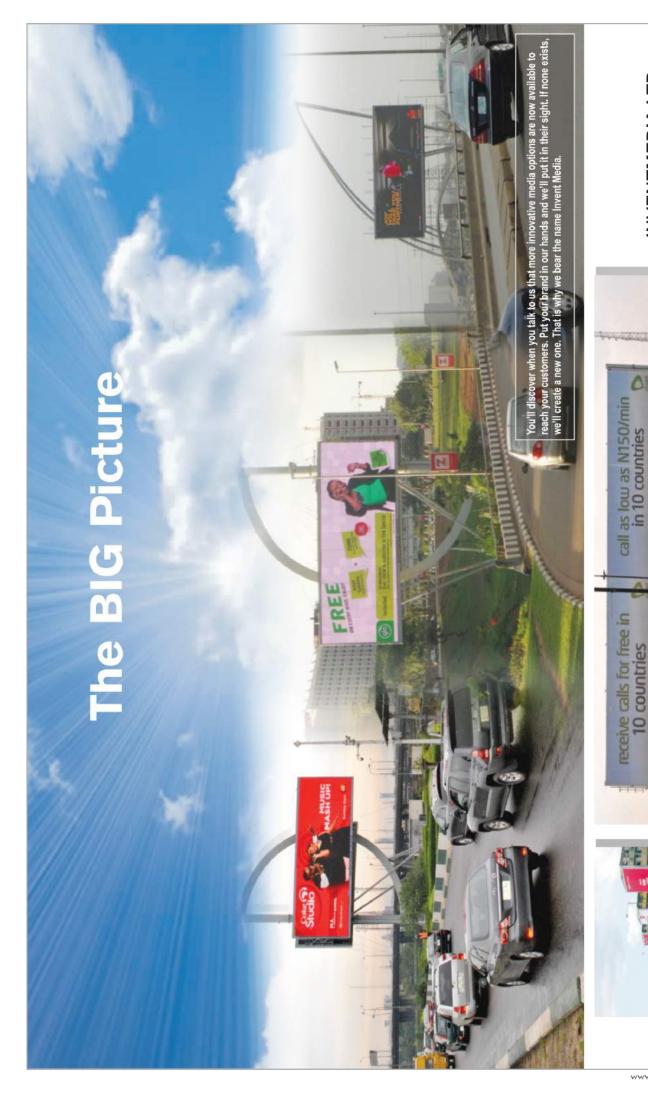

Why brands need to focus on the ethical consumer

ith the growing demand for sustainable products as the world evolves and consumer consumption habits shift, it has become of utmost importance for brands to continually keep up with the changing preferences of their consumers in order to make more effective marketing decisions.

One of the major shifts in consumer behavior is ethical consumption. Ethical consumerism is an activism based on the premise that purchasers in markets consume not only goods but also, implicitly, the process used to produce them and how they affect the society as well as their impact on the environment. To an ethical consumer, consumption is a political act that sanctions the values embodied in a product's manufacture. The ethical consumer movement has challenged marketers ever since, under the basic assumption that brands are selling for maximum profit, not for the greater good.

For consumers that are passionate about sustainable products, or human rights, diversity and inclusivity, brands should address their commitments to such positions and communicate them to their consumers. For instance, brands like Unilever continuously reiterate their commitment to sustainable living, healthy living, diversity and inclusion; Nestle positions itself to fight against racial discrimination.

Packaging is also important to ethical consumers who are more concerned about the ingredients and sustainability; consumers rely primarily on product labeling, so package design and copy are critical. Include essential facts, industry certifications, and initiatives in your packaging and marketing materials to give them the nudge.

A brand's ethical or unethical activities do not seem to have a direct impact on purchase decisions, with the rare exception of significant amounts of negative media coverage, so long as its products are valued.

Leveraging the interest of consumers in issues that affect or impact them directly by communicating your brand positioning and values that are readily available to them, will naturally influence their purchase decisions and buying behavior. Ethical consumers either purchase ethical products and services or in initiate the Gen Z's 'Cancel Culture' on those that have been tagged unethical.

Get feedback from your consumers, as they may have great ideas on how you can more effectively appeal to ethical consumers with your business and marketing practices. However, there is no debate that the ethical consumer market provides a real opportunity for brand marketers; marketers must create context to engage the ethical consumer. Marketers need to understand how the consumer wants to buy and help them do so.

Are the media appropriately addressing issues in Nigerian politics?

s the 2023 elections loom, different electoral activities have begun. It is almost palpable that another election season is upon us. Several contenders have signified their intention to vie for the office of President. And others will still join. A lot of political positioning is already taking place in preparation for a new electioneering season with the same electoral activities, same electioneering process but slightly different candidates and political platforms.

The general elections may be scheduled for February 2023 but political activities have begun to acquire traction as political players begin to warm up for campaigns to sell their candidature to electorates, albeit the ban on political campaigns is yet in place. All the same, the polity is rife with news of politicians decamping to join another party or moving from camp to camp in search of political relevance and acceptability. Party rivalries between the APC and

the PDP have worsened. Banditry, kidnapping, and farmer-herder conflicts have continued to wreak havoc on the federal-states relationship and national security.

The recent declaration by Asiwaju Bola Ahmed Tinubu, former Governor of Lagos State and Leader of the APC to run for the Presidency has been catalytic. Mixed reactions have continued to pour in both in support and against a Tinubu presidency.

Political experts predict that the political environment will be turbulent and toxic all through to the elections and possibly beyond. There is a palpable disconnect between the government in its entirety and the people. Sensing this, one of the presidential candidates, Dr. Kingsley Moghalu described the forthcoming election as the "make or mar election for Nigeria."

It is instructive that discussions about who succeeds President Muhammadu Buhari are dominated by religious and ethnic sentiments. We hear things like, 'it is the turn of Christians to produce the president, 'presidency should be zoned to the south/south east, and 'we don't want Muslim/ Muslim ticket.' The remark by Nonso Nnamani, the National Coordinator of New Tribe: "We are not seeking for a president for the South East, North East, or South-South, but a president for the Federal Republic of Nigeria," speaks to the heart of the matter. The parochial sentiments that continue to trail our political evolution is quite sad as it has jettisoned competence in shopping for the candidate for the most important job in the country. The media owe this nation the duty of redirecting thoughts to the issues germane to leadership and national development.

Celebrated as one of the most dynamic in Africa, the Nigerian media has been the vanguard of the Nigerian state. The media has been at the forefront of fighting for the people right from the pre-independence era. Even in post-independence Nigeria, the media is about the only institution that has been truly the people's refuge and advocate. Thus, it is a good reference case for the importance of the media in politics and democracy. The Nigerian story has demonstrated that democracy and journalism are inextricably linked. Without the media, that is, a free and dynamic media, democracy cannot

At this critical juncture in the annals of Nigeria however, the media, more than ever before, need to maintain a vigilant watch on Nigeria's democracy. Beyond the watchdog role, the media must set the agenda for 2023. Nigerians must be made to understand the imperative of competence, integrity, inclusiveness, the rule of law, proper structuring of the country, peoplecentrism, and good governance. These qualities and attributes must be what we look for as we shop for a president in 2023. The media should assist the nation to rise above parochial and selfish interests, the sorts that have taken us to this sorry state in our national development. The print, broadcast, radio, and television; and even the unregulated social media should take this as a national assignment so that 2023 will make, rather than mar us as a nation.

Agency-client Relationship: Trust key to business growth

rust, transparency and mutual respect may sound very cheap but they appear very uncommon in the lexicon of most business men, not in the least, service providers in the IMC industry. Yet, trust and transparency remain key and pivotal to increasing the frontiers of business opportunities, especially through referrals. The lack and inadequacy of these valuable qualities and values have caused a wreck in the business of many. As a result of this, some experts in the industry, advocate that agencies should encourage clients to see their agencies as an extension of their own businesses, not just as another service provider. They averred that, the key to building great relationships and achieving great results is to work together as partners to achieve a common goal.

Commenting on the relevance of trust between the agency and clients, creative amazon and Executive Director, Strategy and Innovation at Yellow Brick Road(YBR), Nnenna Onyewuchi, charged agencies in the integrated marketing communications(IMC) industry to re-think their present business models and relationship in order to promote a sustainable client-agency relationship amid the dwindling ad spend in the advertising ecosystem.

The marketing strategist noted that the present economic realities have changed the whole dynamics of client-agency relationship as clients now expect a more holistic and robust relationship from the agencies. Her words: "I think the first step is to re-imagine our relationship with our clients. Many agencies are stuck in a place where they are a vendor; someone focused solely on executing campaigns. What clients want is a business partner. Someone who understands their sales process, the challenges they have with distribution, even internal culture issues. Agencies need to concern themselves with the issues that keep the CEO up at night, not just the CMO. If a client's management sees the agency as useful, as contributing to their bottom line, as opposed to just being a cost centre, that will go a long way to changing the relationship".

Speaking in a similar vein, Ose Osundeko, Head, Digital Marketing at Starcom Media Perspectives, urged both client and agency to encourage true collaboration, describing it as the pillar of every brand success. She also advised that the notion of a subservient relationship that exists between clients and agencies must be discarded as clients are only as good as their agencies and vice versa.

Ose explained that true collaboration should be encouraged in the form of getting the best of minds from the agency and client-side to participate equally by harnessing their uniqueness and sharing information that positively shapes the future of both partners.

The Head, Digital Marketing, charged both partners to work with integrity, reaffirming that integrity fosters a natural trusting relationship that permits open communication, good decision making and a strong moral compass that guides all decisions and actions to be focused on the brand and its needs.

In his submission, Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer of Towncriers Ltd., Kayode Olagesin opined that trust is the pinnacle of any relationship when genuine collaboration occurs between agency and clients. According to him, trust sets the tone for business and propels partners to be willing to be empathic, considerate and loyal.

"The objective of hiring a full-service marketing agency is to build relationships, increase brand loyalty, and make more sales. He opined that mutual chemistry between partners edges out other high-ranking considerations, including understanding of the industry, professionalism and general creativity. "This is a normal thing, as clients at any point in time would want to work with agencies they have chemistry with. It is not all about knowledge on the job. They want to feel that, 'Look, we have the same view; we have the same approach to business and to marketing communication.' So the chemistry is very important in a relationship."

Experiential marketing Amazon, Tolulope Medebem, the Chief Executive Officer of Aster Integrated Marketing, and Vice President of the Experiential Marketers Association of Nigeria (EXMAN), is of the view that relationship with clients is a major key element to accelerate the growth of the advertising industry. The agency boss, who emphasised the need for agency owners to nurture good relationships with clients, noted that "technology does not run a business, but good relationships do".

The EXMAN VP stated this while sharing her experience on how she benefited immensely from business opportunities that were birthed out of sustained good relationship during the peak of the pandemic, she said: "I can say that one of the things that has kept us in business so far during the pandemic and even presently, is relationships. All through the period, those that kept working with us were actually those clients that we have relationship with, and strangely this year, based on words of mouth and relationships, we got a couple of new clients as well."

For Ozoemena Mbanefo, founder of Nigeria's foremost adschool, Oxygen Academy, the job of an agency is to proffer solutions for the industry. He therefore urged agencies to work harder at building trust by embracing the philosophy of being a people-centric brand while dealing with business partners.

His words: "When you take your client as a person and you deal with them personally because you understand what they are going through, business opportunities open. Clients come to agencies because they need help and have money to give to agencies for the help they need. Brand experts should understand that every brand that comes to them is like a patient coming to the hospital and what they need is brand health. I have seen people relate with clients on the basis of; So, what do you want? Clients will say, this is what I want and you create what they want and give them. You have to go beyond what the client wants to what they need. We shouldn't just deliver marketing communication; we should deliver business solutions"

How brands scramble for Metaverse



he scramble for share of a new reality is underway. Interest in the Metaverse is expanding at an astronomical speed, even as tech behemoths like Microsoft reportedly bid £50bn for video game maker Activision Blizzard. Microsoft correctly identified gaming as a key foundation for Metaverse platforms and it's just the latest move among technology experts that are keen to make the most of the opportunity.

It would be recalled that Facebook also strategically rebranded its parent company as Meta, seemingly staking future growth on grabbing a big share of the space.

However, Sir Martin Sorrell, ad industry icon, recently unveiled S4S Ventures – a VC fund targeting early-stage companies with interests that include exploring commercial models within the Metaverse.

Metaverse is a generic term for experiences that go beyond the physical through connected virtual worlds, offering new ways for people to communicate and interact. There are reports that it is in the earliest stages of its development and could be years or even decades away from being used to its full potential.

Basically, the key technologies that represent the building blocks of the Metaverse have actually been around for some time. The crucial added element in the new reality is that users don't have to do it alone: they can talk to and play alongside friends and strangers alike to their heart's content.

This facilitation of communication and peer-to-peer engagement is at the heart of the Metaverse. At present, there are no rules – Metaverse can truly be whatever anybody thinks it is, and people can do as they feel. It's essentially an undefined space, one that is building its own communities and taking the communication concept of Messenger to a far higher level. Mass audiences are already a given. Execution may, therefore, be the greater challenge. As brands are expected to jump on the Metaverse bandwagon, experimentation will have more merit if launches are made with learning as their purpose.

Until the new reality fully dawns, brands need to keep tabs on what tech companies are doing to deliver new platforms before they dip a toe into the virtual water with content and campaigns that will help them gain a foothold in the fascinating world of Metaverse.

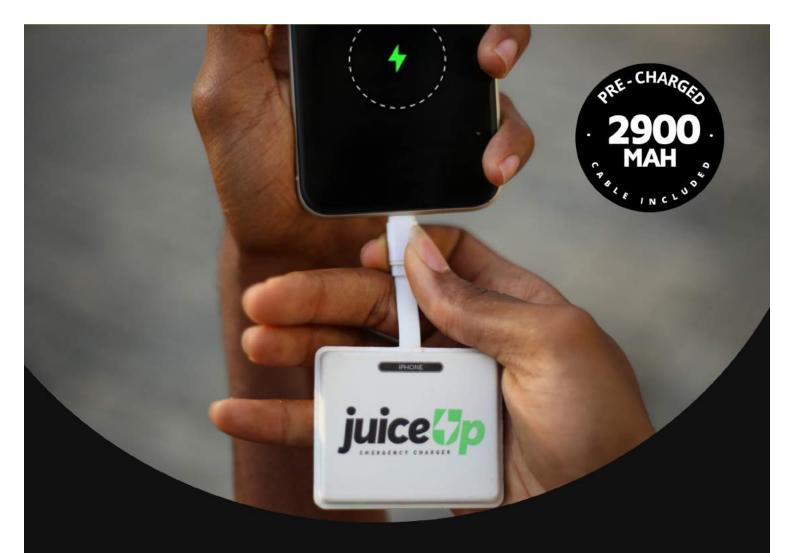
We join the many voices calling for its end, and hope that peace, human rights and the international rule of law will prevail".

Brands fight Russia over Ukraine invasion

trong reactions have continued to trail Russian attacks on Ukraine, which has generated some ripple effects across global brands that joined the war by getting off the shelves and halting their services in solidarity and sympathy with Ukraine.

In addition to the imposition of various sanctions such as ejection from most international sporting events, air travel restrictions and severed ties, brands are standing up to what they consider as impunity and highhandedness by distancing themselves from anything

What's more, renowned Cannes Lions International Festival of Creativity, the largest gathering in the creative marketing community, has cut off Russia from its global award scheme, meaning agencies and brands from President Putin's Russia will no longer be eligible for a trophy in 2022. Russian delegates will also be banned from attending the festival.

"We stand together with our friends in Ukraine—and our many partners and community members in Russia who strongly oppose the actions of the Russian Government," Lions organizers said in a statement.

"Despite our desire to celebrate creativity from wherever it comes, we have made the decision not to accept submissions or delegations from Russian organizations into Cannes Lions or its associated awards programmes We will welcome free of charge any and all Ukraine creatives who are able to attend Cannes Lions. Refunds on awards submissions for Ukraine agencies will also be honoured," the statement added.

This reprisal has hit negatively on the world's most powerful leather game, football, as ManUtd is ready to end a sponsorship deal worth £40m as its major sponsor since 2013, Aeroflot airline, has been banned from operating in the UK amid sanctions on Russia. Aeroflot is the national airline of Russia and flies to 146 destinations across 52 countries but a ban has been placed on all Aeroflot flights within the UK both entering and exiting the nation.

The Ukraine war has also tested the power of tech giants. Many American brands including Apple, Google, Ford and Harley-Davidson, have stopped their sales in Russia. The sanctions by the US have created a situation where brands have taken a step back, not minding the effect on their loyal customers in Ukraine or

There is equally a steep increase in prices of products and disruption of supplies as the crisis continues to rear its ugly head against consumers. Beer companies are on tenterhooks as there could be a steep increase in prices of barley and disruption of supplies on account of the Russia-Ukraine crisis.

"Ukraine is among the top five global producers of barley, and any major geopolitical crisis in Ukraine could affect global supplies," industry executives and analysts tracking the sector said.

Cannes Lions bans Russian entries and delegates from 2022 festival

estival Cannes Lions has cut Russia off from its global award scheme following its President Vladimir Putin's invasion of neighboring country Ukraine, meaning agencies and brands from the country will no longer be eligible for a trophy in 2022. Russian delegates will also be banned from attending the festival.

"We stand together with our friends in Ukraine—and our many partners and community members in Russia who strongly oppose the actions of the Russian Government," Lions organizers said in a statement.

"Despite our desire to celebrate creativity from wherever it comes, we have made the decision not to accept submissions or delegations from Russian organizations into Cannes Lions or its associated awards programmes. As an immediate action, Ascential and LIONS will make a significant donation to humanitarian charities working in the affected region. In addition, while we recognise that this is only a small gesture, we will welcome free of charge any and all Ukraine creatives who are able to attend Cannes Lions. Refunds on awards submissions for Ukraine agencies will also be honoured. A talent directory for affected members of the creative community has been established on the LIONS platform, we encourage the global community to commission and support our friends during these troubled times. Affected members of our community can create a profile here. Our thoughts go out to the people of Ukraine and other affected members of the community at this extremely difficult time."

Domino's said 2021 was a "transformational" year, crediting its developments in digital and the launch of its 'Domin-Oh-Hoo-Hoo' campaign for order growth rising "ahead of expectations".

The campaign, which was supported by increased marketing investment, was launched in May to coincide with the easing of lockdown restrictions and was followed by the brand's first-ever Christmas ad.

It was the first campaign under the leadership of new CMO Sarah Barron, who joined from Costa Coffee in January 2021. Her appointment also saw Domino's bring its digital team under the remit of marketing for the first time.

Domino's described itself as a "truly digital-first business", with 91.2% of sales made through digital channels in 2021. This was helped by the launch of its new app, which enables group ordering and better promotion of deals. The app alone accounted for 42% of system sales, a 2.2 percentage point increase on 2020.

To help drive its digital acceleration further, Domino's has committed to investing around £20m over three years. As part of this it will be investing in personalisation and the development of its ecommerce app, as well as in-store innovation to enhance the customer experience and boost top-line growth.

It has also committed to increasing marketing investment to support new national campaigns and promotions, both of which have been made possible after coming to an agreement with franchisees.

The company said this resolution with franchisees will effectively re-set the relationship and "unlock significant latent potential", as well as driving both short- and long-term growth.

Domino's CEO Dominic Paul said the agreement will allow the company to embrace "a new era of collaboration, with the system working together more closely than ever before".

Stagwell posts significant Q4, full-year 2021 growth

tagwell Inc., a global marketing solution network, has announced its gained 10.4% in net revenue in the fourth quarter of 2021 to \$520 million with organic growth of 11.3%. According to a statement on the company's website, its full-year 2021 net revenue reached \$1.93 billion with organic growth (which excludes M&A and currency impact) of 14.5%.

For comparative purposes, those numbers are pro forma figures that assume the MDC Partners merger into Stagwell occurred in January 2020. The merger was actually completed in August of last year.

Mark J. Penn, chairman/ CEO, Stagwell, said: "2021 was a breakthrough year for Stagwell. Our full-year results and 2022 outlook are a clear affirmation of the combination and Stagwell's unique position as the challenger that will transform marketing. We delivered pro forma organic net revenue growth of 14.5% for the year and an even more impressive 18% organic growth when excluding our Advocacy businesses, which lapped the 2020 election cycle."

Penn continued: "Our record year was driven by tailwinds across our high concentration of leading digital capabilities, including digital transformation, influencer and global performance marketing; as well as a rapid acceleration in large contract wins. Our robust 2022 outlook reflects our expectation for continued digital strength; continued acceleration in scaled, integrated contract wins; and significant growth in the second-half in our Advocacy businesses driven by an anticipated record year of spend during the 2022 U.S. mid-term elections."

In the same vein, Frank Lanuto, Chief Financial Officer, said that the company reported strong fourth quarter net revenue of \$520 million, representing pro forma net revenue growth of 10.4% year-over-year with 11.3% organic growth.

"Strong operating performance led to pro forma adjusted EBITDA margins of 19.9% for the quarter. Effective cash flow management permitted our continued acquisitions of both minority interests in our fastest growing subsidiaries as well as the acquisition of Good stuff in the UK while lowering our net leverage ratio from the prior quarter," he said.

Fielding questions in a separate interview with MARKETING EDGE on why many Nigerian agencies don't make their earnings public, Rotimi Bankole, Group CEO, SBI Stagwell, mentioned that his agencies (SBI & Streams Media) post their growth and earnings regularly, noting that it has never hidden thing from the group's investors.

"It is not a particularly Nigerian issue, most private companies, especially the small ones worldwide are not obligated to show their books to the general public. Sometimes when they share, perhaps it is to help publicise their growth while they seek funding for investors.

"But as long as a private company's owners and the tax man have a full picture of its financial performance, the company is doing its job with regards to disclosure. When it comes to publicly listed companies, however, their books are routinely published," he said.

"But we at SBI Media and Streams Media regularly disclose our growth to our investors," he added.

Recall that in a bid to deepen its footprint in African marketing service, Stagwell partnered with SBI Media and two other agencies in Africa recently, which transformed it into SBI Stagwell.

The company is also projecting pre-tax earnings of between \$450 million and \$480 million this year and free cash flow growth of about 30%. Penn said that cash will be used for acquisitions, investment in its digital operations and paying off debt.

In the U.S., the company posted Q4 organic growth of 7% and FY 2021 growth of 14%. In Q4, creative and communications contributed nearly half of the firm's revenue (47%). Digital transformation services added 23%, performance, media and data accounted for 21% and consumer insights and strategy contributed 9%

Ukraine crisis: Netflix, TikTok halt services in Russia

pullback in their services to Russian businesses, Netflix is now suspending its subscription video-on-demand service due to the



Russian invasion of Ukraine, according to reports.

The suspension will also include stopping movie and TV productions, as well as any content acquisitions in Russia. Reports said it had four Russian-language series in production and post-production.

Netflix also recently refused to carry 20 Russian free-to-air propaganda channels that it was required to host under Russian law, according to Variety. One of the channels is Channel One, which has "close links to the Kremlin," according to Politico.

In the same vein, TikTok has also said that its user's platform in Russia has been blocked from posting and viewing videos.

"Given the circumstances on the ground, we have decided to suspend our service in Russia," TikTok said.

Other entertainment companies also pulled back on Russian business, with virtually all major movie studios halting production including Walt Disney, Warner Bros., Sony, Paramount Pictures and Universal Pictures last week.

Netflix, started up in Russia in 2016 and presently has just one million subscribers in Russia, Overall, Netflix has just over 222 million total paid memberships worldwide.

Netflix had earlier announced that it would suspend all future projects and acquisitions from Russia, joining a growing list of companies that have stopped doing business with the country.

Russia: Noose tightens on economy, oligarchs as sanctions take effect

he Russian economy and her moneybags are beginning to buckle as the impact of sanctions and business isolation kicks in. Russian currency, the Ruble, has suffered more that 30 percent decline and is presently worth less than a cent as at Monday. There are indications that things might become critical for the aggressor country as global businesses join the sustained sanctions and renewed efforts to seize the yachts and other choice properties of Russian oligarchs by America and her allies.

President Joe Biden recounted some of these sanctions in a State of the Nation Address where Americans, Republicans or Democrats closed ranks and stood by their President.

"Together, along with our allies, we are right now enforcing powerful economic sanctions. We're cutting off Russia's largest banks from the international financial system; preventing Russia's Central Bank from defending the Russian ruble, making Putin's \$630 billion war fund worthless. We're choking Russia's access, we're choking Russia's access to technology that will sap its economic strength and weaken its military for years to come.

"Tonight, I say to the Russian oligarchs and the corrupt leaders who've bilked billions of dollars off this violent regime: No more. The United States Department of Justice is assembling a dedicated task force to go after the crimes of the Russian oligarchs.

"We're joining with European Allies to find and seize their yachts, their luxury apartments, their private jets. We're coming for your ill-begotten gains," the American President declared.

Leading other countries, President Joe Biden's administration has banned U.S. people and companies from doing business with the Central Bank of Russia, thereby immobilising nearly half of President Vladimir Putin's war chest. Other sanctions by the U. S. are: ordering 12 Russian diplomats to the United Nations to leave, asking crypto exchanges to help ensure that Russian individuals and organisations aren't using virtual currencies, locking certain Russian transactions from MasterCard and Visa payment networks, and isolating certain individuals believed to be in cohort with Putin. The U.S. said sanctions on the Russian Direct Investment Fund would also extend to its CEO, Kirill Dmitriev, a close Putin's ally.

U. K. Prime Minister Boris Johnson also announced an asset freeze against all major Russian banks, including an immediate freeze on VTB, Russia's second largest bank. He has also instructed ports to block any vessels they believe are owned, controlled, chartered or operated by any person connected with Russia, or by sanctioned individuals. Vessels flying the Russian flag or registered in Russia are also to be blocked. Other measures taken include: the banning of several Russian banks from using SWIFT and is calling for a total SWIFT ban for Russia; sanctioning five banks: Rossiya, IS Bank, General Bank, Promsvyazbank and the Black Sea Bank, stopping all major Russian companies from raising finance on U.K. markets, and also prohibiting the Russian state from raising sovereign debt on U.K. markets, sanctioning more than 100 individuals, entities and their subsidiaries, including Rostec, Russia's biggest defense company, Kirill Shamalov, Russia's youngest billionaire and Putin's former son-in-law, Petr Fradkov, head of Promsvyazbank (itself already sanctioned) and son of former head of FSB Denis Bortnikov, deputy president of VTB Yury Slyusar, director of United Aircraft Corp and others. There is also an imminent ban on Aeroflot planes landing in

Boris Johnson has also banned all exports of goods that could have military use, such as electrical components and truck parts, prohibited a range of technology exports such as semiconductors and aircraft parts as well as goods for the extractive industries, such as oil refinery equipment. There is also a limit of 50,000 pounds (\$67,000) on deposits by Russian nationals in U.K. bank accounts to prevent Russian oligarchs from offloading their wealth into the U.K. through such deposits.

All sanctions also apply to Belarus, the Russian ally in this unpopular Ukrainian

Similar sanctions have been emplaced by the 27 nations that make up the European Union, and Canada. Other countries that have joined the west in sanctioning Russia include Turkey, Japan, South Korea, Singapore and Switzerland, the traditionally neutral nation.

To further tighten the economic noose, Russian businesses are now outcasts while there is an exodus of foreign investments. Following the invasion of Ukraine, leading companies in the world are joining in the economic isolation of aggressive Russia. A couple of days ago, Boeing and Airbus announced the halting of aircraft sales and supply of components to Russia. "With Western lessors also looking to repossess jets that are operated by Russian carriers, the Russian aviation sector is now on a footing that is similar to North Korea and Iran - and similar to where it was under Soviet rule," wrote Vertical Research Partners analyst Rob Stallard.

Major auto and truck makers, including Volvo Cars, AB Volvo, General Motors Co., Harley-Davidson and Jaguar Land Rover, have also cut off exports to Russia. BMW said it was discontinuing local production and car exports to Russia. Other companies that have joined in tightening the noose round the Russian economy are Apple, which has announced a pause in sales in Russia and limiting Apple Pay, Google, H&M Group, Ford which has also donated to humanitarian aids in Ukraine, Nike Inc. which has made purchases on its website and app unavailable in Russia, and MSC and Maersk, two of the world's biggest shipping lines that has suspended container shipping to and from Russia, Nokia and Ericsson both of which has stopped deliveries to Russia. The entertainment giants, Disney and Warner Bros, Canada's online store, Goose, online travel-booking company, Espedia are all cutting business in Russia.

The energy sector which is a strong income earner for Russia is not spared in this economic onslaught. Energy giants have been leaders of the rejection of Russia include, TotalEnergies, Shell, BP, ExxonMobil and Equinor.

Knowing the impact of these fleeing western countries on the economy of Russia, Kremlin has been trying to stop the exodus. Introducing new capital controls, Prime Minister Mikhail Mishustin is reported to have said that Western companies were taking decisions because of "political pressure," and would be prevented from selling Russian assets until that subsides.

Will the Ukrainian venture be the nemesis of Putin's Russia? Wait on time to tell.

Burger King's closure of Russia outlets encounters setback



he parent company of fastfood chain Burger King has announced its inability to close shops in Russia as its partner refuses to comply with a directive to suspend all operations in reaction to Vladimir Putin's invasion of Ukraine.

David Shear, President of

Restaurant Brands International, RBI, owners of Burger King, stated he is not able to close its 800 restaurants in Russia as its joint venture partner has declined.

Mr. Shear said: "We contacted the main operator of the business and demanded the suspension of Burger

King restaurant operations in Russia. "He has refused to do so."

According to him, to enforce its contracts with Alexander Kolobov, the franchisee, it would need the help of the Russian government but "we know that will not practically happen anytime soon".

RBI's entry into Russia a decade ago was through a joint venture partnership with three entities which are Mr. Kolobov, who controls day-to-day operations, private equity and asset management firm Investment Capital Ukraine, and Russia's stateowned VTB Bank which has been hit by Western sanctions.

Meanwhile, the President of RBI said the company has begun the process of disposing of its 15% ownership stake in the joint venture but that it will take "some time" based on the terms of the agreement.

Burger King, last week said it had suspended all corporate support for its business in the country, following a host of other brands including rival McDonald's that are seeking to cut ties after Vladimir Putin's invasion of Ukraine.

Accenture to support displaced Ukrainians with \$5M, telehealth

ccenture, including its big digital marketing arm Accenture Interactive, has announced its pulling out of Russia citing the Ukraine invasion by Russia as the reason. The company has a total of 2,300 employees there, accounting to Accenture.

Making the announcement, the company wrote: "We will be providing support to our Russian colleagues, While Accenture does not have a business in Ukraine, we will continue our efforts to help our Ukrainian colleagues working around the globe at Accenture and their extended families; we are providing telehealth for those in Ukraine, and helping resettle family members who leave Ukraine."

Accenture said it was donating \$5 million to nonprofit relief organisations working to help people in Ukraine and those being displaced into Poland, Romania, Slovakia, Hungary and the Czech Republic."

The company is also matching

donations from employees.

Other holding companies continue to evaluate options. Interpublic, for example said, "we are assessing the most appropriate course of action that is both responsive to the gravity of the situation and also seeks to take into account the welfare of our colleagues." It has about 200 employees in Russia.

"As indicated at the outset of this unprovoked war," IPG added, "our primary focus continues to be remaining in regular contact with our affiliate partners in Ukraine in order to determine the most effective ways for us to provide support to them, and the need."

IPG joins global brands' Russian exodus



nterpublic Group, IPG, the global marketing solutions company, has joined other global brands to suspend operations in Russia. This was contained in an internal memo to IPG's global employees by the Group's CEO, Philippe Krakowsky.

Krakowsky said that the decision was taken after a careful study of the impact of the Russian invasion on Ukrainians and the company staff in both Ukraine and Russia.

"Recent and escalating attacks on civilian targets, including hospitals, make it regrettably clear that the trajectory of the conflict is escalating, and the war could well go on for some time. Therefore, we have decided to suspend our operations in Russia", Krakowsky said.

Backgrounding the seeming delay in suspending operations, he said the Group was wrestling with the issue of how to reconcile the fact that discontinuing "our operations in Russia could mean abandoning our approximately 200 colleagues there, many of whom we've been fortunate enough to work with for

decades."

Recounting efforts at striking a balance between company's culture and value on one hand with being there for colleagues in Ukraine and Russia and its responsibilities as a global corporate citizen on the other, the IPG boss said "when the invasion began, we immediately applied all international sanctions and informed clients in Russia who are prohibited parties that we would no longer continue working with them. Because we have never owned a media business in Russia, we did not have significant concerns that our media buying was either fueling the local economy, or funding media being used by the state.

"Essentially, we hoped that by supporting our colleagues in Russia we could live up to the part of our DNA that values and seeks to protect our people across IPG, yet also live up to the international sanctions against the Russian regime."

Meanwhile, the IPG boss recalled that following the unprovoked invasion of Ukraine, the company's focus has been on "doing what we can to help our associates there. we feel a sense of responsibility to do whatever possible on behalf of people whose lives are being upended and threatened."

Acknowledging the good work of IPG employees at alleviating the impact of the war on the people, he said, "Some of the stories that have emerged these past two weeks are truly remarkable. We've seen

IPG people in nearby countries drive to the border to physically assist and provide transportation to individuals and families as they leave Ukraine. Some among us have offered to help refugees get settled as they arrive in a new country, and still, others are hosting displaced Ukrainians in their homes. Several of our agencies in Eastern Europe have made the amazing gesture of opening their doors to anyone fleeing the crisis so that they have a place to work. Our teams are also working on the logistics required for refugees to access housing and medical services. Across IPG, our company has already donated hundreds of thousands of dollars to humanitarian organizations focused on addressing the crisis. Some of our agencies are providing direct monetary support to our affiliates in Ukraine, as well as assistance with IT and other operational needs. For the month of March, IPG is also matching individual gifts from IPG employees to organisations providing assistance to Ukrainians impacted by the

Expressing pride in the war relief efforts of the Group's people, he concluded that the "amazing things our people have been able to accomplish, on the ground, to help their Ukrainian colleagues and the Ukrainian people. The kind of work individuals across IPG, and organizations within IPG, have been doing these past two weeks is something we should all be proud of."

Dentsu joins list of global brands quitting Russia

and public relations holding company has joined the growing list of global brands that have suspended operations in Russia in response to the invasion of Ukraine. In a statement made available to the press, a company spokesperson said: "Dentsu International announces today that we are in the process of transferring ownership of our joint venture in Russia to our long-term local partner who will operate independently moving forward."

Stating the reason for the spokesperson

declared: "Dentsu stands unequivocally with Ukraine and the global community who are calling for the restoration of peace. In these unprecedented times, as a global business, we will continue to prioritise the safety of our people and the needs of our clients.

"Our thoughts continue to be with everyone whose lives have been profoundly impacted."

The spokesperson reiterated Dentsu's commitment to alleviating the impact of the war on its people in Ukraine and the generality of Ukrainians supporting the humanitarian efforts especially the Red Cross Society. He said that Dentsu would further donate ¥100m (\$840,000) to humanitarian efforts in Ukraine: "This is

in addition to the £250,000 (\$330,000) that was already provided as urgent aid to the Ukrainian Red Cross Society on February 25.

"In Ukraine, we operate via affiliation with a local partner and we care deeply for the welfare of our 500 affiliate employees. Our Dentsu teams around the world, and particularly in EMEA, have stepped up to provide humanitarian support to those impacted in Ukraine including transporting team members and their families from Ukraine borders to Poland, securing job transfers and secondments to other areas in our network, and providing legal and housing support."

Dentsu is now the sixth major advertising company to withdraw, or begin cutting back, its business operations in Russia, following announcements over the last two weeks from WPP, Accenture, Havas, IPG, and Publicis.

The company employs 1,500 people in Russia via a joint venture with OKS Group.

How to shape customer relationships in the new age of experience

ustomers now are so different from those even a few years ago, with more technology literacy, increased demand and the desire to have a relationship with the brands they buy from. If you're looking to get the edge over your competitors by reimaging your approach to data, measurement and loyalty.

Brands need to transform their data strategy, from a medialed narrative focusing on quantity of data, to one that focuses on depth of knowledge and understanding of customer needs, passions and motivations. Building insight into each of your customers' needs will help you to know when to deliver personal interactions, and drive more engagement.

Moving away from just the customers' experiences on screen towards a more omnichannel brand experience, both before and after a sale, is key to driving connection with your customers. Practicing funnel fluidity helps ensure you're capturing potential customers at every opportunity.

The customer journey is now in the buyer's hands; they choosing how and when to engage with your brand. Your job is to meet them where they are, which involves finding, knowing, engaging and providing value to customers through new funnel logic.

So how do you nurture that relationship? By treating it like a human relationship; offering consistency, communication, creativity and authenticity.

Consistency allows your customer to know what to expect when they engage with your brand. They are more likely to feel comfortable giving their money to an organisation that constantly delivers on their promises. Similarly, ensure you have a two-way dialogue with your customers so they feel they can provide feedback in the knowledge that it will be considered and potentially acted upon.

Creativity is one area that can really provide your brand with a unique identity. Surprise and entertain your customers with your creativity – spice things up. Finally, 'authenticity' is a buzzword for a reason. Be clear about what your brand's values are, communicate them and align your strategy towards them.

Ukrainian Creatives fight back with Information Campaigns and Practical Humanitarian Aid



umming up the results of the third week of the war in Ukraine, we can once again say that a human being is the most adaptive and survivable creature on earth. Who would have thought that we, the people who yesterday complained about burnout, mental health problems, "severe deadlines" (if the project is given less than three weeks), will now be able to create projects under constant shelling? Without a permanent place of residence, or moving from city to city every few days. All this has become the reality of our agency.

This is when illusions have passed, fear and confusion have passed, as well, and clarity has come. The clarity that this is not a threat, not blackmail of Putin, but the clarity that the old man is ready to make bloody bets to achieve his imperial ambitions. Also, the clarity that the pseudo-powerful second strongest army in the world suffers more losses in two weeks of "special operations" than in all the years of the Syrian war. At the end of the second week of the war, there was confidence

that we would win, which is confirmed by the huge number of losses of the Russian military.

This war is hard to imagine in the 21st century, but it takes place right in our homes and on our streets. This war will forever change the creative industry, not only in Ukraine, even if it seems that creatives in other countries are not affected. The European economy is too tightly connected for events to not affect the consequences for the brands represented in the European market, and, as a result, the creative agencies that run them. It is likely that, if not immediately, then gradually, the approach of brands to strategic planning will change.

Change is something you never expect. Imagine, yesterday you were developing campaigns to reduce carbon emissions into the atmosphere and fought for tolerance. Today you are sitting in the basement of a bomb shelter with your children. It does not fit well into the usual civilized European world. We are all used to the fact that the war is taking place somewhere

far from our homes, somewhere in Syria, Africa, Iran. Today it is happening close to the borders of Poland, all over Ukraine, which now looks like Europe during the Second World War and where Russian troops are shelling the largest nuclear power plant in Europe.

We are sure that we, Ukraine, will win. We will stand. Ukraine rallied as a nation and acted as a human shield for Europe. At the military registration and enlistment offices, there are queues of volunteers and most get refused. People want to, but cannot get into the army, because the military does not have time to train people without experience. Someone goes to volunteer, someone tries to contribute to this war effort with their profession. Our incredibly, as it turned out, persistent President called on everyone to take their front, to contribute where you are the best.

The creative industry in Ukraine is actively helping to fight on the information front. Many agencies in Ukraine have joined this information war. In less than two weeks, our agency creatives made six state projects to deter Russian aggression and promote humanitarian aid to the army and other social and military issues.

In parallel with this, our creatives weave nets, help in volunteer headquarters, and organize humanitarian aid to cities. Everyone united for the sake of helping each other, for the sake of victory.

Ukraine will survive, but the country's economy will take time to recover. Already, all our clients have stopped their projects – during the war, people do not think about buying new sneakers, but about having water and food in the bomb shelter for the next day. The creative industry is now focused entirely on charitable projects in defense of the state, but these projects do not allow for paying salaries to creatives.

Our agency still has a small financial safety net to support the staff, but it is not known if it will last long enough in these conditions. Business in Ukraine will take time to recover from such a vicious attack, but after any sunset, there is always dawn. Quite a bit of time will pass and we will be able to brush off these events and you will again see our projects on the awards circuit.

Accelerating SMEs' growth through PR

mall and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) are considered the backbone of economic growth in all countries, and are strategic as well as essential for accelerating global growth and development.

According to the Small and Medium Enterprise Development Agency of Nigeria (SMEDAN), a large percentage of all registered companies in Nigeria are constituted by small scale businesses and many have been in existence for a

percentage of all registered companies in Nigeria are constituted by small scale businesses and many have been in existence for a long time. SMEs constitute about 90% of businesses in Nigeria, creating more than 70 per cent of employment which contributes 10% to the country's GDP.

Even though SMEs play such an important role, there is also a high failure rate. It is estimated that close to 75% of SMEs fail within their first two years of existence, particularly in developing markets. This high failure rate could also be a contributing factor to determining which marketing communication media should be prioritized by SMEs.

Marketing communication efforts within SMEs are largely influenced by the environment in which the business operates, the skills and resources of the business, and the characteristics of the owner.

Access to the market remains one of the single biggest challenges that SMEs face in the country and the need to use PR to help small businesses find and grow their client base cannot be overstated. No client wants to do business with a small business owner who has no track record and has never delivered for an actual client.

For most small businesses that can point to fancy marketing campaigns, billboards, or a vast array of clients, marketing communication is, therefore, seen as a vital activity for the survival and success of SMEs.

By being able to point to the coverage, immediately makes it easier to open a door for them. As the clients achieve small, incremental wins, the agency should start building out case studies that are their own form of PR and share these with other industry partners as well.

Momentum has to be maintained because it is one of the most powerful forces in the world; but many small businesses simply can't get the flywheel turning. One step forward and then they fail to capitalise on this. The link between PR coverage and access to the market must be clear.

Today, however, the communication landscape has evolved due to technological advancements. As a result, there are many more communication tools that can be used by SMEs to conduct marketing communication activities of the business.

In a larger business, the marketing and sales or business development activities are two separate functions that theoretically should integrate or align. In a small business, many entrepreneurs find it easier to hide behind the softer elements of marketing but don't have a follow-through strategy to evidence their success.

Business development inside of a small business is not easy and getting in the door is a very real challenge. SMEs should, therefore, have a strategy that combines PR and business development activities in order to find it much easier for market penetration.

According to MTN Nigeria, We Move campaign inaugurated earlier in 2021, has motivated many Nigerians to look inward for opportunities, set goals, grow their interest in various activities, make plans for their future, and develop their talent regardless of the challenges life throws at them.

The campaign, it was also revealed, involved MTN team visiting locations across Nigeria to ask people to share experiences of how they overcame their challenges.

Today, We Move has become a common catchphrase Nigerians, especially the youths find themselves saying when they refuse to



be held back by difficult situations, anxiety, rejection, heartbreak, and all other negative vibes that come with adulthood.

According to the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) the unemployment rate in the country stands at 33% which is currently the second-highest in the world. According to him, the campaign depicted the basic societal truth that people seem to be shying away from, which is the fact that not everyone will have the

opportunity to get a white collar job.

"Some people will have to work in the informal sector of the economy. One of the guys in the campaign is a graduate. While he was in school, he cooked well, some paid him to cook for them. After graduating from school, he never thought of going into that direction of cooking because his parents have expectations of him and he does not want to work in the informal economy.

"But if we look at the situation of the country, we need to look into what we know how to do best. Everyone has something within that makes them special. It is just for us to identify it and look at how we can use that thing to progress in life.

"In the campaign, the protagonist is a wonderful cook, despite the fact that he graduated from the university and couldn't secure a job. He quickly looks into what he can do best and tap into it to grow and progress in life," he explained.

"The role of MTN in that campaign is to show that we understand what Nigerians are going through, especially the youth. We want them to believe in themselves and not to give up. They should have a deep thinking and identify what makes them unique and tap into it.

"MTN will be with them along the journey, irrespective of what they discover in themselves, MTN will be there to make sure they achieve their dreams. I feel elated and humble to be one of those who worked on the project," Mr. Akinpelu concluded.

To further demonstrate its altruistic features and capabilities, MTN Nigeria's We Move campaign has proven that a commercial can create a place where profit, motivation and social good overlap.

Can we reason with ADVAN?

or some time now, relationships between the agencies and other service providers in the integrated marketing communications sector as well as their advertisers have been very frosty. The relationship which is satirically referred to in recent times as masterservant has been largely hinged on mutual suspicion, distrust and dis-respect. Unlike in the past when the client companies and their service agencies enjoyed very cordial relationship built on trust and mutual value creation, the reverse has been the case these days. Long gone and forgotten are the days of long-lasting relationships where it would take a major blow up for the partnership to be at risk. Today, the situation has changed completely such that it has become very, very fragile. A very good observer of the gradual and final collapse in the relationship between the agencies and the clients will readily confirm that both parties are to be blamed.

In the past, the advertisers saw their service providers as valued partners and as such accorded them due respect on their inputs towards building enduring brands that will achieve bottom-lines and profitability. Then, agencies' creative and strategic ideas count more for the average advertisers who saw their agency partners as people with the right solutions to their brands' needs. They gave them the right briefs on their brands' needs while the agencies of old were full of ideas and were solutions providers to clients' brands

marketing challenges.

At issue in today's relationship between the clients and their agencies is the issue of trust and transparency. Most clients have developed erroneous perception for the agencies as mere profiteers who charge more than their services are truly worth. Some clients believe though errorneously that agencies over-invoice, while some are more fixated about the budget being allocated to execute the right campaign that will engender good results for the brands out there in the market place. This they do at the expense of the real value. While it is not out rightly incorrect that some agencies are culpable of unethical business practices, it is however not enough to allow this type of negative perception and stereotyping to remain dominant a feature in managing clientagency relationship. To worsen matter, most clients treat agencies shabbily by not respecting contract terms on engagement. It is not uncommon in this clime for clients to sack their agency partners at their whims and caprices without regard for engagement terms and tenure. In some cases, some of these clients maybe chronic debtors who would always want to experiment with every Tom, Dick and Harry agencies in town with a view to getting different ideas for their brands.

Since most clients now take the agencies for granted, the agencies on their parts have abandoned the culture of loyalty.

Let it be stated that the client reserves the right to hire and fire whoever they feel

can work on their brands. However, such rights should not be abused in relating with the agency partners. Most troubling and worrisome is the fact that most of the agency's contracts are terminated when a new marketing director or commercial director takes over from a former holder of that position on the client's side. The moment a new marketing director takes over the marketing function of the company, the next thing on the card is how to replace the existing agency with subsisting contract or call for a pitchreview of the company's brands advertising business. In that situation, the new CMO may not be keen on the value being offered by the subsisting handler agency before he assumed the new office, rather what concerns him is how to put his own "Man Friday" in charge of the business. While this type of action achieves purpose sometimes, most often, when you put the person you know and you can trust in charge of a business, it may not achieve any beneficial purpose for the business. It therefore means that this action is taken as a vendetta or in pretext for hidden selfish and egoistic purposes. If this is done, the exercise will fail to achieve altruistic corporate goal and brands over-all benefits and value-inputs would have been held in abeyance.

As the clients and their agencies struggle to evolve workable and more respectful and mutually beneficial relationship, advertisers in Nigeria are raising another fundamental issue that appears to be troubling and affecting



a functional and cordial agency-client relationship. Aside the known and existing challenges hampering good agency and client relationship, President of Advertisers Association of Nigeria, (ADVAN) Mr. Osamede Uwubanwen has expressed fear and concern over what he termed as "cross-functions amongst agencies in Nigeria. The ADVAN president had noted that "there are agencies that are crossing functions amongst sectors of the industry with member agencies of one sectoral groups picking contracts from another sectoral group whereas they are not part of that group ". He enjoined the regulators to look into this development as he considered it unhealthy for the brand. While the ADVAN president maybe right about his fears on cross functions amongst agencies, he should also spare some moments about what some clients are doing these days all in their bid to cut costs and save more money for their brands and organizations. Specifically, client companies in recent times are beginning to establish full service agencies within their organisations thereby dispensing with out-sourcing their brands communications briefs. These days, clients go the whole hogg by poaching professionals and specialists in the different IMC sectors and

recruit them as paid employees.

The development has continued to deprive the agencies of skilled manpowers to do their jobs. While it is the agencies that recruit and train their workers, the client companies no longer recruit and train personnel to feed their human resources needs. Rather, they go ahead to poach the best and the brightest professionals on the agency side and warehouse them for their own selfish goals. This practice has further contributed to the dearth of true professionals in the industry as agency workers recruited by the client companies are usually paid jumbo salaries as bait.

The ware-housing of media buying business and other agency services by the client companies is a major ache that may witness sudden collapse of many integrated marketing communications services companies. This fact was corroborated recently by the Founder/CEO of Eskimi, Vytautas Paukstys during a recent Quarterly Virtual Summit by MARKETING EDGE. According to Paukstys, "advertisers are starting to move media buying-in-house. He stated that "as brands continue to strengthen their in-house expertise, agencies are compelled to offer more by delivering

a wider range of services, with data and technology capability, flexible talent, and strong relationships with the tech platforms emerging as dominant requirements". Continuing, Paukstys said: "We are now beginning to see a hybrid model where brands are managing digital media themselves and using agencies as a consultancy even as their in-house operations grow fast. "What is happening is that agencies would also be looking for a new model and how they can find their place in this market which is changing rapidly as brands continue to take control", Paukstys revealed.

For a fact, agencies run on profit made from clients consultancy. Now that today's advertisers are getting wiser warehousing IMC services, it goes without saying that agencies too on their parts will expand their operations to generate enough revenue to run their operations. It is not surprising therefore that today's agencies engage in cross-functioning amongst themselves if only to stay afloat. In the past, it was considered unethical for advertisers to be the one going direct to the media for placement of their advertisements, today, advertisers have jettisoned this rule as they go direct to the media for placements across the media platforms ostensibly to save more from the advertising budgets.

As the popular proverb goes, "since men have learnt to shoot without missing, birds have learnt how to fly without perching". In other words, whatever the agencies are doing to be able to remain afloat and in business, are due to their experience with the clients trying to deny and deprive them of expected services in organisations which would have in turn given them profit. Besides, agencies can cross-function because in today's modern economy, the language that is gaining currency is not "Core Competence" rather it is multiple competences. That agencies want to be everything to all clients is due to the reality out there in the market that to survive the heat in the market and industry, the agencies are tuning into multiple competences so as to continue to be relevant. The earlier the advertisers realize the veracity in this statement and learn how to live with it the better. It needs no further argument in any way that

Only Disruptive Leadership can make Nigeria claim its Promise of Greatness -Prof. Pat Utomi

Professor Pat Utomi is a Professor of Political Economy and a management expert. He is the Founder of Centre for Value in Leadership. He has been acknowledged to be a consummate professional who has passion for dignity of the human person and the spirit of enterprise.

A Fellow of the Institute of Management Consultants of Nigeria, Utomi is also a professor at the Lagos Business School and has served in senior positions in government. He is a sought-after advisor in both private and public enterprises. This cerebral scholar and exemplary corporate leader was the Keynote Speaker at the maiden edition of the MARKETING EDGE Hall of Fame which held recently. Below are excerpts from his address.

ermit me to start
by recalling that at
independence, Nigeria's
output per person was
about twice that of
China. Unfortunately,
however, nobody would have believably
predicted that I would live to see a mind
boggling reversal of fortunes in just one
generation!

In 1978, Deng Xiaoping literally took the reins in China; and he began to say to China, "you must stop believing this nonsense about the intellect as threat to progress just the way Nigerian politicians mock knowledge as theory and impractical today. These ideas of False Consiousness significantly explain why Nigeria is where it is today.

Intellect is what will get us far, Deng kept canvassing.

Our intellectuals have to have a strong place in the (Communist) Party, he insisted. I am pleased to advise everyone who cares in this audience to go and read the speeches which he (Xiaoping) gave in 1978, especially the

ones at the December Communist Party Congress.

As China began to respect the intellect (and intellectuals) more, and, brought about massive progress in just one generation (of about 30 years) the turnaround made China's output per person to now become 30 times of that of Nigeria! That is leadership at work.

Leadership is about sacrificial and visionary pursuit of creative solutions for the advancement of society.

Leaders find problems; and they find ways of not only solving them, but affecting the tone of culture around that process such that progress becomes sustainable. We can talk of so many other examples, such as Brazil, and a host of others where laggard performance was turned around through the emergence of more purposeful leadership. This must indicate that a turnaround is possible with the Nigeria project if leaders of the right stuff show up.

As a graduating student in the late 70's, my focus was largely on Latin

American economies; we saw what happened there (in Latin America).

In 1979, I met a certain Brazilian professor who was literally in exile, in Chile. He was working at Economic Commission for Latin America; and was a leader of a school of thought that was referred to in International Political Economy as Dependency Theory.

In those days Dependency theorists were called 'Dependistas" in Latin America.

I met this celebrated Professor at a conference in New York, and I said to him, you know what, my problem with dependency theory is that, it is elegant theorizing by you and others . As a student I love it but as an economic growth activist I don't see a redemptive part for the people of Brazil in all that theory suggests. I don't see how it solves the problems of people of Brazil.

Anybody who might have been here when President Henrique Fernando Cardoso came to speak some years ago at the Anyia-Osigwe Lecture, here in Lagos, would remember the exchange



between him and I. I asked him if he remembered the precocious African student who asked him this question in 1979, and he laughed.'

Guess what? He went back to Brazil after the years at ECLA. On.return to Brazil, he became the country's minister of foreign affairs at a time the Brazilian economy was a basket case; with inflation running so high such that if you entered a store, the prices of goods might change three times before you finish shopping. It was really awful.

Interestingly, he was in New York as foreign minister to give a speech when he got a call from his (country's) president, asking, Professor Cardoso, would you like to be finance minister? Meanwhile, the lifespan of a finance minister then (in Brazil) was like three months, they kept changing them because they blamed them for the bad shape of the economy. He (Cardoso) said to the president, calm down, as we say in

Nigeria, calm down, can we talk about this tomorrow? He (the President) said okay, fine. When Cardoso got back to his hotel his wife called him by his first name, Fernando, three times, and he said yes sweetheart, what is the problem, my darling, what have I done? She said how can you accept to be finance minister? Cardoso immediately retorted, What do you mean, accept what? I have not done any such thing. She then informed her husband that they (the Brazilian government) had announced it already. You are the new finance minister.

Fernando Cardoso decided to do the job; but who Cardoso was would not determine what he would do. What determined what he did was what was best for Brazil. He brought together Brazil's brightest young economists and asked them to quarrel as much as they wanted; but they should let him into their thought process. He would embrace and use his prestige among his

people to advance whatever that was.

Of course, we know that brought inflation to a critical halt and Brazil began to grow; and, of course, they later insisted he must become president!

It is a globally acknowledged fact that President Henrique Fernando Cardoso, set a new course for Brazil and then he was succeeded by a remarkable trade unionist called Inácio Lula da Silva. Poverty was being eliminated at the rate of several million people a week at a point in time in Brazil's history. Brazil is now one of the top economies in the world. That is what leadership is about.

I will not stay with just foreigners or with broad national themes in leadership. Let's come to industrysI was not joking when I talked about people like Chief Biodun Shobanjo. They did really disrupt the industry; and that disruption must continue. I was a young youth corps member, I served my NYSC in a troublesome place called New Breed magazine, working for Chris Okolie, and I watched the Insight Communications of this world begin in the mid 70's, and late 70's, Chris Okolie himself was a great disruptor, no matter what you thought of him. One day he was so angry with everybody and called the place and shook them all up. Every assignment, it was this (then 21-year-old) youth corper who was getting it done. And just one day, he announced me as the editor of the magazine at age 22! Of course, a couple of days later, I left the country to a graduate school and he said I should continue editing the magazine from the US. That was the kind of crazy person Chris Okolie was.

But leadership matters and we need a lot of leadership and disruption to let Nigeria claim its promise which is to be a great country that will finally remove the shame of the Black man.

I heard Mr. Ajayi (in his welcome address) quote how mediocre pursue publicity and the people of excellence hide in obscurity. If you are going to affect culture, you cannot hide in obscurity, and so, marketing geniuses are fundamental to effectiveness of leadership in extending the reach of those who have excellence in them

I thank you all for coming to honour people of excellence.

The doyen of Nigerian advertising, Dr. Biodun Shobanjo is literally and metaphorically the African re-incarnate of David Ogilvy, as he boasts 5 decades of impactful contributions to Nigeria's Marketing Communication industry (IMC).

As a marketing communication practitioner par excellence, Dr.
Shobanjo cut his teeth at the Nigerian Broadcasting Corporation, now Federal Radio Corporation, in 1964 as a studio manager. He left in 1971 and joined the American-Nigerian agency, Grant Advertising where he rose to the post of Deputy Managing Director before his 30th birthday.

He co-founded Insight
Communications (now Publicis Groupe/
Insight Redefini) in 1979 which has
now become an integrated part of the
Troyka Group, the holding company for
Redefini (the communication group for
Insight Publicis, Quadrant MSL, Media
Perspectives, All Seasons Media, LCC
and Leo Burnett Lagos). Meanwhile,
the Troyka Group has 4 companies
operating under it, namely: Insight
Redefini Limited, Serengeti OOH Limited,
Halogen Security Company Limited and
Black Onyx Properties Ltd.

As a believer in people, Dr. Shobanjo's business style has favoured a mentoring ambience which has spawned protégés who are leading lights of the advertising and marketing communications industry in Nigeria.

At each stage of his career, he has continued to create sustainable impact and influence. For example,

ABDUL SAMAD RABIU

Nigerian billionaire industrialist Abdul Samad Rabiu, CEO and Chairman of BUA Group boosted his profile in the world richest men raking as 574th richest man in the world, with an asset worth \$4.5 billion, thus positioning him as the 6th on the African continent, and the second in Nigeria.

Abdul was born in Kano in the north-western part of Nigeria, where he obtained his early education. He attended Capital University in Columbus, Ohio and returned to Nigeria at the age of 24 to oversee the family business. This was when his father Isyaku Rabiu, was being detained by the administration of General Muhammadu Buhari for allegedly not paying rice import duties.

He established BUA International Limited in 1988 for the sole purpose of commodity trading. The company imported rice, edible oil, flour, and iron and steel.

In 1990, the government, which owned Delta Steel Company, contracted

with BUA to supply its raw materials in exchange for finished products. This provided a much-needed windfall for the young company. BUA expanded further into steel, producing billets, importing iron ore, and constructing multiple rolling mills in Nigeria.

A few years later, BUA acquired Nigerian Oil Mills Limited, the largest edible oil processing company in Nigeria. In 2005 BUA started two flour-milling plants, in Lagos and in Kano. By 2008, BUA had broken an eight-year monopoly in the Nigerian sugar industry by commissioning the second-largest sugar refinery in sub-Saharan Africa. In 2009 the company went on to acquire a controlling stake in publicly-listed Cement Company in Northern Nigeria and began to construct a \$900 million cement plant in Edo State, completing it in early 2015.

Abdul Samad Rabiu uses the BUA Foundation for his philanthropic activities. These include the construction of a 7,000-square-meter paediatric ward at the Aminu Kano Teaching Hospital and the construction of the Centre for Islamic Studies at Bayero University Kano amongst several others.

was slowly recovering from the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Currently, the way businesses are conducted across the world has changed because we are finding ways to adapt to the post-pandemic norms. Various sectors of the economy are

gradually opening up and countries around the world are cautiously relaxing the restrictions that were put in place because of the pandemic. We also felt the impact of the pandemic and went through the challenges. It was a recovery process for the entire organization however, we have been able to maintain the lead within the sector by adapting to the changes ushered in by the pandemic and ensuring that we still give our customers the world-class and unparalleled experience that the Eat'N'Go brand is known for.

What will you identify as challenges that the sector had to grapple with in 2021?

In 2021, the effect of the pandemic forced some brands within the sector to shut down outlets and others could only operate at half capacity. The rising cost in food prices also did not fare well for the industry during the time. I think Nigeria seemed to be less touched by the pandemic compared to countries like the Uk, US, Netherlandand many other countries in Europe and Asia. We recovered very quickly although we had a very sharp downturn with the lockdown which caused us to make some very significant changes within the structure of our business and the delivery of our products. We were determined to keep the spirit of our customers and all stakeholders high during that downtime and by developing andusing different channels for service delivery, we were able to keep still give our customers the deserving experience. In the Quick-Service business, decisions are made very quickly and when wespeedily made the necessary changes, we bounced back significantly. I think a lot of businesses in Nigeria and globallyhad those same challenges. Those that were able to react swiftlywere the ones that had the best through the pandemic. The industry has now dealt with the challenges. The current growth in the industry was reported by Agusto in the 2021 QSR report which estimated that the industry grew by zero point two percent during the period. For Eat'N'Go, our optimism and our customercentric culture spur us to constantly evolve and develop new ways to better improve our service delivery.

Were there other challenges that the sector had to deal with aside from the COVID-19 that you would like to talk about?

Every society has its peculiar challenges and Nigeria does have hers. The period during which the EndSars protest lasted was quite a challenging time for us as it



was for every other business across the cities and towns in Nigeria. Just while we were getting out of the weeks of government-imposed lockdown to curb the spread of the COVID-19 virus, we were hoping to somehow get back to some sort of normalcy in carrying on business, the protest came running in with a bang and within that period, we lost five of our stores. For some months after the EndSars protest had calmed down, some of our stores didn't start trading because they were badly damaged during the protest. That entire incident cost us to lose revenue in rebuilding, repairing and fixing the damaged stores and even the personnel managing the stores. Interruptions like that which of course is not unusual in any society can adversely impact businesses. It was rather unfortunate that the EndSars protest came at a time when businesses were struggling to get on their feet. It was sort of a double hit in 2020but with the resilience and determination of Nigerians and Nigeria as a nation, we always find ways of rebounding and successfully, in some areas, the country has repaired from the hit. 2021 was a good year for Eat'N'Go. We were able to raise the second tranche of funds through the Public Debt market and I can confidently say that we are the first company to complete the full bond program. That speaks a lot about not just the growth of the QSR business in Nigeria but the strength of Eat'N'Go as a forwardthinking organization.

How will you describe your expectations for this year and going forward?

While preparing the 2022 budget in September/October of last year, we were

very optimistic about what this year would bring us. As part of the functions as the Chief Executive officer, I met with several high-level professionals in the banking sector to get their views on the financial state of the economy for the year. With that information, we put together a robust budget. So far, this has supported us in carrying out a good trade this year but we are also on the lookout for challenges as well. No one could have predicted the current happenings in Europe and its ripple effect would likely cause a stir across industries and economies globally and locally. The hike in the price of petroleum products particularly in the price of diesel, in Nigeria today is one way we feel the ripple effect. As a business that depends heavily on the consumption of diesel, the tremendous price change is part of the challenges we face because the current difference in price was reflected in our budget but we prepare for situations like these. This hike in prices will also impact the cost and supply of food in Nigeria. Not so long ago, I read an article about possible food scarcity in June his year amid the election season which is fast drawing close, it appears that the year may be challenging. The positive is that in our business which is the business of food delivery, people need to eat and we are a company that does not simply provide food solutions, we give an experience alongside. Although some challenges are looming around, we are that organisation that brings fun to the table and we would only get better at doing so.

As a brand that has continued to reinvent the wheel through innovation, what is Eat'N'Go doing to consolidate on previous efforts to

reposition the brand?

We like to begin with having an understanding of what the customers think of the brand. To get this right, we had to conduct research before and during the pandemic and currently,we are in the process of conducting another research project. We are a customer-centric organization so, it is all about what the customers are saying about us as a brand and as a service provider, what they think about our competitors and what they want us to deliver to them. When we look at our clients and fashion more innovative ways to better build our business to support our customers, it is their opinion that drives us because their opinion matters. As an entrepreneur, it is first best to think from the customer's angle then walk back to satisfy their demands. There are too many companies that think about what new product they want to launch, what customers will appreciate, particularly, what they as an organization want. At Eat'N'Go, we have a different drive and because we do, we look at what the customers want and develop on that.In the middle of the pandemic, when we did the research for Cold Stone Creamery, we got our customers' feedback from which we launched a whole new menu which we called the "More Love". It was indeed very successful. In 2019 when we relaunched Domino's pizza, it was evident from listening to our customers that they wanted more affordable products, small eatings and a bit more different toppings than already existed. For us as Eat'N'Go, it is most valuable to employ innovation to satisfy our customers. We also look at innovations that the customers may like but have not thought about and bring them to the market. Our recently launched Catfish Pizza is an example. We started the product in some test stores over a period and it was successful. This gave us the confidence to launch it as a national product and the feedback we have received so far has been positive. We want our customers to see that we are innovative and we would what no other brand would consider doing. I can believe we are probably the only pizza company in the world that have Catfish pizza. Although the idea took two years to think through and phantom how to could get it into a pizza, the idea came from simply seeing a Catfish farmer and realizing that it is a delicacy within Nigeria. This is the sort of innovation we want the Eat'N'Go brand to be known for. We will be innovative with flavours and products that people would never think can be done but that is still fun, different and are worth the conversation and worth trying.

How would you assess the growth of the company since it launched in Nigeria as the master franchisee of Domino's Pizza, Cold Stone Creamery and Pinkberry Gourmet Frozen Yoghurt?

It has been a fast growth. We now have 178 stores and we operate in two countries - Nigeria and Kenya as the master franchisee. We see that we will continue to grow within Pan Africa. Going to Kenya for us was a giant step, the first step into the international markets. Our first success was built in the Nigerian space where we were able to build a solid team. We have been truly lucky with brands and customers that want to try our products and were able to scale across Nigeria. Indeed we are lucky because many businesses have tried building their numbers and scaling the Nigerian market but they have been unsuccessful. We, on the other hand, do it conservatively and aggressively at the same time which most certainly sounds absurd but it is simply so because we look at a lot of data that helps us in deciding where best to expand. In addition to all of these, our stores are company stores so, we have a strong training and development program which supports our teams and allows us to develop people who stay with us for a long time, can properly run our stores and guard our business.

Last year, Eat'N'Go reached a milestone of over 150 stores in Africa after opening 9 outlets across differentgeographical zones in Nigeria. What are your business expansion plans this year?

Our plan is simple. Continous growth across Nigeria and Kenya. We have a plan to end this year with 210 stores and maybe more in countries we currently operate in. One this we are pretty excited about is our expansion of Cold Stone Creamery into the Ghanian market. At the end of 2022, we will be a Nigerian company with a Pan African outreach. That is what growth this year would look like for us.

How does your vision for premium food delivery alongside quality customer service align with your products?

The great thing about our product is that every customer can design what they want. We are a consumer-focused business and our products and services reflect that. We present several flavours, opportunities, and

options to our customers but in the end, we let them choose whatever they want to build that would satisfy their immediate cravings whether it is their pizza, ice cream or yoghurt. Our service is our niche and we are proud of it because we invest a lot in training and development programmes for our staff even before they can speak with our customers. We ensure that all new employees go through a minimum of 2 weeks of training before they are allowed to interact with any customer. This is the extent to which our customers are critical to our business. In Dominos Pizza, we guaranteed a 25 minutes door-step delivery but what is most exciting is that we are

going to up the ante this year. We have a target to be the first Domino's Pizza globally, to offer a 20 mins door-step delivery. Who would have thought you could do that in Nigeria?

Tell us about your CSR initiatives and how they have helped to promote your corporate brand-building efforts?

Starting with the last part of that question, our CSR is not about building the brand, it is about helping the children that we set out to help. We have chosen the Slum2School organization because we feel that we have a very similar DNA structure. We want to support children to get an education and be successful for themselves and society. We also employ people, provide training and career opportunities for our staff so they dare to climb the career ladder within the organization. With this, we are confident to promote from within the ranks in the organization. So, you can find a staff who started as an attendant and has grown to become a store manager and even up to becoming a regional supervisor. The reason we do this is that we are sure our team is properly trained and have imbibed the organization's ethics and structure which are what strengthens our brand. We had also started a school where we help support children to be enrolled to develop their skills and potentials and for the first time this year, we are employing some of these kids whom we have helped through high school. With this, we are not only helping the child but helping the country develop a better and more stable future.

What are your host community's impact plans for this year?

We ensure that every store we open works with the community. We employ from within the community and we have a community liaison officer within the communities we operate in. We also give back to the communities regularly by supporting sports activities, charity events and many others.

How is your brand responding to the accelerated shift to digital and technological penetration?

At a recent conference, I spoke of the speed at which the digitization of Africa is pacing with Nigeria taking the lead as one of the fastest-growing economies within the tech space. With this speed in mind, we are devoting our time and attention to digitising our company so that all functions and silos are digitally connected to be more efficient with providing the right services to our customers at the comfort of their homes, schools or offices using or various digital platforms. As technology improves, we will also improve with it so we can evolve with our service delivery and meet the changing demands of our customers.

How is Eat'N'Go positioned in the QSR category?

Within the Nigerian market, we are positioned at the top because we have worked hard to grow and expand our business. Not so many companies have had the aggressive expansion we have enjoyed in Nigeria and we have well-positioned our products and services. Across our business, we currently have over three thousand employees and eleven commissaries where we produce ice-creams, dough and pizza. We also have a fully integrated



logistic team and a distribution centre that sends our products across the country. I think we are well-positioned for growth and to continue taking the lead in the QSR industry in Nigeria. When a lot of businesses were concentrating on business growth, we spent a lot of our time building the infrastructure that will allow for business growth because, without relevant infrastructure, we will be unable to do the kind of expansion and scaling we are doing currently.

As a customer-centric brand, what are your plans to improve on your portfolio and value offerings this year?

First, our customers want a great product and we are focused onmaking sure we sellproducts that our customers can enjoy whether it is in-store or delivered to them. When they express satisfaction with the taste of the product from any of our brands that is valuable to us. Second, our customers want service. They want to know that when they walk into any of our stores, they are greeted and respected, their orders are taken politely and correctly and they get the right product. Third, our customers don't want to pay too much. So, we are focused on providing a lot of offers to our customers. This can be seen on our digital and traditional media platforms to allow our customers to gain access to our best deals. It is the combination of value for money, great service and great products that keep our customers always wanting and coming for more. We do all we can to deliver on all three to keep satisfying our customers and staying in business.

Nigeria's energy drinks market still volatile – Titilola Adedeji

Titilola Adedeji is Nigerian entrepreneurial Amazon and the Founder and General Manager of Amber Energy Drinks Limited. She is a dynamic Business Growth expert and a serial entrepreneur with vast experience in Negotiations, Building successful business models, Manufacturing, International Procurement, providing exceptional Customer Experiences and Managing HNIs.

Her company's flagship brand, Amber took the nation's energy drinks sector by storms in 2020 and inspired a paradigm shift and instant disruptions in the sector as a result of which the sector has not remained the same again.

In this exclusive interview with **FELICIA NWOSU** and **OGHALE ABIKELE MAFURU**, she reviews the Nigerian energy drinks sector, zeroing in on her product, its performance and projections into the future.

hat is your assessment of the Nigerian Business environment?
I think the Nigeria business environment is unique. It has a lot of pros and cons. Forthe pros, we have the number of people we need in terms of Nigeria's population. We have a resilient sort of people. For the cons, we have logistic problem, regulatory problems. I mean any problem you can think about, we have it in Nigeria, and so if you ask me how the market is, I think it is a very unique market

What is your assessment of the energy drink segment of the market?

As you said, it is a volatile market, and every day, new drinks keep popping up and we are grateful to NAFDAC, because they are trying to rid out the ones that don't' have NAFDAC registration numbers and even with that, it is a lot because everyone is looking to invest in Nigeria and not everybody understands the market. People just pump in goods and expect it to begood. We a people who are a majorly consumer country, so everybody is looking out to try something, and with that, we have to constantly stand in their face to tell them this is the best drink for you. The energy drink market, I will say, it's like a jungle

What are the major issues that the energy drinks market is grappling with?

The major issue is the deflation of the Naira, it is a major issue, and people want to consume but do not have the economic power to do that. I can talk about Amber brand; we stand on quality, so how do you weigh quality versus the people being unable to afford what you have to offer, so that is a big problem for us. Then you have logistics, constant stopping at the port and you have officials disturbing people bringing things in goods. There are delays and then lack of infrastructure. We cannot produce in Nigeria; we can't, because we don't have the infrastructure. Then, lack of maintenance culture, I mean, you bring something to Nigeria and the first thingan average Nigeria will do is to find a way to spoil it. How do you deal with these? We came to the Nigerian market and we are asking them, we want to do this; you have to help us to do

better.

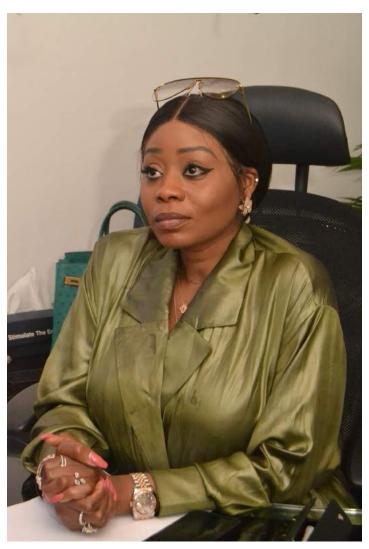
Tell us about the launch of Amber into the market and what necessitated your decision to venture into this?

It is purely our love for Nigeria, we love Nigeria, we love Nigerians and we think Nigerians deserve better. If you look at all the other energy drinks, they are not solely for Nigerians by Nigerian. Amber is, I will boldly say maybe the first to be made by Nigerian and for Nigerians. One because, we understand what the average Nigerian wants or needs and we are bent on not compromising on quality, because Nigeria has been known to be a dumping ground. You look at some of the drinks that come in, they don't pass through the right check to get into Nigeria, and because we don't have enough quality control, people just consume them. Amber wants to change that narrative, we want to ensure that Nigerians understand that we value them; we are not just going for a substandard thing because it is available.

How long have you been in the market and what is your experience so far?

We are a bit over 18 months. I think the Nigerian market has been very interesting, very challenging and very motivating as well. It makes us want to do more and better. In terms of when we just came in, we came in in the bang of Covid-19, everything was locked down, and everybody was depressed. We are knownas fun loving people, everyday happy moment, so we decided look, when everybody is down why don't we just tell them that we are here for you. If you look at our campaign, it says; Amber dey for you. It means that every step of the way, we are here for you. When wecame in, with few CSR activities, to help people boost their morale. At that time, lots of people have lost their jobs, they couldn't eat, we were giving commuters free rides home with free drinks so that they could refresh themselves as they go home, that was interesting. Then we got to the market and obviously no competitors, so we came in, and they were like who are these ones, unfortunately we are here to stay, so they have to deal with us.

What is your competitive advantage?



I will say it's our people and our product, the set of people that work with us, and the understanding of the brand. Our product is the best in the market and I dare say that, once you taste Amber, it is an immediate switch because we now realize that for us, it is healthy. We have reduced sterile level in it. We have Gurana which gives you a bye-product of caffeine, so the synthetic caffeine in it is reduced, because it is not healthy. Amber cares about the health of the consumer but many people don't care about the well-being of the consumer. We are interested in the consumer. We want them to live long to keep drinking Amber, because it is a legacy drink, so these are the things that we have put in place.

What more plans are you looking at in terms of projection?

That is our secret. I won't tell you that. What I will tell you is that we are a legacy drink, so we are here for the long run, so you are going to be seeing us forever and in terms of growth, we will ensure that we are constantly available everywhere and anywhere, just keep looking out for Amber everywhere you go.

Tell us on how impactful the Amber CSR initiative has been?

With all our initiatives so far, we have reached over 25 million people I will say, and Amber empowerment programme set to help people who are out of job or don't even have jobs, so this is supposed to help alleviate that stress, so we give you a trade

finance loan where you come, you sign up the app and we give you to the value of N100, 000 and we also teach you how to sell and you can then go and be a distributor and then be financially independent. We are looking out for the average Nigerian to be the best you can be while drinking Amber obviously.

How are you leveraging technology and of course to sell your brand and boost your equity?

For us, we make sure that we are available on every platform. Technology has helped us, because with just one click, you can reach the globe and everyone is apt in getting information. The consumer is also getting information from everywhere, so we are thinking, how we can ensure if we are relevant or not, so we are using the tools as much as we can to remain relevant.

Who is Titilola Adedeji?

I will say I am a God fearing woman, a serial entrepreneur, lover of people, and I am very resilient and very focused. I enjoy working. For me, It is all about work and ensure that I see smiles on the faces of people around me, however I can.

Are you also facing the challenge of forex, what do you think government could do to make business easier?

Obviously we are facing that problem, forex, i s going off the roof while Naria is going down. It is devaluating every day. The roads are not better. We are paying tax but not seeing the result of the taxes paid because, it is not any easier. Minimum wage is not nice, but thanks to Amber, we are good people, we try to make sure that our staffs are okay. I think the government should basically just do the basics for Nigerians, which are roads, security, and electricity first, and after that, we can build on it. If they can get the basic amenities right first, at least, we can say okay, we are seeing the results of the tax we are paying, once we get that, we can then start to advise on other things that we are dreaming.

Where do you see Amber in the next 5-6 years' time?

Pan-African, away from Nigeria, but we will start from Nigeria first

How did your background, training and the exposure you have acquired prepared you for this journey?

I always say this, every day is learning, every event, occasion or experience you go through is preparing you for tomorrow and the future. I am taking all my experiences and I am still learning from everyone, including my staff. Having an open heart and being resilient, that is the most important thing. For me, I think it is my resilient and my love for Nigeria and my believe in Nigeria, because Nigeria is actually a good place. If you sit down with Nigerians and talk with them, you will understand that they are actually good people. It is because of their circumstances and their desperation to live and survive.

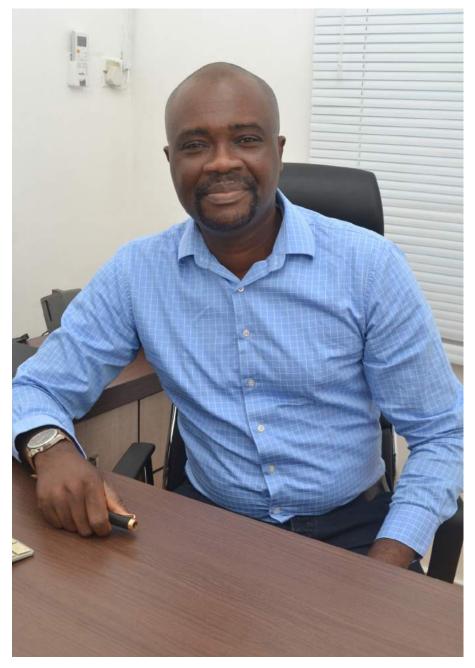

He spoke with exclusively with MARKETING EDGE recently. Excerpts:

hat is your assessment of the business

environment last year?

I would say that it was a lot better than 2020 because in 2021, we already knew what was up with COVID; we knew the impact it was going to have. So we were

a lot more prepared in 2021 compared to 2020. So, our plans actually aligned to the reality of COVID unlike 2020 when we did not know what was coming. As such, my assessment is that the business environment for those who planned was tough but not totally unexpected; it was not as surprising as what happened in 2020.

What were the Challenges you had to grapple with as a digital solutions company?

Perhaps I should start by saying that we should not forget Nigeria is still a Third-World country. So we have not really gone fully digital. When you live in Lagos, Abuja and Port Harcourt, you will think we are fully digital; but the rest of the country still struggles with access, with people just having basic access to internet and digital equipment.

As a business, because we a field force management automation system, we find that a lot of our customers who have field reps in far places still struggle with basic access and I think that is what we will struggle with whether it was a COVID year or without COVID. Third world countries struggle with access when it comes to digital solutions.

We have already built some things to manage our own platform. So you can work offline on our platform which means you can do your work on a digital device without having internet connectivity and anytime you get connectivity maybe when you get home, you can upload your information and we preserve the date stamp, the time stamp and location stamp for all your activities. So we solve that problem for our own platform; but it is a general challenge that all digital companies face.

How did you respond to those challenges?

One of the things we are proud of being a Nigerian company is that we built our solution to really suit our environment. We did not import the solution; it did not come from the western world. We looked at our environment and we said how can we build a solution to solve the problem that is uniquely Nigerian? When I mentioned that already built into our platform the ability to work offline, that is what that meant.

With our solution, you don't need to have internet connectivity to carry out your work. As long as you have your Smartphone, we enable you do your work offline and whenever you have connectivity, you can upload your

information and we preserve the critical information of that work for you. So the platform recognizes when you did, where you did it and all that.

Other aspects of the challenges with digital engagements in 2021 are that we used to have a lot of in-person engagement with customers all of which we obviously have had to move to online. As such, most of the meetings we have are now holding online. We rarely do in-person engagements anymore. But if we must do, we ensure we respect all COVID protocols. We are working more remotely now. We are engaging with customers remotely online. Almost all our meetings are happening on video-conferencing platforms unlike before when we used to go do demonstrations to you. This has also forced us to move a lot of our contents in terms of how our solutions work online. That way, we can point customers to howto-do videos and websites on how to solve some of the problems you are having.

In summary, a lot of things have been moved digitally and where we could not move it, we had to find creative solutions on our platform to enable people work remotely without being in-person.

There has been an accelerated shift to digital; how would you assess the impact of technology on your business?

I think the shift to digital would have happened with or without COVID. It was inevitable and eventually, the world will go digital. What COVID has done is to accelerate that process.

If you ask me in a comical way, it is actually a good thing for the world. What would have taken us 10 years took us two years to accomplish.

Remember that Papyrus came alive because we truly believe in the power of technology. We believe that there are so many things that technology could do to enable businesses to be more efficient, to get more insights into what is happening and impacting on their business. We choose the space of field work. Our platform is a field Force Management automation platform. Companies were investing heavily on recruiting sales people across the country and had no view or clue what those guys are doing across the country and the teams themselves had no digital solutions they could use to make their work easier. There are so many things in that whole space that makes it ripe for innovation and for technology to play a role. So with this platform, where you have a team of sales people across the country, it is clear you have view of what they do



every day. You know who their customers are who they are selling to; who they are talking to and what they are talking to that person for. You build that institutional knowledge about all your customers across the country into the company's database. Even if your rep in a particular territory leaves, the next person who goes there can read up on all that happened in the past and know where to take off from; to know the customers, their phone numbers, address and everything. You know all the products they have bought from you and literally everything that happened in the field. It becomes predicable, where your sales are happening, who your customers are, who your reps are seeing, who you need to be paying more attention to and things like that.

So when you asked the question around the impact of technology on our business, our business is premised on technology. That is the whole point. We saw that opportunity and we thought that it was something we should key into and we are glad that our customers are also seeing the benefits of moving in that space. Technology is all and all for us and we are happy with the way it has impacted our business.

As an innovative brand that

is constantly seeking new solutions for clients, FieldMax Pro is your flagship solution; tell us about its impact in the out gone year.

When I joined Papyrus, the mandate from the board was simple; it is to make the first Field Force automation system in Nigeria and we must extend to the rest of Africa as well. I knew it was not going to happen in one day, in one year; but that was like a long term vision of what we needed to achieve.

I have been surprised by a couple of things. For one, what I assumed to be pretty obvious and clear is not always obvious to a lot of people you engage. So it was not as simple I thought it would be.

That notwithstanding, we actually made quite some progress. We find out that we had to educate and handhold a lot of the potential clients; we have to bring them to a point where they appreciate and become aware of the solution to the challenges they are having with managing their field force. So, things that should happen in one week, we found them happening over three months and six months because there is a whole process of engaging the potential clients and for them to internally also come to the point where

they are able to commit resources and investment in this direction.

For some of them, their assumption is: this is the way it has always been and is always going to be. You are going to have sales reps in places where you do not know what they do and you rely on the report they send to you to know what is happening there. Then we show up to say there is a better way to do this and show you all that is possible. They are always wowed by what is possible and the next selling becomes how they can get their own management and board to commit resources necessary for them to invest in this solution and adopt the solution.

My happiness is that there is no single client that we engage that said no we do not think we need this. It has always been the case of we absolutely need this but we do not have the budget now, can we see how we can work with you over time and see how we can transition to your platform. So, it is a longer term, longer process than I imagined it to be; but I am happy we are making so much progress.

Also, in the course of the year, we started having activities in Ghana. One of our clients who has operations in Ghana took us to Ghana and we had to do some work there for them.

From my personal point of view,

therefore, the mandate I had was to create awareness for this service which we are doing effectively; and get more clients which we are getting. The numbers are looking very good; and more importantly to go international and we have started the process to move international with Ghana as our first stop. Hopefully, other countries will follow.

Just to summarize it: yes, FieldMax Pro is still our flagship solution. In the last year we have made a lot more progress than where we were the previous year. Have we gotten to where I thought we could have been? No, it turned out to be more challenging than I had imagined; but we definitely are making progress in strides beyond what I think the board thought was possible before I joined.

What is your projection for this year as a digital solutions company?

I think some of the initial signs for 2022 are looking like it is going to be a lot more challenging than 2021. Why do I say that? Suddenly it is looking like we are going back to square one with the Omicron variant of COVID. Companies are going into lockdown again. Companies that we thought have gradually opened up and begun to have normal operations are shutting down all over again across the world. Did we think this would happen? It was always within the space of what was possible. So we are not totally surprised.

What I am saying is that it is slightly going to be a repetition of what happened in 2020 and 2021 in terms of the lockdowns, the work from home, the reliance on digital platforms for engagements and things like that.

For FieldMax Pro and for Papyrus as a company, where do we think we would be? Let me start with the internal things we have done. The development teams have leant so much in the last two years. They have learnt so much in terms of what customers really need. When you imagine these platforms, you come up with concepts on how you think it should be but as you begin to engage customers and they give you feedbacks, you begin to learn how customers really want it to be; and over the last two years, the guys have really built an enhanced platform to align the solution to the feedback we keep getting from consumers in terms of what they really want. Internally, I think we have positioned and built the platform to reflect what the customers really want and I think that is always a good thing. Externally, what excites us is that our customers are seemed really satisfied

with the solution when they start using it. Of course, there will be bumps here and there that we need to fix but generally speaking our customers are very satisfied.

What we are noticing is that when they are satisfied, they talk to their friends and their friends call us and we are beginning to see people calling us to say: Where are you; are you the one providing this service for this company; can you come talk to us; let's see what you have; we might just need your service?

We think that when you come to that point; you are beginning to position yourself for growth. So we are excited when we get calls from people we did not even pitch to in the first place.

Therefore, 2022 is looking as a year we are going to accelerate our growth based on the fact that we have customers who seem to like our solution and are recommending us to others; and I think that is what the company is positioned for.

So, this year we are looking at accelerated growth and when that happens, then 2023 and beyond will be about consolidation and we will begin to move more international. We are pretty excited about the possibility of accelerated growth in 2022.

What are the new innovations your company will explore this year?

I like this question because technology never stands still; there is always something happening that you want to take advantage of. Let me speak into one specific area that has caught our attention and that we really are looking at closely. It is the machine learning and Artificial Intelligence to make the work of the field rep a lot easier. One of the things the field rep has to do when he is engaging a customer in a retail store, for example, is to check out if his products are on display in the store and to compare that with his competitors just to be sure that customers are able to see his products in the store. The way we currently do it is to go into the store and you count the number of your products that are on the shelves and the number of your competitors' products that are on shelves and you record that in the app.

Recently, we have seen the development that are happening around machine learning and artificial intelligence and we are beginning to develop a way for you to just point your phone at the shelf, take a picture of it and the solution should be able to tell you, your own products that are there, the numbers of the products there and those of your competitors.

It makes the job of taking an audit of

your product in a shop so much easier, faster and simpler. It is a new development we are working through and we hope that in 2022 we should have that solution ready.

Imagine a field rep who normally goes to a retail shop and had to physically count the numbers of his products on the shelf and enter that information, now will go there and just point his camera at the shelf and take a picture and the system will tell him exactly the number that is there and that of his competitor; and that is all he has to do. It just makes the work faster using technology to solve a seemingly difficult problem.

This is just one of aspect of us taking advantage of the development in technology to enhance our service. There are so many other ones we are looking at; but this example put a sense to how we keep looking at the environment, see what is possible out there and see how we can adapt that to our solution.

How is Papyrus ns Digital Solutions Company positioned in the tech space?

There is so much going on within the tech space. Lots of activities within the financial services space which we are not playing in; but there is a lot of innovation happening in that space but we have chosen to play within the space of field work because we thought it was right for technology to begin to enhance what is happening there.

Obviously, we are not alone. There are a lot of companies that play in this space. We will like to think of ourselves as the one that is out there with the most comprehensive solution in terms of how you manage a field force using technology in a way that makes it easy for the field reps to do their work and at the same time give management really good insights into how and what their reps are doing out there in the field.

We do not anticipate that we will be alone forever. We do not expect to be alone; but we think innovation will always happen and there will be people who will take advantage of that innovation. People will choose the space they want to play in and that with whatever technology solution that they have.

We will play in this space and we do not worry about competition because we think if we continue to build the solution to meet our customers' requirements, then there is no reason to fear anymore. You worry if you think your solutions do not meet your customers' needs because they only look out to find other solutions if they do not think that what you have is meeting their needs.

Thua, my constant worry is that Papyrus is constantly building and improving all the time to meet the customers need but speaking from the high level around technology and that whole tech space within Nigeria, it is heartwarming to see that Nigerians are taking to technology and, in my view, we are leading Africa and moving to the rest of the world what is possible with technology even from a Third-World country like Nigeria.

We must not always import solutions into Nigeria because those solutions are not built with the reality of our own situation. We always have to adapt those solutions to our environment, whether it is a payment system, a Field Force management system. Whatever system you want to build must be built with the clear view to solving our unique peculiar nature as a country or as a continent. So it is exciting seeing all the innovations happening within that space and all the people that are coming up with solutions within the space. Lie I did say, there are lots of activities in the financial system; but we think there are other areas and platforms to play and we have chosen one of those areas to play as Papyrus.

To what extent has the COVID-19 pandemic impacted your tech solution this year?

Not to the extent we imagined it to be. Because it is technologically based, it is easy to deploy, engage and use. The only area we think COVID-19 really impacted our activities is where the field reps in those communities who had to use this solution actually had to do physical visits to outlets like retail stores, hospitals, pharmacies or something like that.

Even in that area, it is clear that if you respect the COVID-19 protocols, you don't have anything to worry about. So the field rep is wearing a mask and is going to a customer who is wearing a mask and they are physically distant when they engage then, there should not be a problem.

The only aspect I think that has changed in my view is the engagements we used to have with our customers. Forever, meetings used to be physical. If you go to someone's office, boardroom, you all sit around a table. You debate and argue and agree. Now we all do that online. But in

terms of the actual business, the solution itself and how people are using it, I think the impact has been quite minimal. It's not something we have given a thought to in terms of worrying that it is impacting on our solution.

You became the CEO of Papyrus Digital Solutions last year, tell us the impact you have made in the company since you mounted the saddle

(Laughs) I will like to think that I have made a lot of impacts. I was a bit surprised at how something that looked obvious, like a no brainer... We had to take a lot of time to handhold a lot of companies to the point where they are committing resources to it; but I get i:. If you make your business plan for a given year and you do not factor in investment in Field force automation, for example, and then we walk in and make a presentation to you. You do not just turn around and say change the plan and the budget for the year and make the money available. There is a process you have to go through as well. It is clearly a long process.

Mind you, it is not a commodity we are selling. It is a service. Companies need to budget for it. So the engagements are positive because nobody has said we do not want or need your service. It is always about how do we re-allocate the resources of the company to accommodate this new paradigm that you are bringing to us.

Besides that, I am happy with the engagements; I am really happy with the team. My tech team is fantastic.

The commercial team is fantastic. Our customer support which I thought was weak we have really enhanced it now and we are able to serve a lot of customers. Our pace of innovation and pace of solving whatever comes up in terms of solution has really improved.

This year, going into 2023, I think the focus will begin to move to go international more aggressively than what we have done last year because we need to conquer Nigeria first; then we can begin to move to other countries. I think we are in a good place. At least the assessment from the board seems that they are happy with the work we have done so far. I report to them, and that is what really matters.

ow would you define innovation in this age of new normal?

he much-publicized MARKETING EDGE
Stakeholders Quarterly Virtual Summit, the first
for the year 2022, lived up to its billing as it was
yet another stellar outing for the organisation. The
Summit, which was a six-hour-long affair, had
participants glued to their screens as there was no
dull moment.

Approaching the theme, *Maximising Marketing Efficiency in the Age of Changing Consumer Behaviour*, from different, varied, yet interesting and educative angles, the presenters' mastery of the subject, delivery style, and audience engagement, did not allow for drudgery or boredom.

Kick-starting the Summit, delectable Oghale Mafuru, anchor, MARKETING EDGE on TV, introduced the two lead speakers, Vytautas Paukstys, Co-founder and CEO of Eskimi, Cherry Eromosele, the ageless matriarch of the marketing profession and one of the few CMO's in the Nigerian ecosystem and the moderator of the lead sessions, Emmanuel Agu, Group Marketing Director, Jotna Nigeria Limited (The LaCasera Company).

Mr. Paukstys' presentation was very interesting and straight to the heart of the matter. As a data cruncher by profession, he reeled out hard data to back up his submission that the digitisation of business is now a reality. The Eskimi boss, using current data and research outcomes, showed that digital spend surpassed the traditional. "Originally traditional brands are becoming digital, creative is going digital, all screens are going digital and brands are not only data-driven, but they are also looking for better ways to gather and access data and make them more actionable."

Bringing the data reality closer home, so the audience could relate to it well, Vytas, as he is popularly called, said that Nigeria has witnessed a dramatic increase in online penetration and usage. Giving details about the Nigerian digital trends, he said that internet penetration is around 53 percent and there has been a dramatic increase since the outbreak of COVID-19 with sustained increment. He revealed that 85 million Nigerians are online for at

least 4 hours a day, a huge captive audience that any brand would only ignore at its peril.

"It is a fact that more than 50 percent of Nigeria's population is online. How much of the media spend is online?" He asked rhetorically. "The truth is that consumers are moving to digital but brands do not follow... yet," he stressed.

The Eskimi boss continued: "Much of the marketing budget is already on digital; traditional brands are becoming digital-first. Basically, 50% of media consumption is online, and as a result, 50% of the budget has shifted online. Consumers have moved to digital; brands have been forced to follow."

Participants responded to the presentation by applauding Vytas. Some of the feedback include - "Awesome and insightful presentation," Tunde Bakare, "wow! Insightful presentation," Ibidunni Banjoko. "Insightful ... so impactful," Oyindamola Are. "Very good presentation and Impactful knowledge shared," Ehiosasumwen Tina Ojo. "Awesome presentation!" Felicia Okereke. 'Wow! Awesome presentation, thanks for sharing this with us," Abimbola Mohammed, and "Thank you, Vytas," Adedotun Adegbite.

Taking the baton from Vytas, Cherry Eromosele, Group Chief Marketing and Communications Officer, Interswitch and the second lead speaker gave a 360-degree presentation touching on the implications of the topic for the client, marketing communications professionals, and the customers. It was comprehensive in content, pedagogical in delivery with examples drawn from the Nigerian market, especially from what she did at Interswitch, even as her presentation became a vicarious experiential journey for the participants.

How, for instance, can one forget some of her opening statements like: "Marketing starts and ends with the customer", her averment that "Customers are now sophisticated and very demanding", or her didactic definition of marketing as "Making every spend count in a way that delivers consumer satisfaction and support business continuity?"

Mrs. Eromosele advised marketers to arm themselves with industry and market trends. The industry trends, according to her, are purposeful marketing driven by the ultimate and emotive 'why'; ability driven by speedy responses to consumer needs, and human connection and participation that enhance the consumer experience through meaningful engagement. The consumer trends include Convenience i.e. seamless shopping and payment; 'phygital' (fusion of physical and digital), Artificial Intelligence (AI), Virtual Reality (VR), and Augmented Reality (AR).

Throughout the presentation and almost with every statement and slide, she delivered marketing nuggets that served as reminders that participants were being facilitated by a Chief Marketing Officer that's worth her weight in gold.

The participants were so wowed by the presentation that they couldn't hide this in their feedback. "Let's give it to Cherry for an explosive presentation," Tobi Adekunle. "Great one, Cherry," Adedotun Adegbite. "Thanks so much, Cherry," Ralph Tathagata. "That was brilliant, Cherry. Great scope, great depth," Adedayo Adefila. "Thanks, Cherry. That was explosive!" Sirajudeen Animasaun. "Brilliant presentation from Cherry, lots of insights!" UC Aku, and "Thanks, Cherry, for this beautiful session," Ruth Boyle.

The session was moderated by Emmanuel Agu, the versatile Group Marketing Director, Jotna Nigeria Limited, makers of La Casera, who did a good job of coordinating the session and bringing out the highlights of the two presentations. He also complimented the presentations with brilliant infusions and nuggets for further crystallisation.

The second session which featured an impressive array of eggheads in the marketing communications ecosystem as panelists was coordinated by the indefatigable Maureen Ngwu, then Business Director but now the Managing Director, Media Seal.

Moses Mogbolu, Products Group Manager, Vitafoam Nigeria Plc, took the navigational slant in his presentation by advising brands to have the right marketing roadmap.

According to him, it is difficult to deliver results without the right roadmap. The best way to do this is by evolving with the consumer and global trends using technology as a navigational tool.

"Technology is driving us to an era where we need to evolve with the consumer behaviour, evolve with the consumer trends because the business that exists is the business that understands the need to be proactive. Marketers need to find out how customers define service excellence because it's all about their satisfaction," he said.

For Ilyas kazeem, Group Marketing Director, Eat'n'Go Limited, the man with professorial cadence and diction, marketing prioritisation is a practice driven by innovative solutions to client needs. He advised that every marketer should have an understanding of their customers, walk in their shoes, understand their trigger points, trends, and the role of their brands in the lives of consumers.

To maximize efficiency, he said: "Practitioners should know the tools, the trends and how to optimise all channels effectively, including open rates, click rate optimization with strong contents. They should employ storytelling effectively to drive customer affinity for better customer understanding."

On her part, Omotola Bamigbaiye Elatuyi, Head of Marketing at Pladis Global, highlighted that consumers are not static, noting that they are changing individuals that move along with a changing world.

"Marketers should set objectives to reach and engage with customers, develop suitable profiles to enable all devices and platforms," she said.

Noting that the customer journey is very important, she said: "Follow your customer from point A-Z, scale up what works and what doesn't work, and create meaningfully connected channels."

"Consumers will always find reasons to shift but marketers

need to go ahead of them to know what to do. Customers must be at the centre point of what all marketers do. Marketers should leverage the power of diverse analytic approaches, take advantage of people base marketing practices and make comprehensive reviews of their marketing performance," she concluded.

Hinging his presentation on the three perspectives of purposeful marketing, mobile imperatives, and efficiency-driven mindset, Adebayo Adefila, Head, Digital Strategy, Africa, PZ Cussons said these involve deliberate efforts on business planning, use of data, content, and media optimisation to attain marketing objectives.

For Adekemi Alegbeleye, Business Lead, Densu X Nigeria, understanding consumer behaviour is key to marketing. She said that consumer reaction is driven by motivation, need, or want.

According to her, consumers also react to media around them which is driven by content and technology. The changing consumer behaviour is however fueled by technology as consumers now have access to content across platforms and their choice of platforms is driven by convenience, relevance, and the need for interaction. Hence brands need to continue to evolve with the consumer and ensure that marketing needs are structured in a new way.

Emeka Obia, Lead Strategy & Planning, Leo Burnet, while harping on the impact of the pandemic on the evolution of consumers, affirmed that the online community is becoming increasingly critical with SMEs, smartphones, 3G, and broadband penetration being on the increase. He noted that there are a lot of opportunities in the online landscape and that brands must endeavor to move rapidly to that space to engage with them. He revealed that some of the themes driving the change are cryptocurrency, mobile population, influential social media, and the youth population. As a result of the rapid adoption of technology, expectations from the consumer's point of view are growing and that technology is fueling it.

Reviewing the Summit at the end of the day, John Ajayi, Publisher, and CEO, MARKETING EDGE said: "The overwhelming participation by players across the marketing communications industry home and abroad, the rich repertoire of the content generated and disseminated coupled with the passion and zeal exemplified by both facilitators and participants are silent feedbacks that we cherish. We appreciate and will reciprocate it while striving to better ourselves in the quest to promote the brand idea."

AAAN emplaces professional indemnity insurance for members

President of the Association of Advertising Agencies of Nigeria, Steve Babaeko has disclosed the Association is making plans to provide professional indemnity insurance for its members.

Babaeko, who made this disclosure in an interview with MARKETING EDGE, also revealed that the umbrella body has put together a 'robust' induction program for its newly admitted members.

He said: "Apart from the one-onone conversation that I have had with prospective members, the reach out program of our association is getting better. Our improved programs also make it more attractive to be a member of AAAN. For the new members we have a robust induction program and we also get them to be covered by the professional indemnity insurance we are about to put in place."

Addressing the issue of quacks in the industry, the AAAN President said that as for his association, measures are being put in place to prevent the influx of quacks into the ad industry.

"Not everyone that applies gets to be a member," Babaeko shared. "Considering that there are benchmark criteria that are set by the membership committee, those must be met before an agency is deemed qualified to join. Just pure quality control to ensure that we get agencies that are best in class."

It should be recalled that the issue of quacks in Nigeria's marketing communications ecosystem is a

longstanding conversation that has occasioned several disciplinary actions in a bid to curb their practice. On its part, to crackdown on charlatans and individuals parading themselves as professionals, the Advertising Practitioners Council of Nigeria, (APCON) announced its plans to introduce in April 2022, a new vetting regime which will permit only licensed advertising organizations to apply to the Advertising Standards Panel (ASP) for vetting.

In his final submission, the President revealed: "AAAN will continue to reach out to practitioners on the fringes of our association to join us before they get into conflict with APCON laws."

Nigeria's tax earnings decreases by 26% in Q4, 2021

he Nigerian Bureau of Statistics has stated that Nigeria's earnings from Company Income Tax (CIT) for Q4 2021 stood at N347.81 billion, a decline by 26.39% on a quarter-on-quarter basis from N472.52 billion in Q3 2021. This revelation was part of the bureau's report for February 2022.

Giving a breakdown of the income, the bureau indicated that local payments recorded were N258.85 billion, while Foreign CIT Payment contributed N88.96 billion.

According to the report, the decrease was the result of decreases in collections in some critical sectors of the economy. These include; administrative and support service activities (-72.15%); agriculture, forestry and fishing (-34.52%); arts, entertainment and recreation (-25.31%); education (-1.61%); financial and insurance activities (-5.52%); information and communication (-4.33%); manufacturing (-23.21%); and mining and quarrying (-7.56%).

Irrespective of the above, positive growth was recorded in some other sectors.

"On a quarter-on-quarter basis, positive growths were recorded in accommodation and food service activities (116.01%); activities of extraterritorial organizations and bodies (128.92%); activities of households as employers, undifferentiated goods and services-producing activities of households for own use (563.56%);

construction(33.32%); electricity, gas, steam, and air conditioning supply (84.68%); human health and social work activities (31.47%); other service activities (37.28%); professional, scientific and technical activities (51.47%); public administration and defense, compulsory social security (29.46%); real estate activities (17.99%); transportation and storage (2.04%); water supply, sewerage, waste management and remediation activities (26.08%); and wholesale and retail trade, repair of motor vehicles and motorcycles (13.91%)", the report stated.

In terms of sectoral contributions, the top three largest shares in Q4 2021 were information and communication (N51.05 billion) with 19.72%; manufacturing (N45.09 billion) with 17.42%; and financial and insurance activities (N31.06 billion) with 12.00%. Conversely, activities of households as employers, undifferentiated goods- and services-producing activities of households for own use (N189.45 million) with 0.07%; water supply, sewerage, waste management and remediation activities (N328.58 million) with 0.13%; and activities of extraterritorial organizations and bodies (N447.01 million) with 0.17% were top three lowest shares in Q4 2021.

However, on a year-on-year basis, CIT collections in Q4 2021 increased by 17.61% from Q4 2020.

Microsoft to empower 10,000 African startups

According to MTN, the new logo has been submitted to the Companies and Intellectual Property Commission (CIPC) for approval as can be seen outside MTN's offices near the 14th Avenue offramp to the N1 freeway in Johannesburg.

The new logo sees 'MTN' written in normal block letters and in blue with an oval of the same colour around it, while the Yellow background seems to be a lighter shade of yellow than the older logo.

In a statement, Nompilo Morafo, MTN Chief Sustainability and Corporate Affairs Officer, said the new look aligns with the group's evolution from a telecommunications company to a technology company.

"Our commitment and focus to accelerate Africa's progress sees MTN revealing a refreshed brand identity and campaign from 27 February," Morafo said.

The rebrand will be group-wide, and not just outside MTN's Johannesburg headquarters, according to the telecom giant.

5G network will become operational soon



Fifth-Generation (5G) network will soon be deployed and become operational as winners of licenses will be handed the spectrum between now and the next six months.

Aliyu Usman, Head, Space Services, NCC disclosed this at a dedicated panel session of 2022 AfricaNXT Technology Conference themed "Moving Forward Steadily: Socio-Economic Significance of Deployment of 5G Services," and held in Lagos recently.

Usman said the license confers 10-year tenure and a minimum of five sites for the licensees to deploy.

According to him, the commission would make the 5G spectrum available to the winners of the license within six months, which commenced from February 24, 2022, the deadline for the payment of the license fees.

He also disclosed that NCC is working with the Office of the National Security Adviser (ONSA) to develop a risk management framework, which would see that the commission creates a market for ethical workers.

During the panel discussion, the NCC team espoused further the advantages of the 5G network. Babagana Digima,

Team Lead, Nigeria Office for Developing Indigenous Telecoms Sector (NODITS), NCC, reiterated the fact that 5G will enhance mobile broadband, boost its offering by a 200-fold increase in mobile speed.

Digima said further that the network will accelerate both broadband and narrowband Internet speeds, which are currently, low in the country.

Explaining why NCC was not too stringent on earlier rollout, he said the NCC is aware and putting in place what is required to effectively explore the commercial benefits the service would offer. He said already, about one billion devices that would support the 5G network would be made available in 2022.

Aliyu Usman, Head, Space Services, NCC, shed more light on the advantages of the 5G network. He said the 5G network is smarter than the previous generations of technologies and would impact several sectors of the economy significantly. According to him, agriculture, education, security, and health sectors would benefit the most from the network. He, therefore,

called on, startups and the technology ecosystem to use 5G to create more innovations.

According to him, vulnerability test and security design architecture for the technology would also feature in the risk management framework.

He disclosed that telecoms sector CSIRT in the framework would also be instituted to check if there are threats to the network.

Furthermore, Tony Ikemefuna, Head, Fixed Network and Converged Services said 5G technology offers an extremely low latency rate, which is the delay between the sending and receiving of information. He said from 200 milliseconds for 4G, "we go down to 1 millisecond (1ms) with 5G. The network is even faster than the brain, which processes information at 10 milliseconds."

According to him, everyone will benefit from 5G, including the older people. He stressed that with the technology; there would be fibre-like connectivity, which will usher in a new wave of creativity in the country.

"The National Policy as adopted by FEC is apt because for years NiRA has been pushing for the government to accelerate the adoption of the second-level domain (. gov. ng, .edu.ng, .mil.ng) under the country code Top Level Domain (ccTLD.ng).

"So, what the Minister has done is commendable because the main objective is to eliminate the use of private emails for government business and official correspondences by the end of the year 2022".

Predicated on the need for all ministries, parastatals, and officials to jettison the yahoo and Gmail domain addresses to embrace the .ng domain, Rudman believes that adoption will strengthen public confidence in the use of digital technologies and participation in the digital economy. He explained further that the policy is in line with the implementation of the Nigerian e-Government Master Plan, approved by the Federal Executive Council in August 2018.

The Master Plan has the vision to create a world-class open and digitalized government that connects with people to drive efficiencies in public administration, the responsiveness of civil services, and transparency in governance leading to improvement of the quality of life of Nigerians.

Giving insight into NiRA and how

Digital is our current reality — Dr. Tayo Oyedeji

r. Tayo Oyedeji, Chief Executive Officer of Publicis Groupe/ Redefini Nigeria, has affirmed that digital is not the future, but the current reality of the marketing communications industry. He noted that people spend more time on their cell phones than they did a few years ago. He recalled that



agencies that believed digital was the future of advertising are now operating with a digital reality.

Speaking in an exclusive interview with MARKETING EDGE, the industry egghead, while affirming the role of digital in Nigeria's Integrated Marketing Communication (IMC) industry and a shift in media consumption, noted that Nigerian agencies are good at strategy, creativity, but still

struggle with implementation.

"I think, by far, we are probably the most strategic and most creative people in the advertising industry. The only place where we struggle is in the implementation. On the strategic level we are really good, we can be compared to the best in the world; on creativity we are amazing but sometimes the production behind our creativity hinders our creativity," he said.

Speaking on new insights that accelerated the shift to digital and its impact to the IMC industry, Dr. Oyedeji said people now

live their lives on the digital screens.

"A few years ago, we used to say that digital is the future of advertising, but our current reality is that people wake up in the morning and the first contact is their cell phones. People literally consume media on digital screens and the internet. So as professionals, the first thing we do at Insight and all our other agencies is to institute a model that we are no longer traditional in our mind set. We think digital first and then leverage traditional media because for people, digital is number one."

According to the agency boss, at the planning stage, digital used to take between 2 to 3 percent of the whole budget, but now it is getting close to 30 percent of the whole budget as brand owners are beginning to see that people are digital first.

"Yes, when I came in 2010, digital had two to three percent of the whole budget; right now it's getting closer to 30 percent. Brand owners are beginning to understand that people are digital first and our job as advertising professionals is to know where the people are. So, digitals just help clients to reach their consumers in the digital space from social media to everything that has to do with the media," he revealed.

Speaking on what will drive adspend in the year 2022, Dr. Oyedeji said: "I think the largest source of spend is going to be technology, primarily because it has the potential to scale anything and everything. We are beginning to see scale even in Nigerian finance."

He hinted that his agency has just started a digital only agency, which is its first stand alone, digital agency in Lagos.

Brands cling to first-party data as third-party cookies phase out

In order to mitigate the challenges that accompanied the extinction of Third-Party cookies, the digital advertising ecosystem has been seeking an effective and result-oriented approach to access consumer data for marketing campaigns. Oti Ukubeyinje, President of the Association of Digital Marketing Professionals and VP Product Marketing and Growth at Terragon Group, revealed that

brands are beginning to take the bull by the horns by leveraging first-party data to optimise marketing efforts for sustainable revenue growth.

Ukubeyinje said further that the clamour for no thirtyparty cookies was necessitated by the overwhelming call for consumer privacy. This has led to digital advertising shifting from third-party toward a privacy-driven approach. According to him, investing in first-party data is, therefore, a strategy that brand owners are enthusiastically willing to explore.

"For brands to survive there will be a continuous push for First Party data. So, brands will increasingly invest in building direct relationships with consumers that they can interact with on an ongoing basis without relying on third parties, world gadgets or other platforms."

While affirming that the first-party data avails brands the opportunity

to understand their customers because it is based on actual interactions with your brand across the vast array of consumer touchpoints, it offers the types of insights that enable them to recognise, relate and respond to customers in more meaningful and valuable ways.

"If you check FMCG brands and banks, there is a race to get to your first one million owned first-party data that you collected with the consent of consumers so you can advertise to them through non-advertising channels. So, you go deeper into messaging and communication instead of advertising.

"Brands will increase investments in tokens to create a value exchange system between themselves and consumers. So how do I create interesting tokens and currencies so that the more you interact with my brand, the more I reward you beyond the core product so we can have a relationship?"

Ukubeyinje advised digital marketers to be more strategic and innovative in their value offerings to sustain relevance in the face of the push for privacy and as well as other challenges in the digital space.



Oil prices soar as West mulls Russian crude ban

s the United States and its
European allies are discussing
a ban on Russian oil imports,
industry analysts are of the view that this
might bring further spike in the prices of
oil. It is believed that a ban on Russian
oil could push prices to \$150 per barrel
all-time high as it hit more than \$130 per
barrel recently following rumours of a
possible embargo of Russian crude oil.

"A boycott would put enormous pressure on oil and gas supply that has already felt the impact of increasing demand," analysts from CMC Markets said.

Anthony Blinken, the U. S. Secretary of State alluded to this when he told NBC, "We are now in very active discussions with our European partners about banning

the import of Russian oil to our countries, while of course, at the same time, maintaining a steady global supply of oil."

"The goal is to isolate Russia and to make it impossible for Putin to finance his wars," European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen told CNN on Sunday. "For us, there is a strong strategy now to say we have to get rid of the dependency of fossil fuels from Russia."

Europe is heavily dependent on Russian gas and crude. There is therefore the need to seek an alternative source of fuel for Europe. The willingness of European governments to explore the ban option could be interpreted to mean that a viable alternative has been found.

Meanwhile, U.S. Congress is also

working on its own set of sanctions targeting Russian oil, even though the United States imports roughly 200,000 bpd of Russian crude and about half a million in refined products that may be difficult to replace because of sanctions against Venezuela and Iran.

Analysts are however warning that a ban on Russian oil would push prices even higher.

"Prices are likely to rise in the short term, with a move toward \$150 a barrel not out of the question," the analysts also said, "Such a move will put further pressure on global economies, pushing inflation higher, leaving central banks debating how quickly rate hikes should be implemented."

"PAN has already signed deals with leading Chinese companies, Chery Automobile and Higer bus company, which specialise in the production of passenger cars and commercial vehicles.

"Cherry is a leading manufacturer of sport utility vehicles and sedans, while Higer is a reputable producer of mini and city buses," the automaker said in a statement.

"We have a wide range of exciting new products ranging from pickups, buses, sedans, Suvs, and ambulances which will be produced in our plant to serve the needs of the important segments," the statement added.

PAN stated that the assembly of multiple brands at its plant would increase capacity utilisation, create new jobs, and promote local content development.
