Embracing trends, changes in the marketing landscape

arketing and marketing communications industry are undergoing profound transformations driven by technological advancements, shifting consumer behaviours and regulatory changes. Embracing these changes, staying abreast of global trends and adopting innovative strategies, remain the surefire means agencies and industry professionals can position themselves for success in an ever-evolving digital landscape.

From prioritizing privacy and authenticity to harnessing the power of data, video content, influencer partnerships, Artificial Intelligence-driven solutions and other tech-driven innovations, the key for brands and businesses to stay ahead lies in embracing change, adapting to new realities and delivering exceptional experiences that resonate with consumers in the second half of 2024, and beyond.

As the Q2 of 2024 draws to a close, a lot of changes are being recorded in the advertising industry. According to a new forecast from ad media giant GroupM, global advertising spend will grow 7.8 percent in 2024 to \$989.8 billion and increase a further 6.8 percent in 2025 to \$1.1 trillion. The updated estimates are up from a December 2023 projection for a 5.3 percent ad gain this year.

Following the expected momentum, the industry will surpass the trillion dollar milestone in 2025, one year earlier than previously forecast by GroupM. The report also stated that Digital ad gains will be the engine of growth in 2024 and 2025.

What's more, advertising spend is forecast to grow by 5.0% globally in 2024, according to the latest dentsu Global report, a mid-year update examining major shifts in ad spend by geography and by media channel across 56 markets. Overall, an anticipated \$754.4 billion will be spent worldwide by the end of the year. This increase year-over-year is not only more rapid than the 2023 forecast, which projected 3.3% growth year-over-year.

The report added that, in the top 12 markets, inflationadjusted growth is projected at 2.6% in 2024 (vs. 5.2% at current prices), as media inflation shows signs of coming down but remains high, especially for TV and sought-after digital video formats such as social video.

The 2024 dentsu Global Ad Spend Forecasts report further highlighted that digital is expected to remain the fastest growing channel at 7.4% to reach \$449.3 billion and 59.6% of global ad spend. Substantial ad spend increases are forecast for retail media (+32.0% YOY, 17.7% three-year CAGR to 2026), paid social (+13.7% YOY), and programmatic (+10.9% YOY), while paid search (+7.7% YOY) and online video (+6.7% YOY) are set to maintain strong growth. Although its share of spend was predicted to slightly contract to 22.5%, television was forecast to rise by 2.6% and attract \$170.0 billion in investments in 2024. Growth is driven by spend in connected TV (+24.2% YOY), as streaming platforms ramp up their advertising offerings, and is currently enough to counter the decline in broadcast television spend (-0.4% YOY).

While print advertising spend is forecast to continue to contract (-2.6% YOY), the other media channels are expected to increase in 2024, with out-of-home growing by 4.2%, audio by 0.4%, and cinema by 4.8%.

In Nigeria, however, the value of advertising industry rose to N605.2 billion in 2023, from N216 billion in 2018, according to the latest PricewaterhouseCoopers' (PwC) report. The report compiled on behalf of the Advertising Regulatory Council of Nigeria (ARCON) and various advertising industry associations, outlined the advertising sector's contribution to the country's gross domestic product (GDP), its value, and its multiplier effect.

PwC projected that the advertising value will reach N893 billion by 2028, in the report titled 'Economic Contribution of the Marketing Communications Industry to the Nigerian Economy'. The report stated that the top three contributors to advertising spend between 2018 and 2023 were cable television (25.5 percent), digital media (18.5 percent), as well as creative and content production (13.4 percent).

The report highlighted economic pressures, regulatory reforms, and competition from global players as challenges faced in the industry.

Also, the study said rising digital trends, opportunities for local and international partnerships, the ability to leverage technological innovations like artificial intelligence (AI) and big data analytics, Nigeria's large and culturally diverse market, and the potential for innovative, locally-tailored marketing approaches are some of the strengths of the industry.

Nigeria's advertising industry value hits N605.2bn - PwC



The value of Nigeria's advertising industry rose to N605.2 billion in 2023, from N216 billion in 2018. PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC), which made this known in a report compiled on behalf of the Advertising Regulatory Council of Nigeria (ARCON) and various advertising industry associations, outlined the advertising sector's contribution to the nation's gross domestic product (GDP), its value, and its multiplier effects.

PwC projected that the value will reach N893 billion by 2028.

The report titled 'Economic Contribution of the Marketing Communications Industry to the Nigerian Economy' was unveiled on recently by ARCON.

Femi Adelusi, chairman of the multiplier study committee, who presented the report, said for every N1 spent on marketing communications in Nigeria, the nation's GDP increases by N16.5.

"The marketing communications sector has emerged as a formidable economic powerhouse. The study estimates that for every N1 spent on marketing communications in Nigeria, the nation's GDP increases by a staggering N16.5 – a multiplier effect that highlights the industry's substantial value contribution," Adelusi said.

He said the projected N893 billion by 2028 will contribute "a significant 1.08 percent to Nigeria's GDP, up from 0.7 percent in 2023".

The chairman of the committee also noted that the top three contributors to advertising spend between 2018 and 2023 are cable television (25.5 percent), digital media (18.5 percent), as well as creative and content production (13.4 percent).

"The proliferation of cable TV, driven by its diverse content offerings and affordable package options, has captivated a wide consumer base," he said.

Additionally, the surge in digital media spend, fueled by increased internet and mobile penetration, as well as the rise of social media and videoon-demand platforms, has reshaped the marketing landscape," Adelusi said.

According to Adelusi, the popularity of smartphones, social media engagement, and the appeal of real-time online content is improving the influence of creative and content production.

"The investment by video-ondemand platforms like Netflix and Amazon Prime in Nigerian productions, particularly in the thriving Nollywood industry, has further bolstered this segment," he added.

The report highlighted economic pressures, regulatory reforms, and competition from global players as challenges faced in the industry.

However, the study said rising digital trends, opportunities for local and international partnerships, the ability to leverage technological innovations like artificial intelligence (AI) and big data analytics, Nigeria's large and culturally diverse market, and the potential for innovative, locally-tailored marketing approaches are some of the strengths of the industry.

PwC outlined key recommendations to accelerate the industry's growth and development, some of which are creating specific, measurable goals for the sector's GDP contribution, encouraging strategic alliances among industry players, and utilising analytics tools to track spending patterns and consumer behaviour meticulously.

Commenting on the report, Olalekan Fadolapo, ARCON director general (DG), stated the need to quantify the industry's size and impact as an economic enabler.

"We cannot continue to guesstimate the size of the industry. This report lays the foundation for us to assess the advertising space and its multiplier effects on the economy every year going forward," he said.

Fadolapo mentioned that the findings of the report underscore the industry's paramount role as a catalyst for consumer demand, business expansion, employment, and innovation across sectors.

Nigerian Creative economy to add \$100bn to GDP by 2030

he Nigerian Creative economy is expected to contribute a whooping \$100 billion to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by 2030.

This was stated on Tuesday by the Minister of Art, Culture and Creative Economy, Hannatu Musa-Musawa while addressing the large gathering at the 2024 edition of Ojude-Oba festival held in Ijebu Ode, Ogun State.

The Minister revealed that the eight-point agenda she introduced in the ministry is already driving the pursuit of the projection.

According to her, one of the things they considered in terms of potential of the industry was its ability to create an economic expansion. She disclosed that her team came up with a very ambitious goal of trying to contribute at least \$100 billion to increase the GDP by 2030 or 2031, and this has the potential to accelerate economic growth.

Speaking on the rationale behind the creation of the ministry, Musa-Musawa explained that President Bola Ahmed

Tinubu created the ministry with the aim of diversifying the nation's economy.

"The president is committed to diversifying from our normal means of revenue, which is oil. In that diversification, he created this amazing ministry – art, culture, and the creative economy – the first of its kind in Nigeria.

"When I got this job, I decided to approach it from a ground zero point of view because I really felt that not much had been done in the space, to create a fortifying sort of industry-specific structure.

"The basic things that are needed to put a foundation were not there, so we approached it from a ground zero perspective," She noted.

Also touching on her eight-point agenda, the Minister stressed that the agenda centres on making Nigeria a global creativity hub, engaging in skill acquisition for members of the industry and capacity building so that they will be better positioned for job creation.

She highlighted capacity building/ training of individuals across the sector; public-private partnerships (PPP) for



infrastructure renovation/construction; partnerships and collaborations; job creation; GDP contribution; cultural heritage; soft power; and stakeholder engagement as part of the agenda.

On job creation, she hinted that her ministry is hoping to create at least two million jobs by 2027.

In her words: "Part of our own mandate is to engage the younger demography in almost everything that we do. This is all part of job creation, and I have all my agencies pursuing that goal."

She however revealed the plans of this administration to establish creative hubs in the six geo-political zones of the country.

He added "This award is for Nigeria and

we are happy that as an Exco we are able to put Nigeria on the global map and this is the first time we will receive such an award. We hope to receive another one next year. We understand that the reward of good work is more work and we are pledging to do more ".

Recall, that the association launched an annual brief writing training and competition targeted at young brand and marketing managers with the goal of infusing new creative methods in brief writing and improving the efficiency and effectiveness of campaigns. The winners were showcased at the ADVAN Awards for Marketing Excellence.

Launched in 2010, the annual Presidents Awards of WFA recognises initiatives run by national industry associations that help advance the marketers agenda and contribute to positive change in the marketing industry and society.

Other 2024 winners are Union des marques, France: Oneframe, bvA, the Netherlands: The NMO Listening Survey, SverigesAnnonsörer, Sweden: Campus Marketing, ISBA, UK: Responsible Retail Media Framework" and ANA, USA: AIMM Diverse Media GrowthFronts.

Advertising, Public Relations, and related services market on track to hit a trillion-dollar valuation

The advertising, public relations, and related services market is poised to reach a monumental milestone, with its valuation set to hit a trillion dollars. MediaFuse-Dentsu Nigeria empowers young talents for global competitiveness, says Okeke

MediaFuse-Dentsu Nigeria **empowers** young talents for global competitiveness, says Okeke

Emeka Chris Okeke, Group Chief Executive Officer, MediaFuse-Dentsu Nigeria, is not your ordinary run-offthe-mill professional. He is a distinguished professional in the world of Integrated Marketing Communications, (IMC) having made an *impressive impact in that* industry. Okeke's wealth of experience and pedigree in the IMC space are evidently robust and impressive. He successfully led the network in Nigeria into winning numerous awards and recognitions, both locally and internationally, and a *key promoter of the Dentsu* network in Ghana where he is a Director and Shareholder.

In this interview, Okeke speaks extensively about MediaFuse-Dentsu Nigeria, especially its feats at the Young Lions Awards, as well as the future of the IMC industry and other sundry issues. Excerpts:





an you talk about Cannes Lions where some of your talents won awards while

others will be part of the jury; and what is the implication of all of this for your agency?

The Cannes Young Lions competition, as you know, is an academy where young people and young talents are encouraged to make entries and compete with the works they believe are outstanding. It is also an offshoot of Cannes Lions, and therefore, our young talents competed in three separate categories, which are the creative, precisely on design and won. Representatives of Dentsu Creative Nigeria won the best design for the Young Lions Academy competition.

Similarly, a hybrid media team from Dentsu Performance Nigeria and Dentsu Location Services Nigeria entered the media category and competed for best strategy and innovation and won. Stephanie Ume and Joseph Uwandu teamed up to make this happen.

It didn't stop there, Dentsu Agyle, a content and production agency of our network under the leadership of Marian Ogaziechi competed in the film category and won with an outstanding production they did as a CSR for the Rotary Club regarding Club Foot.

As for the implication, there is the cost implication which I don't like because it means that all the winners will have to go to Cannes. This is because the Young Lions organizers over the years had stated that every team that won would have to attend the Cannes Lions itself to compete on the global stage. Thus, we're sending these six youngsters to Cannes this year. They are all going, if visa permits, to make a strong army of eight members of staff to Cannes this year, from our group here in Nigeria alone.

Essentially, they will have access to those key events. They will have access to the Hall of Fame where the best of works are showcased, and they're going to compete on some projects during the competition at Cannes. That's the kind of stage we want to expose our young talents.

We are therefore proud to say that, this

reinforces what we have been saying that we are not only a media agency network. We don't compete only as a media agency network but as a total marketing communications solutions provider.

In Nigeria, we offer full services through our media agencies (Carat, Iprospect, Dentsu X, Redstar International) with specialized service agencies in content, (D'Agyle Systems), Digital Marketing (Dentsu Performance), and location services (Dentsu OOH) as well as Integrated creative services (Dentsu Creative).

Interestingly, Dentsu Creative in less than five years already has its work competing with established creative agencies and going as far as having a major national indigenous brand shortlisted for the Cannes Lions Award in 2023.

Dentsu Creative Nigeria is today the creative agency of the year for the justconcluded Pitchers Award with two grand prix awards and numerous gold, silver and bronze medals.

In the past, digital agencies used to be apathetic about

international appearances, awards or competition; but recently, it's like there has been a kind of renewed excitement, a new interest in international competitions and global creative contests. What would you say is responsible for this?

I don't think it's a lukewarm attitude because they know what being on the international stage means; and the prestige that comes with it. But two or three factors do work against their interest.

In the first place, it is a case of " the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak". The flesh in this context is resources; and resources here means the talents to deliver a globally competitive work.

The makeup of the Cannes Lions Jury, for instance, is largely "Snow white " as some people would say. What this means is that the culture of the people judging the works at Cannes is completely different from where we are coming from. They don't understand Africa and therefore, if you have been winning Gold and Grand Prix within the local space here, and your creative bent is about local culture, it would be difficult for the jury at Cannes to understand you. Cannes is very global but far less Afrocentric than European, Asian and American.

With this in mind, creative works from Africa will need to be truly outstanding and ready to break diverse cultural prejudices to make an impact at the Cannes Lions Award.

The second thing is cost. If you have to enter for Cannes, you will pay in Euros. If you have to travel, you have to either buy the Platinum, the Gold, the Silver, or the Bronze tickets, which you also pay for in Euros - hundreds and in some instances, thousands of Euros depending on the size of your delegation. You have to pay for flight tickets. You also have to feed your team to attend the Cannes event. Above all, you have to enter for works that are really competitive; and be able to speak and break the clutter of pervasive excellence that the Award is known for. Really, it's like walking a very tightrope. You must stand out; and you must appeal not just to your base, but to the international creative community, to win even a broken Bronze.

Unfortunately for Nigeria, we haven't had any indigenous brand that has won the

Cannes Lions award given the constraints in the marketing landscape in terms of priorities of local advertisers.

If you want to create works to take to Cannes, you have to struggle between what the brand priority is in Nigeria, Nigerian audiences; or whether the brand will be able to navigate that thin line between global acceptability of the work and cultural acceptability.

This is why the combined effort of Dentsu Creative Nigeria and Dentsu sub-Saharan Africa put up a very good showing with the Trophy DNA campaign which was shortlisted for the Cannes award in 2023.

For the first time, a Nigerian brand was shortlisted out of the Dentsu Creative Nigeria and Dentsu, Sub-Saharan Africa stable. This is a remarkable feat for a young creative agency that is less than five years old.

Anecdotal to the above, is the fact that creative agencies need to get the opportunity of clients who will want to put in the money to go the whole hog and create a piece of work that can compete internationally.

So, as part of our efforts to prepare for that grand stage, we believe it is not only the creative directors and business directors that should be sponsored to Cannes and therefore we're investing in these young people to attend the Cannes Lions Festival this year, aside from their senior colleagues. The truth is that the more we expose them to international best practices that win awards, the better for us and the market at large.

What you just said reminds me of a new development at Loeries where some Blacks are raising eyebrows about the dominance of white sentiments in their judgments. Do you see the need for the protest? How justifiable?

Again, you would have to look at that from the lens of the global space and the cosmopolitan foundation upon which the Loeries was founded. Loeries came out of South Africa and we know the South Africa's image of a rainbow nation; and therefore it would be difficult to have pervasive indigenous Afro-cultural contests at the Loeries, even though you have the Black African population in the majority.

For me, the Loeries is our mini-Cannes and it would be important to retain the diversity, the cosmopolitan nature and the sophistication that it shares. The moment you dilute it to one culture, it will lose that appeal of international standards, and of a competitive creative award. For me what we need is a creative protest in all aspects of contest and not only at the Loeries. It should also be taken to the Cannes Lions Festival. To stage a successful creative protest will require Africans to tell our stories in a manner that we don't lose our local essence, but also in a manner that should appeal to global creative diversity, which appears to be a complex code to hack.

Cannes and Loeries are not only for international brands. I want to see the day when a brand from Nigeria would compete in SA, Cannes, the UK and in the Middle East, etc, and win. The reason this may not happen so soon is that clients here are not too adventurous with what they want the creative community to do with their brands beyond the bottom-line objectives. It's a delicate balance to keep. But it is up to us (agencies) to keep lifting our game and telling our stories in the language, and more compelling creative manner that will help the stories resonate across creative civilisations and cultures.

How did you really manage the 360-degree transformation of your agency which first started as a media agency because this can be very difficult for some people?

I have been asked this question several times and I gave the same answer. But what probably I missed in earlier responses is that where MediaFuse-Dentsu International is today as a network in Nigeria and part of the global network, Dentsu; was part of the founding dream and the vision of the company.

I came from a media agency background as you well know in the industry; but I asked myself a couple of questions when I was setting out to start Media Fuse Limited. I reasoned that if the annual marketing budget of a client were to be a hundred naira, how much does a client spend on media versus how much the same client would spend on other arms of marketing communications? And it turned out that in my back of the envelope



calculation, the client will spend about 85 percent of his budget annually in multimedia communication channels.

That led to a second question. For a client, what should be more of interest between the one who spends 15 percent of his budget and another who spends 85 percent of his marketing budget? I will leave it to you to guess the answer, But I am sure that your guess could be as good as mine, in the given circumstances.

I realised also that the structure of the market has a role to play at the time we launched our services. The market was structured in such a way that every media agency came, and built on the systems that came from known creative agency networks. There were a few occasions in this market when a media agency was a stand-alone, and non-aligned to any of the established networks. However, we did some backward integration to bring full creative, full production into our full content, full tech, full performance and full media offerings. So, what we simply did was to say to ourselves that over the five years of launching our services, we would not take profit from the business but reinvest all the money into developing the other arms of the communication practice because in reinvesting, we would need talents to drive our new service offerings, we would need office spaces, we would need training, we needed to travel to find partnerships, and glean experience from some of the best global practices.

Yes, we started with the media also knowing that having robust media accounts would give us access to robust creative, and digital opportunities which we leveraged.

It was therefore not too difficult for us to say to the client, besides the media, we have capabilities that will change how you approach the market. Give us a trial on this and see what we'll do. The clients gradually started inviting us to pitch their businesses for our new service offerings. So, we started with the closest one to media which is digital creative and digital content.

We succeeded with Isobar on the digital creative but realised something was missing: We needed to go and play in the above-the-line traditional creative side of the business. We opted for partnerships to access talents to bridge the gap. To consolidate our gains, in October 2022, we decided to merge Dentsu Mcgarry Bowen and Isobar into a hybrid creative powerhouse, that houses both digital creative capabilities, creative content, tech creative capability, and robust consumer insights which are required in a forward-looking creative agency in this space, supported by data from our media practice.

Talking about the young Lions that are going to Cannes, Some of these guys belong to the Gen Zs, how are you able to manage their eccentricity?

One thing I have said in some interviews in the past is that my generation in marketing communications is the luckiest. This is because we are what I call the Bridge generation. We were trained by the conservative professionals who cut their teeth in advertising from some of the best global advertising networks that have been around for generations. My generation ushered in the rapidly evolving digital ecosystem. We know clearly what the digital-world is looking for. We had the benefit of proper training in the traditional, above the line way of marketing communications and therefore in a position to fit into the two worlds and add value to the changing landscape. We just happened to be here when the evolution started, to become the Bridge between conventional marketing and the fast-paced world of digital ecosystems powered by data and technology.

That's why I call us the Bridge Marketing Generation. So it's easy for us to understand what the GenZs need, and how they think, better than the people who trained us. It is also easier for us to understand the devices they're using and what they want to do with the devices than the people who trained us and therefore are able to accommodate their eccentricity and adapt to the changes they want to embrace.

Dentsu Agyle Nigeria thrives on driving media innovation - Ogaziechi

Marian Ogaziechi is the Managing Director of the Dentsu Agyle, an agency under the MediaFuse-Dentsu Nigeria Holding Company. In this interview with Seun Johnson, she explains how the agency drives media innovation, trading and investment management to ensure their clients are constantly ahead of their competition.

hat is the inspiration behind the contest for this global competition by some members of your team?

First, these are young people, very talented people, and very restless people. Dentsu Agyle as a media innovative powerhouse allows them to explore and excel. We have been creating meaningful content, and we have a current movie that we're shooting for a brand. When the opportunity came, I asked a couple of them who are working on that account to see if they could try their creativity, their talent and a couple of things that they have learned from filmmaking. They did very well. They were very passionate about it. They wanted to do it.

I'm very happy that they won that category and we're the only ones representing Nigeria in the film category.

How did your team approach the creative process from concept development to execution?

Apart from the fact that they had the willing spirit to do it and to conquer, one of the things that came out clear for them was that they understood the creative process - that research is very important in



carrying it out because we had never done anything of that nature (Club Foot). They had never done anything like that so they researched and wanted to make it real. The brief was for them to come up with a video campaign on club foot.

So they took their time and did good research which helped the entire process. It was the bone of a lot of things that they did. They went to the hospital, researched, and interviewed those required. It wasn't easy but at the end of the day, the execution was seamless because they took their time to understudy the orthopaedic clinic that manages Clubfoot and I would also want to thank the orthopaedic clinic because they were very collaborative.

So, they understood the roles of research, collaboration and making good films from a creative standpoint.

Could you give us insights into some of the challenges they encountered and how you were able to overcome them?

They encountered a couple of challenges in trying to get the right patients who were willing to do interviews. These were not just patients, they were people who were experiencing the issue around clubfoot, their kids and their parents. So we had a little challenge trying to get them to accept to grant the interview. They also had challenges trying to convince the hospital and also trying to get the necessary approval, because it is a Federal Government medical facility. But of course, at the end of the day, they surmounted it. Challenges help you get stronger.

What is the significance of this laudable feat for your agency and the creative industry at large?

For me, it's a great deal. It's a great deal for us because this is the first time that we are being represented. Not just for the team in Nigeria, but I think for the team in Africa generally. This is the first time that people from the Dentsu Agyle team, the amplifying team will be represented at the Cannes Lions.

It's a big deal for us. It's also a big opening for us. There's something about working and not getting recognised and not getting rewarded. It doesn't encourage people. It's an encouragement to all the work that we have been trying to do. It's a major feat for us and I would say that we're very excited about it and we hope that this will be the beginning of great things that will come out of the Agyle team.

In what way do you think it will impact your brand's reputation and market presence?

In a couple of ways. Clients will now begin to see the kind of work we do because we've been pushing media innovation. We're developing a couple of properties as regards content and film. This would help us begin to do the case study around what we can do, and what we can offer our clients and also, it will begin to give us the credibility that we deserve for all the work that we have been putting in that sector for the past years that we've been operational.

This is going to open a lot of doors for us and we are very grateful for the opportunity. We are also very happy for that win. Of course, that's why we're in business. We're in business to make profit. We're in business to provide solutions. So this will be like a case study for us to also pitch to our clients as well.

What are some of the innovative strategies adopted in the campaign that contributed to this success?

I think it's basically storytelling and creation. Telling stories in a way that is believable and also our competence in terms of filming and research. Our competence in terms of full production. End-to-end production in itself, research and also the tools that we use as well. Our tools help us a lot with talent management, storytelling, production and getting the right resources as well.

Going forward, how do you intend to build on this success for future projects?

I attended a seminar some time ago and they said the reward for good work or successful work is more work. So, the truth is we're going to be doing more. We're going to be recruiting more people and our focus will be to solve clients' challenges. We are out there to provide media innovations in a solutions-driven manner for our clients. But we're going to do a lot more. And you are going to be hearing about everything we're going to be doing.

What's your management philosophy in grooming young talents?

My philosophy is everyone has to be involved. No matter how young you are, everyone has to be involved. Collaboration is the key to everything that we do. So we don't sideline, we don't underestimate because the truth about it is that, the younger generation are the key to most of the successes that we record here. Because they are younger, they are open to new ideas. They are open to taking risks and they are very hungry to succeed.

I like to involve everybody. Everyone has to be involved and collaboration is always the key to success for us.

How capital-intensive was the Cannes venture? Do you have any plans for further amplification of what won you that award? Also, having said that you always ensure that every of your brands is kept ahead of the competition; and with the plethora of brands under your belt, how do you do that for every brand?

I will start with the first question. Of course, with unstable forex, tickets are very expensive. It is an expensive venture, but you know, we're in a business of human service. I call it human service because it's the brain that works here. We're not buying, we're not selling. And if you're not able to invest in your people, you're not able to stay ahead of others. So for us, it's like training. And you can't equate the value of exposure in people, in building people, in building intellect, and also in growing your staff from an intellectual point of view. That's one. It's an expensive venture. But we're not complaining.

Then, on how we keep our brands ahead of their competition, we constantly do that which is why we pitch and win. I don't think that we have so many brands - because we want more. We're very ambitious people. And this way is the solution because we have the right resources. We have the right capabilities. We have the right support in Nigeria, outside of Nigeria and Africa, and in Europe as well. So we have the right people.

At Dentsu Creative Nigeria, we bring excellence in all we do - Adekola

What is your management philosophy in grooming young talents?

Going forward, how do you plan to build on this success for future projects?

We foster internal "friendly" competition to keep creativity flowing beyond our current projects.

What were the core cultural traits that inspired the team to achieve this major feat?

Personal success and continuous learning are vital. Our weekly knowledge-sharing sessions encourage the team to share information and skills. In the communication industry, understanding various perspectives is key to connecting with different audiences.

What role did collaboration play in achieving this feat?

Collaboration is essential. We leverage the diverse skills and perspectives within our team. Before finalizing any work, we seek feedback from colleagues to ensure it resonates with a broader audience.

What is the significance of this laudable feat for the agency and industry at large?

This win signals a reawakening in the industry despite the brain drain. It shows that young, eager talents are stepping up and thriving, sending a positive message about the industry's future.

What's your message to young creatives out there?

hat is the inspiration behind the context for this global competition by members of your team? We have the ethos of ensuring that we do great work. However, it is not enough. You must put your work out there so that an independent and impartial body will be able to encounter and judge it, to be sure that you're doing great.

So, it's imperative to ensure that the work we do meets global standards for us to enter it

in a global competition.

How did you lead the young talents to excel in the contest?

Leading young talents is about mentorship and ongoing grooming, supervision, and training. The company provides a fertile ground for ongoing training, exposes young talents to opportunities, and gives them challenging tasks to do so that they can develop themselves. To answer your question directly, what we do is actually applied learning and experience-based learning whereby we provide an enabling environment where young people can come, learn new things, try out the ideas they have, and jointly help the clients succeed.

What were the key creative strategies employed in the campaign that contributed to the success at the Pitchers Award?

There are different categories for the award. There is the creative bit and there is also the media bit. So, this is a lot in line with the media execution. There is a bit of creativity in media, but the core focus is on media. What we try to do? We ensured that we had innovative media ideas.

Media has gone beyond radio, TV, press, out-of-home, and digital. Media is how you engage with content daily. And you will agree with me that people, as consumers, do not consume media in silos.

I'm sure when you were on your way to this place, a lot of the things that you saw were communicated to you. And that is how we redefine media. We brought that level of creativity to blur the lines of traditional kind of media deliberation in a manner that cut through the clutter to ensure that we can reach the target audience for the campaign case study at every moment of their day. It's to ensure that the campaign will resonate and help the NGO - that was the beneficiary of the case study - to achieve its key objectives.

Would you run us through how your team approached the creative process from concept development to execution?

I would have preferred the people who did it to do that. But I will try to do that

without taking credit for the amazing work that they've done.

What we did was to provide an enabling ground for them to bring their innovation to bear. However, this is what they did. When you get this kind of problem, the first thing you try to do is to understand what the key objectives are. When you understand that you have to map out a plan for achieving the key objectives. And they did that beautifully.

They identified what the NGO's objectives were and identified the most cost-effective, efficient, and creative ways to reach the target audience or key stakeholders to ensure that the objectives were met.

How were they able to do that? They had to do proper segmentation and mapping. They were able to map out audience clusters and define their demographic and psychographic needs. And we were able to target each of these clusters with specific and bespoke strategies that helped them reach each target audience.

It wasn't a one-size-fits-approach. It wasn't putting out something for everybody. It was undergoing some sort of segmentation that led to the mass personalisation of campaigns in a manner that spoke to different audiences. It was more effective and it hit at the heart of the matter.

Can you run us through some of the challenges you encountered during the process and how you were able to overcome them?

Part of the challenge was that you typically need a lot of data to be able to do this. If you don't have data, you'll not be able to do the deep dive, the segmentation, or the psychographic analysis. The good thing about it is that at Dentsu, we invest a lot in data. Though it was a challenge, it presented us with a unique opportunity that the young people were able to leverage to give themselves an advantage in the process.

What is that unique thing that sets your campaign apart from other entries in the same category at the competition?

What set us apart was part of the things I've discussed and what I will treat. Part of the things was that it was born out of consumer insight, deep understanding of the consumer or the stakeholder. It was not just a mass campaign. It was a campaign that was specific and tailored to people. Hence, it was a lot more resonating. And it was backed by empirical data. That was the thing that gave them an advantage in the competition.

Can you highlight any innovative or unconventional strategies used in the campaign that contributed to the success at Cannes Lions?

What we did was to ensure that we did what other people did not do. And that is to go the extra mile in terms of audience understanding. Now, audience understanding is the bedrock of any campaign that you do. But typically, a lot of people don't go into understanding the in-depth motivation for behaviors. So, it wasn't like we did something unconventional. It was that we went far and beyond what was written down to dive deep and understand the consumer a bit more. That way, the campaigns were a lot more resonating.

Going forward, how do you plan to build this success for future projects?

So amazing! This helps us to know that we're on the right track in terms of the investments that we are making in people data and tech.

For us, this will accelerate the investments that we make to ensure that the work we do keeps meeting and exceeding the standard set. And it will be beneficial to our clients, the category, and the country at large. If we do great work, a lot of clients that are not in Nigeria will want to invest in Nigeria in terms of output. In the marketing space, Nigeria is not renowned for doing a lot of creative work. And it means that the investments in terms of production, in terms of creativity, goes to other places. The more we put our people on the map and do great work, the more it pays the country and this industry. And automatically, it benefits us and our clients.

You just said that Nigeria is not yet renowned when we talk about creativity, which is a bitter truth. What can the critical stakeholders do and how fast should they do it to put Nigeria on the global stage of creativity?

There is no shortcut for excellence in anything that you do. Now, why our people in this part of the divide have been able to do what they are doing is that there is a drive for excellence, to do things the right way, to do things properly, and to put their best foot forward.

For us here, that hasn't always been the case for various reasons which we will not get into.

Now more than ever, we are in a global marketplace of ideas. You are not competing with somebody in Niger Republic or Kenya or Ghana. You are competing with people from everywhere in the world that look like you and me, but happen to reside in London. They are black people like you and me or white people. They are humans who have access to cutting-edge technology and can do the things that you are doing cheaper and better than you.

For a long time, we have already defined competition narrowly as agencies in the country. So you will win local awards because you're competing with yourselves. It's imperative for us to redefine who we think our competition is. Our competition is the global creative capitals of the world which include London, Dubai, New York, the Madison Avenues, etc. We need to start benchmarking the work that they do. If you don't do that, you're only going to remain local champions because your frame of reference is local.

Now, is it possible? Yes, it is possible. Tech is not a means of differentiation. Africans have unique perspectives and unique stories to tell that people all over the world are interested in. We need to tell our stories well. We can't out-tech the first-world countries. Even though we are competing with them, we need to change the rules of the game. India is doing quite a lot in terms of creativity, but they are using locally relevant things to elevate their creativity. So, it is incumbent on us to define who our competition is and use our locally relevant stories to elevate the creative narrative.

CREATIVE AGENCIES MUST TRANSFORM WITH RAPID INDUSTRY CHANGES - UFOT



CREATIVE AGENCIES MUST TRANSFORM WITH RAPID **INDUSTRY CHANGES** - UFOT



No brand can consistently remain top-of-the-mind in the market without a constant touch by creative agencies. In this seminal interview, **Mr. Udeme Ufot**, the MD/ CEO of SO&U Group shares creative industry insights and solutions with MARKETING EDGE. Excerpts.

hat are some of the noticeable dynamics or shifts that you have observed making waves in the marketing landscape?

We live in a rapidly transforming world and the marketing communication landscape has not been immune to those transformations. Today, we have a world without media borders where marketers can engage with consumers from anywhere. We have a system where media as we used to know it has changed. We also have practitioners who are not exactly as we used to know them.

As we move forward, we also have a situation where artificial intelligence is coming into play. We do not know for sure how far it will go, but what we thought was just a matter of grappling with digital platforms has become something to contend with.

So I see a world where you must have very dynamic practitioners, where you need to have very smart people and professionals who are prepared to embrace technology to optimize the performance of their brands and communication activities. It is a rapidly transforming world and


agencies must be prepared to transform with these changes that the industry is experiencing.

One thing I can tell you for sure is that we've gone past that era of having traditional agencies and digital agencies. Instead what we have today is a convergence of the digital and traditional space. Any agency that claims to be either purely digital or traditional is at a risk.

I can also tell you that there's hardly any campaign that SO&U goes into these days without bringing together diverse platforms and disciplines that have to do with traditional and digital.

How much growth would you say the Nigerian advertising has

attained over the years?

Has it really grown? Well, one cannot say the industry has not grown. I don't have the figures right away. But you need to understand that even in the face of that growth you will find the challenges of inflation and devaluation of our currency.

The challenge we face is an economic situation where, in numbers, the market has shrunken but, in real terms, activities have grown and agencies have been more active.

There are new players coming in at different levels and, of course, the key marketers still expand their budgets.

But one thing you must also note is that those budgets may not be seen in the traditional space because there are more digital engagements. So, I would say it has expanded but not in terms of what we would expect in the old traditional manner.

What would you describe as some awaiting opportunities in the remaining part of the year, if there are any?

There are always opportunities. I think the challenge is for agencies to be sufficiently close to the brands they work on, to know what those brands have to offer to their consumers and also be close to the consumers to know what they really want, what makes them tick.

The job of the agency is to bring the brand and the consumer together, and once we build a love affair, a nexus between

the consumer and the brands with what they want to sell, there are infinite levels of opportunities that we can see. Opportunities are up to agencies using their creativity to discover and, of course, explore.

Do you foresee Fast-Moving Consumer Goods (FMCGs) categories shifting from mass to kind of niche brands as a result of the inflationary challenge?

I will say to you that they are already shifting. The challenges of the marketing environment, the tightness of the budgets, the kind of accountability being demanded of marketing directors will inform the need to be more focused on what delivers the most optimum independent budget.

I'm sure if you scan, you will discover that in the last two years or so, you may not see the kind of broad campaigns by FMCGs which you saw five to ten years ago.

The brands are becoming more focused and activations and visual activity is becoming the order of the day. When you add that to the current situation, especially what the multinational marketers are facing, with the kind of report we have heard about their financials in the last year caused by the Naira devaluation, it will take a while, maybe the next two years, for us to begin to see strong investments, except for the very strong FMCG marketers. There will be more of the niche because the marketing director must deliver accountability, and engaging the consumers one-onone is more likely the way to go as you can be accountable for it.

Earlier, you mentioned technology and Al being strong factors in the industry; how can professionals re-imagine branding in the new age?

Well, technology is there to make you better, faster and more effective. The first step is for marketing communicators to embrace technology and to understand the creative ways they can use it to optimize their performance. At the very basic levels, we can see what the Internet alone has done for businesses and for advertising.

A few years ago, we needed to deliver disk drives to media houses to run our campaigns. But today you can conclude the work, whether it is a print communication or a television video and, at the click of a button on your laptop, send it to anywhere in the world for deployment.

I still recall when we ran certain campaigns and people had to stand by to fly to Maiduguri to deliver the materials. I think a very interesting world awaits us, and what we must do as marketing communicators is to embrace it by understanding what it can do for us and how we can use it effectively.

How would communication leaders across the sectors play a more proactive role in identifying and telling strategic stories to keep up with the changing times?

The first step is that marketing communicators need to be more professional in what they do. They need to put in place clear strategic framework for delivering their work.

The days of innate or intuitive communication strategies, or creativity are gone.In fact, we are at an advantage where there is so much information now at our disposal. We need to take advantage of such information to be able to craft narratives that can speak directly and resonate with the target consumers.



It is about stories that the consumers can connect with and see themselves in, and, of course, be willing to take the kind of action we expect them to take.

We must focus more and more on how we want to make the consumer feel, because actions are driven by emotions. You know, once you can extract the right emotions from the consumer, the right actions will follow.

Still on storytelling and communication; each season we see advertising messages receiving backlash, how can professionals mitigate against this trend?

Ufot: The approach to communication must go by certain principles. I mean, telling the truth, being guided by certain levels of morality that will not offend the audience receiving the communication. The Advertising Regulatory Council of Nigeria (ARCON) by its Advertising Standards of Practice (ASP) has rules for mitigating that. But the truth also remains that safe advertising never cut through the clutter. Communicators, especially in creative advertising must be prepared to push more professionally. Of course, we do need this decency of what will not offend the public. Advertising in itself is, in a way, cultural because communication is cultural. We know the things that are acceptable to our society. So, when we want to communicate, we must communicate within the framework of what our society holds dear.

That's why media advertisers, when they create communication, are sometimes fair or objective enough to say, look, for certain parts of the country where there is more acceptance of Western values, certain kinds of communications are deployed for the brand. But for the same brand, in those parts of the country where the cultural and legal sensitivities are very critical, different adaptations of the same work are being created to reflect the values of specific communities.

It is important, therefore, that in crafting communication, those who know the people should be part of it. That is part of the reason ARCON and its new laws have put things in place to ensure that creative works are conceptualized and produced by Nigerians for Nigerians, as much as possible.

Some professionals hold the view that there are more agencies than brands in the industry. Would you say the dearth of brands is the cause of intense rivalry amongst agencies within the ecosystem?

I think it is a double-edged sword. We certainly could use more of the big brands. I recall an industry colleague once lamented, and it was even before the entry of AB InBev, over the brewery market. And you can see that over the years, apart from AB InBev coming in to become the third heavy contender, the other big players have actually mopped up the small players. So we have a very narrow brewing market.

If you look at other FMCGs, how many companies are producing beverages or family cereals in the country? Others are all imported. What that does is to offer for us a very shallow market. Even when you want to distribute the brands within one big FMCG player, how many agencies have the opportunity to play there? I think the entire economy itself needs to be more sophisticated because advertising thrives in a high quality, highly sophisticated marketing environment.

Maybe part of the dearth of opportunities has to be linked to the fact

that our economy is not that sophisticated.

Let's even start from the government itself. In other markets like the UK, the biggest advertiser is the government. So hiring foreign professionals or a bunch of guys with their briefcases who claim to be marketing or PR professionals doesn't help our industry or the economy either. If we sit down to calculate the kind of budgets that are being spent on these not so professional approaches, you would be amazed.

Let us even go beyond governments. How sophisticated are the average entrepreneurs and businesses in Nigeria? Do they really believe that they need marketing communications? We need to grow in sophistication and in numbers also. But I do believe that what we have at the moment can offer marketing communicators much more than what we are getting.

Anyway, even when or if there are more clients available, more breweries, more telcos, more manufacturers with lots of money, there will still be competition.

Something I learned very early is that everybody will just choose to work with the top three or the number one player in any sector. So what will happen at the end of the day, even if there are a hundred brewers in Nigeria, there will still be stiff competition by the top agencies.

Do you foresee intense mergers in the future?

That's a big question. A merger is a marriage and unless, as in some marriages, a young lady is forced into a man's home, that is not exactly a marriage. But, in business mergers, that will come from two consenting partners deciding that it will be to their advantage to come together and optimize their potential. That will be driven much more if in the one plus one they can hope to get is three. It will also come in a situation where the owners of the businesses will put away egos and the personal mindset of "it has to be my own". People must choose to stoop to conquer. It's about mindset and I do not think that advertising itself has really done a lot of sophistication in Nigeria.

You can even see that in the banking sector that is relatively more sophisticated, mergers have not been easy. I have had the privilege of working for some of the banks that have been very masterful in mergers and acquisitions, and I am aware of the struggles, the intrigues that have played out by those who were acquired. Not even by the owners, but by the workers of those banks who resist the merger. So it will call for a lot more sophistication, a lot more understanding, a lot more big-heartedness for us to see agencies come together in mergers.

However, I want to see the entire mindset evolve to a point where Mr. X and Mr. Y, both running thriving agencies, come together and say, guys, you know what? My company is strong when it comes to creativity, but we do have some challenges, maybe in strategy. Your agency is weak when it comes to creative products, but so powerful in strategy. Can you imagine if we pull together, what we could do in the industry? So we are talking here of one plus one becoming even four, maybe even five. That is a level of jump



or leapfrogging that we look and think of, but unfortunately, I'm not even aware of anyone moving in that direction.

The sense of ownership is too strong. People just want to own things. I think it's an African or a Nigerian thing for us, and it definitely has to evolve.

In today's marketing ecosystem, consumers are becoming more aware, craving for more healthfriendly products. How can FMCGs tackle this challenge?

Well, you can see me smiling. I am smiling because some recent survey indicated that whilst most human beings claim an interest in healthy habits and healthy foods, in real practice, that is not the case. Marketers have jumped on the bandwagon that the consumer is health- focused and have launched products that are supposedly sugar free, low sugar, and whatever that they believe is in interest of the consumer.

Many of these products have struggled because there is insufficient depth in the market to give those products or those brands they've been working on a fighting chance. So everyone talks about healthconsciousness, but it's a different thing in practice.

Marketers that look in that direction would simply have to be forced, and this happens all over the world when you are playing in a niche market. What you need to understand is that a niche may not give you the kind of depth that your business needs to survive.

And you have even the capacity to run a business on such a niche because there are limitations to growth. But, my advice to marketers is that they need to look carefully before they leap. Many things are very nice to see, nice claims to make, but in reality, it is not exactly what we think it is. Does this have to do with the consumer's purchasing power? No. It is about consumer habits.

Different brands have launched extensions that spoke to me to be more health conscious. The consumer has seen strongly that it is socially correct to talk about health foods and healthy habits. Maybe it is more practical in the western world. But, in this market where day to day the consumer is faced with more challenges, the basics that the consumer needs to survive is not even there, not even affordable. Maybe the point you made can be true that sometimes affordability is key. The consumer will take what is available. But, dieting and health foods in the African market actually is the least of our problems.

On regulatory standards, what would you suggest the industry to do to enhance its standards of practice?

Ufot: If the industry runs without rules, it can't be a profession. If there are no rules that inform how practitioners run their trade, there will be anarchy. Even at that, I must admit that the rules must come with a human face. We need to put in place laws and regulations that support boosting the industry, because without successful practices, without successful agencies, the regulator will have no work to do.

Having said that, a lot of dialogue needs to be done between the regulator and practitioners. It does not help anyone where certain sections decide that a certain law is not favoring them and choose to boycott or run a war.

I think as responsible professionals, if there's disagreement with rules of practice, we can come to the table, discuss it and point out how the rules are affecting the viability of our businesses and what can be done to mitigate such challenges. I am afraid that if we don't do that, all we will be having is anarchy and confusion. At the end of the day, the injustice will not be redressed and we will suffer from lack of rules.

For it to be a true professional body, we need to accommodate the rules of the regulator.

Your renowned agency, SO&U Group, an affiliate of M&C Saatchi, has just been appointed as the new marketing partner for MTN with effect from January, 2025. What would you say sets your agency apart for this distinctive recognition?

Late last year, a regional big pitch was called for the MTN business across Africa. It was run out of South Africa. But, of course, the Nigerian market, considering its importance to MTN, was considered a key market, as well as the francophone Africa. M & C Saatchi decided to participate in that pitch and invited us as the local affiliate in Nigeria to participate, or partner with them.

We were involved in the pitch process itself and had a special focus on Nigeria, considering its importance to the



country. Whilst M & C Saatchi focused on the regional pitch process in South Africa, we are required to come up with recommendations for special projects in the pitch process that was focused on Nigeria.

That is the part we played. And we are happy to say that in partnership with M & C Saatchi Africa and with our Côte d'Ivoire partner agencies, MTN did find it more attractive to partner with our affiliate agencies and invited us to participate. Actually, having won the business across Africa, we have had the benefits of enjoying part of that action.

What does this signify for SO&U, in terms of repositioning going forward?



I think it's a matter of great excitement and joy for us. You may remember that about 15 years ago, we were one of the first agencies with TBWA\ Concepts to work on MTN. During our 5-year run on the business, we did some really, really exciting work, if I may say so myself. Unfortunately, in a pitch process, we lost the business at the height of our performance. You can imagine such a piece of business coming back to us. It provides exciting challenges for our creative juices. It gives us the opportunity to relax the kind of things that we did with "O Jerry!, with "Life is Beautiful". It means, of course, that with that size of business, our agency needs to be prepared to amplify its resource base. It will be very exciting for our creative people to do the kind of work that they enjoy

doing, and the ultimate joy is to do great work and see it in the public space.

MTN is the kind of brand that has the projects and the will to put their work in the public space and will support and correct you to be your best at what you do for them. We look forward to that. I believe that it is very exciting times ahead for our agency, for the entire M & C Saatchi Africa. We look forward to January 2025 to get on the road and on the show. That sounds exciting already.

Would you provide our readers with an overview of your company's product portfolio?

We have been doing quite some interesting work, but we have a larger product portfolio when it comes to the group. When I talk about products, I need to mention that it is about the products we offer or the clients and brands we work for.

Let me start with the product portfolio in terms of what we offer to our clients. SO& U Group is an integrated marketing solutions group, one of the few in the industry that is so well structured with different disciplines that cater to a 360 degree offering to our clients.

We have SO&U itself as an advertising agency, and merging the best of traditional advertising with digital amplifications. We have SOULCOMS, which is our PR and acquisitions agency. We offer PR activities, activations, and experiential. That is what they do.

In contemporary business environment, you need to combine

effectively the soft sell with the hard sell. We have our production company, Lucid. So a lot of the productions we do are done by it and the business has actually become so sophisticated.

We have our media agency, Maxi Media, which is involved in strategic planning and buying. And then, of course, we have our latest digital agency, Virus. They all have quite a roster of clients of their own and have been doing some very interesting work.

When I look at the brands that we work and have worked for, they are more telefaceted. Of course, we have worked for the age-old Access Bank. For 8 years, we worked on Globalcom and remained one of the longest agencies on that business. During that period, we did some great outstanding, award winning work for the brand

We worked for Guaranty Trust Bank from inception and did work that helped to entrench that brand in the minds of consumers and have helped to fuel its growth almost 34 years after.

We still work for Access Bank. We are one of the leading agents on FirstBank and we still do some work for them.

We've worked for PZ Cussons. We do work for Unilever. We launched, Rexona and worked on that for quite a while in terms of activations.

We work on CFO. We launched Toyota last year in Nigeria, and we are set to do more new product launches for them this vear.

Reliance Healthcare HMO is one of our key clients.

We launched a new CST last year. It is a Cameroonian client. One of the biggest brewers and bottlers in Cameroon that is into Nigeria and the work for that client is more of the tactical, flanking strategy from the east.

Before we let you go, would you tell us what stands you out in terms of principles in your own career trajectory?

Integrity is key. Integrity means being true to yourself. You innately do the right things at the right time, and ensure that in dealing with other people, you do unto others as you have them do unto you.

You do not want to have yourself in a situation where being a brand yourself, once your name is mentioned, sudden negative reactions occur.

For that reason, integrity in my

personal and business dealings is critical having a good name.

But that also starts really fundamentally with a sense of self discipline. All of us can choose to be in a bit on the wild side. But I think it is self-discipline that makes you do the right things at the right time, no matter who is watching, no matter where vou are. That has worked for me.

A sense of passion for excellence has also helped me to weather the storms. But when you talk about weathering the storms, great resilience is what keeps this business, because there are times it gets so rough.

As the saying goes, it is not how many times you fall, it is in the ability to get up and continue going. But the most critical of my experience and the virtues in all the graces is to have the ability to make friends, keep the friends, and optimize relationships for mutual value.

That has worked for me. So many of the clients that I started with and still plan with, are those of my personal friends.

For about 30 years, almost all the friends I I've made are my clients, and we've gone, you know, beyond the business to very strong, close, personal relationships. I believe that it takes selfdiscipline, integrity, perseverance and a friendly disposition to achieve that.

What is one professional mantra you think upcoming industry professionals should hold on to?

Have a vision for yourself, for your

business. What do you want to achieve? What's your ambition? Let every waking day be a day of purpose that drives you every minute, every hour towards that vision, and stay focused.

Once you have a clear vision of what you want to be, where you want to go to, the passion to drive it and the focus to stay on track, no matter the distraction, you will get there. Be ambitious and focus on the road to achieve your ambition.

There are more and more things that are inclined to distract you, so the power of focus and consistency is so critical.

My word to young people is, keep to your vision. Keep driving it, there are challenges and anything that does not kill you will make you stronger. So stay on track and you will succeed.

Once you have a clear vision of what you want to be, where you want to go to, the passion to drive it and the focus to stay on track, no matter the distraction, you will get there. Be ambitious and focus on the road to achieve your ambition.

Finally, the economy. We are usually one of the first victims of any economic crisis. Clients typically cut their budgets. With the current economic situation in the country, the industry is experiencing this and we are having to use our expertise to educate, encourage and lead our clients in the right direction. High impact, low budget solutions.

ADVERTISING CHIEFS BLAME SECTOR'S LACK OF GROWTH ON LOW ENTRY POINT

ome practitioners in the Integrated Marketing Communications sector have averred that low barrier of entry has become a threat to growth of the marketing and advertising space in recent times.

These notable advertising icons, who cut across diverse sectors, stated this in separate interviews with MARKETING EDGE ONTV, where they called for more collaborative efforts among stakeholders to tackle the challenge.

Victor Afolabi, Founder, GDM Group and Curator of the Art of Technology Lagos, while evaluating the industry in the face of economic challenges, affirmed that the experiential industry is highly fragmented and competitive due to the fact that barrier of entry is extremely low. He explained that building barriers to entry is critical to increasing business value.

"Not until recently, it was not well organised or even recognized by the regulatory body. I think in the last few years the recognition in bringing in some standards is increasing. What we do expect is that it will evolve a bit more where you begin to see some level of innovation, and this will begin to distinguish agencies. It will be able to add some value and respect to the kind of quality of work that has been produced which has not been the case before now.

"The case before now has been an all comers' affair to a large extent, close to zero in terms of professionalism, but these things are changing. Again, it is beginning to attract a crop of people who we think should ordinarily be there. We are seeing people who, before now, were just industry people who had been in the industry. People who had worked on rigs and there were not so many intellectual powers and capacities being brought to bear, but things are evolving. We now see new entrants bringing so much dynamism challenging the status quo and that's what we think will bring the innovation we expect."

Yinka Adebayo, the Group Executive

Director of Omnicom Media Group, West and Central Africa, affirmed that with low barriers to entry, more and more people are aspiring to be identified with the industry, thereby declaring themselves practitioners, which he said fosters unprofessionalism. He then called for measures to ward off encroachment in the positioning. I'm happy about the regulation because if we fail to regulate ourselves, what will happen at the end of the day is that we will not have people who are not professionals in our industry coming to regulate us. The earlier we do the regulation, the better.

Otis Ojeikhoa, the Founder and Chief

"Unfortunately for us, the entry barrier to this sector is so low. That is the only sector that you can have somebody wake up as a medical doctor and tell you I'm practicing advertising. There should be some level of sanity. And I'm happy about the fact that the Advertising Regulatory Council of Nigeria (ARCON) is ensuring that only registered practitioners are participating, which is good. But it should get to a level where just like a doctor will not feel fulfilled until you have become a member of Nigeria Medical Association, accountants will not feel fulfilled until you become a member of ICAN. A practitioner will not feel fulfilled until you become a member of ARCON, and it is all about

Executive Officer of Brands Optimal, also attested to the low barrier to entry, stating the need to institute factors that can prevent or impede non-registered members from entering the experiential marketing sector.

"Low barrier to entry is also a big challenge, because there is the haste to deploy, to practice and that is affecting the industry. People don't wait to go through the gestation period of the learning curve, so that is beginning to diminish the quality and, of course, the relevance of the practice itself. I don't want to call it quackery, but there is also that sort of dearth of knowledge in the sector. People are not investing in knowledge acquisition, they just want to go into practice."

Ogilvy's 'Recycle Me' brings home Coca-Cola's first Cannes Lions Grand Prix in a decade

up! They did not hold back from destroying Coca-Cola's iconic red-and-white logo to get the message across. And boy, did we get the message from that eye-grabbing campaign encouraging recycling.

How excited were you to wander the Palais again this year! I can imagine the nostalgia mixed with timeless excitement sweeping through your body as you watch thousands of delegates gather from across the world, not just to bask in the French summer, but to celebrate the pinnacle of advertising and creativity shaping our daily lives.

Day one had all the expected buzz and magic. Of course, there's nothing like the initial thrill of arrival, we just got here, and we are happy you know the vibe. But hold your breath, the true spectacle is Friday's grand finale.

The first day also marked the announcement of the initial winners at the Cannes Lions International Festival of Creativity, covering Audio & Radio, Health & Wellness, Outdoor, Pharma, and Print & Publishing. The USA snagged three Grands Prix, while New Zealand, Spain, and the UK also took top honors. The UAE clinched the Lions Health and United Nations Foundation Grand Prix for Good.

In the Print & Publishing Lions category, which celebrates creativity in circulation, 734 entries competed, resulting in 21 awards: four Gold Lions, three Silver Lions, 13 Bronze Lions,



and the prestigious Grand Prix. The top honor went to 'Recycle Me' for Coca-Cola, created by WPP Open X, led by Ogilvy New York and supported and activated by Ogilvy LATAM, Ogilvy PR, and EssenceMediacom. This innovative campaign crushed the iconic red cans into distorted logos, mimicking how it would appear on a recycled aluminium can, in a bid to encourage recycling on a grand scale.

'Recycle Me,' which debuted in April 2024, rolled out on billboards, transit shelters, and digital displays across Argentina, Brazil, and Mexico, complemented by print and social media ads.

The campaign presented a stunning series of images featuring the crushed Coca-Cola logo, urging consumers to recycle.

Yup! They did not hold back from destroying Coca-Cola's iconic red-and-white logo to get the message across. And boy, did we get the message from that eye-grabbing campaign encouraging recycling. The visual impact of the distorted logos, created using mechanical presses and vacuums, reflected the diverse ways people crush their cans, offering a fresh perspective on the brand's emblem.

While Ogilvy's aim with the 'Recycle Me' call to action, prominently displayed on the cans, was to elevate recycling in the consumer's mind and encourage responsible post-consumption behavior, the campaign also supports Coca-Cola's ambitious 'World Without Waste' goals to make all packaging 100% recyclable by 2025 and to collect and recycle the equivalent of every bottle and can sold by 2030.

The campaign also earned a Cannes Lions 'Gold Lion' in the Outdoor category.

Print & Publishing Jury President John Raúl Forero, President and Chief Creative Officer at DDB, Colombia, said: "Recycle Me' is a reminder of the power of simplicity, boldness, purity, and elegance in print advertising. In a world that often seeks to dazzle with technology, this campaign stands out by vindicating the classic print. It's a Grand Prix-winning effort for a major brand that will undoubtedly be remembered for years to come."

Al market to hit \$184 billion this year

recent report by Statista revealed that the global market size in the Artificial Intelligence (AI) sector is projected to soar to US\$184.00 billion this year. Omnicom PR agencies report 1.1% revenue loss in Q1

mnicom has disclosed a 1.1% decline in PR revenue during the first quarter of 2024, marking the third consecutive quarterly setback for the group.

In Q1, the performance of Omnicom PR Group, which encompasses FleishmanHillard, Ketchum, and Porter Novelli, was weaker compared to the holding company's other divisions, which experienced revenue growth, including advertising & media (7%), precision marketing (4.3%), experiential (9.5%), and healthcare (2%). Divisions that experienced losses include execution and support (4.3%) and branding & retail commerce (3.8%).

According to its earnings report, Omnicom reported

a 5.4% worldwide revenue increase to \$3.63 billion for the entire company, with organic revenue growth of 4%.

Acquisition revenue, excluding disposition revenue, contributed to a \$53 million increase in revenue, or 1.5%, mainly due to the acquisition of Flywheel Digital by the precision marketing group. The impact of foreign currency translation decreased revenue by \$2.7 million, or 0.1%.

Comparing organic growth by region in Q1 2024 to Q1 2023: 4.3% for the United States, 3.5% for Euro Markets & Other Europe, 22.3% for Latin America, 3.0% for Asia Pacific, 3.2% for the United Kingdom, and 1.1% for Other North America. The Middle East & Africa experienced a

4.2% decline.

Chairman and CEO John Wren said in a statement, "Omnicom began the year with solid organic revenue growth of 4.0%, led by continued strength in our advertising & media and precision marketing disciplines, including Flywheel Digital. We are uniquely able to combine marketing and sales solutions with a seamless set of information signals

to turn our award-winning creativity into measurable dynamic business outcomes for our clients. Our industryleading tools and platforms, combined with the strength of our operating leadership, has led to our excellent new business performance and, when combined with the new opportunities we are pursuing, give us great confidence in the future."

In O1 2024, OMPG suffered its third consecutive guarterly loss, with revenue declining by 2.9% in Q4 2023 and 5.5% in Q3. This marked the first quarterly decline since Q1 2021.

The revenue decline in Q3 followed a stagnant Q2, which ended eight consecutive quarters of PR growth. Prior to this, there was a 5.8% increase in Q1, 12.7% in Q4 2022, 12.6% in Q3 2022, 15.8% in Q2 2022, 14% in Q1 2022, 4.4% in Q4 2021, 10.5% in Q3 2021, and 15.1% in Q2 of that year — a significant improvement from the 3.5% decline experienced in Q1 2021.

Announced as part of its 10th anniversary, the Campaign Against Living Miserably (CALM) by adam&eveDDB London took the top spot for the most impactful social or sustainable work.

The report is compiled by ACT Responsible, the international non-profit association and largest source of the world's best social and environmental campaigns, in collaboration with the WARC Rankings.

ACT Good Report is a unique ranking showcasing the world's most impactful use of creative communications to promote sustainability and social responsibility and raise awareness of significant social and environmental issues. This year marks the 10th anniversary of the report.

The ACT Good ranking is calculated by combining the performance of campaigns across various initiatives of the ACT Responsible Program (such as the ACT Exhibition, the ACT Care Awards, One Minute of Responsibility, The ACT Tributes ...), with the results of the recently published WARC Creative 100, the global benchmark for creative excellence. There are no complicated criteria or categories, just great work for Good.

A total of 1,250 campaigns produced by 804 agencies for 995 advertisers (nonprofit, public sector, and commercial brands) across 76 markets were evaluated for this latest ACT Good Report.

Of the best 40 campaigns featured in ACT Good Report 2024, 22 are for non-profits, 18 for commercial brands (including one produced in collaboration with a non-profit) and three for public sectors. A total of 37 agencies (20 are part of 15 networks and 7 are independent) across 18 markets are represented.

The best 25 agencies are made up of four independent and 21 networked agencies (from 11 different networks) covering a total of 12 markets. Of the best 20 networks, three are independent and 17 are owned by holding companies. The best ten brands include six non-profit, four for-profit.

Like every other discipline, especially experiential

marketing, a sub-sector of the marketing communications

industry has seen a steady growth, and it is not because it has to grow, it is because it is driving and adding value to the commercial sphere. In the last few decades, we have seen tremendous growth. Though there has been some sort of decline, which is expected, whenever there's any sort of economic downturn- every aspect of the economy takes a hit.

But the experiential marketing industry has seen a steady growth, and this is driven by the fact that it is able to demonstrate steady return on investment, it is able to demonstrate provable means of recruiting subscribers and consumers for brands, it is able to demonstrate measurable growth, demonstrate quantifiable sales in real time. So those are some of the fair reasons, yes, there's been a steady growth in the practice and, of course, you will see many more players when they started like, 25 years ago, it was largely dominated by foreign agencies and players. But most of those foreign players, if they are still available or present today, are in the minority and, of course, in declining numbers. So you've seen newer agencies springing up out from indigenous practitioners like Nigerians. Infact, the sector has been growing and we anticipate and forecast continuous growth for their practice as well in years to come.

I know that there have been some changing dynamics and you know the brand management system itself is evolving now, how would you say the experiential marketing space has gone through a rebirth after Covid-19 pandemic?

Covid-19 was definitely a game changer which affected ways of life, it affected everything about nature and humanity to a great degree, it affected all the industries, so to say that especially marketing practice or industry did not feel the impact or was not impacted by Covid-19 in any sort of way would be a very big lie. Everything has been impacted, however, I would not say it has revolutionized the practice, we have seen evolving discipline, evolving practice, changes in the ways that the practice uses tools to deliver results, but the changes are not revolutionary.

We have seen better application of the digital tool, to the practice of experiential marketing; we have started to see the use of augmented reality, the use of Artificial intelligence, and having virtual events. We have seen basically the use of technology and digital tools to enhance experiential marketing, so there has been that sort of evolution.

How would you view the true value proposition of experiential marketing in Nigeria?

Very good question, so this is the core essence of experiential marketing, which is to provide consumers the opportunity to fully interact with the brand in such a way that they are able to understand it. There is this great philosopher Confucius that said that if you tell me, I will forget, if you show me, I may remember but if you involve me, I will understand. Consumers by what they know and what they understand, experiential marketing practice is the only tool in the marketing connections mix that can fully deploy and ensure that the consumer understands the product that has been introduced. This is so because there is that engagement and interaction which also play a different kind of role, because to be honest with you, the respective practice have their areas of strengths where they focus mainly, but through a special practice you are able to interact, generate conversation drive leads, close deals, create awareness and product understanding not at the same degree in all of this, but it is the only practice that you can say in real time is able to drive awareness, engagement conversation and understanding

You won the awards in Kenya and also the industry awards. How does this make you feel and how does it position Brand Optimal?

So what we do here is just to get the job done, no matter what it takes, against all odds to deliver the best return on investment for our clients and the best experiences for our consumers and stakeholders. If doing all of those leads to being recognized by the industry or recognized by the stakeholders in the industry, who am I? I would say I would take it with all humility.

And I would be very grateful to the people that have recognized us. So the truth is we won about three awards in Kenya in December last year. That was a very big one because it was a Pan-African sort of awards event. And we represented Nigeria and we actually made Nigeria proud and so those sorts of feats are appreciated. They are not bad. They are good to have.

But for me, the biggest award I would get is my client sending me a note to say thank you to your team. You guys did very, very well. Like we had, we did some work at the AMVC, the cultural network at the AMVCA. And I got an SMS from a client that said, well done. You did excellently. Everybody is so proud. Well done. Thank you. I put that in the group and everybody went here celebrating. But when we win an award, we celebrate. But I don't think we would jump like that. So for the people in the practice, a job well done is the biggest award that they can ever receive. And for me, that award is very important.

But when stakeholders equally say, like your own sort of magazine, MARKETING EDGE, recognize us and say you guys, you have done well, we will take it and we will be happy. I don't run from receiving awards but I stay humble because for me, I would not go out begging for awards. But if somebody says you have done well, would I say I have not done well? I will say, yes, I've done well. Thank you very much for acknowledging. But the biggest you have done well is the thanks from the clients.

So tell our readers, what are some of the product portfolio of your company and what makes the offering stand out?

Over time, we have worked, we have had the opportunity to work across industries into various consumer segments and in different product categories. Honestly, and I don't think there is any industry where we have not registered some form of presence or experience. And I don't think there's any consumer segment or product category where we have not registered any other sort of presence or experience.

But for me, the ones that are most unique are the sort of market entry opportunities, products launches, so there's been a product launch, it was one to be launched in market, where you want to drive retail recruitment, distributors engagement, drive consumer, sampling consumer and consumer subscription drive, I love such because that is where you truly put your practice to use and the boys are differentiated from the men, so in our case, we have registered the biggest success in that sort of area where brands are those driving market entry sort of situation or product launches.

Tell us, how is Bands Optimal positioned for the future and what would you say is your unique selling proposition, how are you leveraging it?

You know what they say like, content is king, everybody knows our firm is a content creator, so l believe it is like a generative content revenue, how do you monetize the content that you create, whether you like it or not, when you go out to create, it is an experience for consumers. People are deriving pleasure from them and they are finding fulfillment. They are also creating their own sort of content out of those that you have created or the platforms and they are monetizing such content.

So for Brands Optimal of the future, it's about taking what we have and driving monetization from the content perspective so we are leveraging that. We are going into movie production; we are going to do big content creation, short films and big films. We have actually started taking our experience as far as possible. We are trying to amplify them and try to monetize and get revenues from them so we see content as the future, the one we want to make is to take content in experiential marketing and not content in skits because we don't have experience in doing skits, but we can monetize the content we create in the experiential marketing and use that to upscale.

Our esteemed readers would like to know who Otis Ojeikhoa is, so tell us your success story, how has it been for you all through your career trajectory?

I will just summarize very quickly. This morning, one of my team members came to me. He joined us mid last year. The guy came to me and said," Sir, I've been wanting to see you."

I said, okay, please come. He said," sir, can you please tell me a young man like me, what I need to do to be successful, to be influential?" So I told him, I will be honest with you. I will tell you what I think based on my own opinion and what I have seen and read.

But from what I've experienced, there are a few fundamentals that you must have or a few things that you must do to be able to be influential in whatever practice you are in or whatever you will be able to even do well as a human being. And those things are what have also helped me. The first thing I told this young man was that. you have to be passionate about what you do.

That means you must find what you are passionate about. You can't be passionate about everything. So you need to find what you are passionate about. I am passionate about creating experiential content. I am passionate about sitting down and creating ideas. I am a creative mind. I like to create things in my head and see them brought to life, so that is my passion and that is what I do today. And actually I told him, you can't buy that in the market. Nobody preaches passion. You can only find what you already have.

Number two is, you must put in the work. There is none that has been done today that was not worked on. Even God spent 7 days working to create the world, so you cannot sit down and wish for it. You have to put the desired work into it. You can work and not succeed, but if you don't put the work into it, you have already failed.

Then number three is, you have to be good to people. You must have the right attitude, because, when you go to school to learn, you get aptitude, but to get to the altitude in life, you must have the right attitude, so, how to deal with people, how to be kind, how to be patient, how to be fair, how to be forgiving, how to be humble, they are all necessary to be able to drive success. And I try to embody all of those because they are very important.

And number four, we must also learn to be grateful. Appreciate yourself for what you have as you push to get what you don't have. People don't understand how to be grateful. They are grateful to people but they are not grateful to themselves. So I have learned that ability to be grateful, to tell myself, well done boy, so you missed this one, it is a lesson. It just tells you what you shouldn't do the next time. So I try to embody all of those. I bring all of those to the practice, and I also try to ensure that the people that I lead, because I lead them, I'm their leader. I'm not a dictator, but I'm the one leading them. I'm going to help them to bring out the best in themselves. So they also try to imbibe some of those teachings that I try to embody. And I always do whenever I have the opportunity to do so. So if you ask me who I am, one word, I'm a teacher. Teacher by what I do. I have been a lecturer in the university. I have taught in the classroom. Teacher by how I see the people that work with me and how I see my children and my family. Because once you have been put in charge of people, your first assignment is to lead them.

It's to teach them. It's to groom them. It's not to abuse them. So one word that summarizes me, I'm a teacher. I love the things of God. I like to do it right. At times I make a lot of mistakes. Many times, often actually. But the default mode is to do right. That default set is to do right.

I am a family man with two beautiful children. They are in the university now. And I try to now be their friend, to be a friend to my daughter and be a mentor to my son. I was their father when they were younger up to when they were like 12, 13 years old. But now I am trying to be my daughter's friend and being a mentor to my son. Naturally, we will become friends, I mean, my son and I will become friends. But right now, he needs a mentor. I have an NGO and it is about mental health, trying to ensure that people are equipped with mechanisms that will help them achieve a healthier mental health status. What I see as most useful in their tool is how to practice mindfulness. It's not that simple, but it's very easy to practice. So if you can just even learn how to practice mindfulness, then you will be very able to manage how you respond to people when they do certain things.



We're focused on dominating the content space – Verdant Zeal boss

Dipo Adesida is the Chief Operating Officer of Verdant Zeal Group. In a recent interview with AMOS OLADELE, he spoke about the company and its operations as well as the marketing communications industry.

hat does it mean to manage a multi-disciplinary communications group like Verdant Zeal?

Verdant Zeal, multidisciplinary marketing and communications was set up 17 years ago, precisely March 1st, 2007. At the time, Verdant Zeal was set up to offer multidisciplinary marketing communications support for brands and businesses above the line through advertising, below the line through things like consumer engagement and experiences and activations, and through the line – to deepen the connection between brands and their consumers.

Over the years, we have been able to put things like these together through our corporations and subsidiary businesses. As you know, Verdant Zeal Group covers development communications, event management, branding, corporate identity design, experiential marketing and advertising, and others within that sphere, but we also have corollary businesses, specifically Red Gecko PR, which is our Public Relations unit that focuses on things like reputation building, crisis management training, media exposures, and most recently; the use of data-driven social listening tools to help clients understand what their various stakeholders and publics are really interested in and what they're saying about the brands.

For the last decade we've noticed a rise in how content has become a veritable tool in entertainment, but more specifically, the dissemination of information. Unlike the past where you had mass communication where brands send messages to passive consumers or listeners, what we have today is an active engagement where the messages are produced and how those who listen to it respond. The engagements and interactions allow for real time feedback from the messages that are sent in a particular day and time. This is why we also have an arm of business that focuses on content. And by content, I mean documentaries, short form content like skits, drama series and other forms that have general human interest.

How did your background and experience prepare you for your current tasks at Verdant Zeal?

I would split this into about 3 responses. I'd say academic preparation, work experience and other factors.

Let's start with academics. I studied dramatic arts from Obafemi Awolowo University and at the time of my graduation it looked like I was going to pursue acting, broadcasting or something that was specifically related to the arts. However, during my service year, I found advertising, and I started as a copywriter and over the year, I've functioned in several lateral roles: creative director, digital portfolio, event management, business development, content, innovation & strategy. I have also been involved in special projects such as overseeing the set up of the transit advertising arm of the business and bring the project manager for setting up a TV station on behalf of one of our clients. Other key functions include managing some of our development partners.

As Chief Operating Officer, my core functions focus on business development, account management, stakeholder management, finance, human resource, and other roles as assigned by the board of directors. All these have given me a very balanced view of what it takes to run a marketing communications business in Nigeria.

Using the Verdant Zeal example, how would you say integrated marketing communications companies are faring in the Nigeria of today? What are the good, the bad and the ugly sides?

Well, Verdant Zeal has a unique business model. We focus on understanding what the client requires before proposing solutions and I'll use an example by saying that we traditionally do not wait for briefs. What we do is to look at problem associated with industries, and then we create solutions, services or products that will fit those problems. This has always been the strength of Verdant Zeal.

Another thing that adds a lot of verve to our operations is our very young workforce. It has been like this right from the onset. Verdant Zeal has always prided itself in employing very young minds; people who are in touch with the markets and are always trying new ways of doing things. Our brainstorming sessions are usually filled with lots of insights from younger folks who are expressing different things. I mean, right now there's a lot of conversation around working with Gen. Z, but we have always been a young organization. Always focused on the next big thing; the next big wave; the way the younger demographic really think about handling things. So, it's not been surprising for us and this has also helped us in all we have been able to come up with so far.

I may not be in a position to speak for other marketing communications companies, but I can say that for us, we have seen a major shift from what

is now called traditional marketing communications, that is: TV, print, radio, outdoor, to user generated and user engaged communications. This is getting real time feedback with the use of different platforms to communicate messaging. understanding the strengths of different platforms, understanding the need to plant information in places where people will receive them at important times of the day; the importance of keywords and SEO, and recently, the importance of artificial intelligence and algorithms, because these are all the things that regulate how information and advertising or marketing content is consumed.

Consumers crave engagement. Today, people will comment, give an opinion and even test what every claims your brand is making. So, we've moved from just being mass communicators to being engagement experts. You now have to deepen the human experience because you are dealing with a majority younger demographic who believe in testing everything, experimenting and exploring; who believe in personalization as a lot of these have informed how writing is done.

Every brand now has to think deeply about its target audience. They have to think deeply about what their propositions are, and very deeply about how to communicate these messages to an audience that is very vocal, very restless; an audience that explores, and doesn't necessarily take sides just because they have been communicated with.

I think the advantage with that is as long as you can keep on having curated experiences with the emerging consumers of media; your brand will always be relevant now. The other side to it is; this is not a passive thing. It's not a time where you would schedule a campaign and then go to sleep for the next nine months, and maybe come back in 2025. You know this is about constant retooling, remapping, thinking about what's relevant and thinking about what is trendy; thinking about how to make your messages. So, it has moved from where we used to have planning cycles of three months, heavy campaigns and sustenance of couple of months to where campaigns are done tactically and consistently. Days of the year are leveraged; you are abreast of what is trending and you leverage on these conversations for your campaigns.

What were your projections for VZG coming into 2024; how far have those projections been met; and how do you see the second half of the year turning out?

We got into 2024 with a mandate to recover the lost grounds from 2023 and to also take new territories.

And of course, you know, your business has to stay ahead of internal and external seismic changes, but more importantly, cast the vision for new things. In this phase that we are, we're looking more at conquering new grounds and territories, and acquiring new competencies and skills to work more efficiently and help clients and businesses achieve their objectives. As the year goes by with each quarter and planning cycle, we review and then strategize on how to keep on meeting our obligations and projections.

How do you see professionalism in the marketing communications industry in Nigeria of today?

Every form of productivity that constitutes Nigeria's GDP requires some kind of marketing communications; that's to tell you the contribution of this industry to the economy. And in that process, there are various professional career paths to be considered: brand strategy, copywriting, graphic design, content creation, social media management, media planning & buying, finance, HR, experiential marketing, event management and so many more. SO, there's room for professional development, career enhancement & growth.

Your company has been exciting and impacting the industry with such innovations as Innovention and the Verdant Zeal Colloquium. What brought them about? And to what extent would you say they are hitting the Bull's Eye?

I'll start with the Verdant Zeal Innovention Series. The Innovention series started in 2012 and it is a public/private thought

leadership discourse that focuses building brand Nigeria. It seeks to explore inventions and innovations across the globe for local adaptation in developing various sectors of the Nigerian economy. Over the years the themes have focused on brand building, perception and positioning, content and entertainment, circular economy, artificial intelligence other areas of interest. Through the Innovention Series, Verdant Zeal taps into its vast network of critical stakeholders in public and private sector to focus on development.

The Executive Vice-Chairman of Verdant Zeal Group, Dr. Tunji Olugbodi, is the convener of the Innovention Series, and for 12 years, has committed resources to the enhancement of brand Nigeria. He believes it's his noble & patriotic contribution as a marketing communications professional, advancing the cause of Nigeria.

The Innovention Series makes us all answer some difficult questions: What is Nigeria's core value? Why can't we also have a big idea for the branding of our nation, Nigeria? At least there was a time when there used to be National campaigns for the country. Why isn't this happening anymore? We need to hit the bull's eye on issues like this. I am not saying we are not trying; there are overtures and initiatives, but we really need to do a lot more.

It is Verdant Zeal's vision, that through the Innovention Series, the public and private sector can collaborate and forge a very strong positioning for Brand Nigeria; to give the world a reason to believe, visit, live, work or invest in Nigeria. As individuals, Nigerians are great and interesting people, but as a brand, there needs to be a strong positioning & message that stands us apart. Verdant Zeal will be happy to drive this kind of initiative. And you know, again, those are some of the spinoffs of our Innovention Series.

The advent of digital technology has revolutionized the marketing communication landscape, presenting both challenges and opportunities for businesses. The disruption has also altered the understanding of the concept of marketing communications with several significant changes in how businesses interact and communicate with consumers, thereby necessitating a change in approach to the study and practice of marketing communication globally.

The new era particularly in the field of marketing communications emphasizes the importance of sustainability. This, in essence, implies business must communicate their commitment to these issues and demonstrate concrete



actions that support those values. Also, importantly, the need for relevant knowledge in this dimension has become a necessity for scholars and practitioners in marketing communication and related fields.

To this end, the Centre of Media and Communication Research (CMCR), Pan-Atlantic University, in partnership with Verdant Zeal invited scholars and professionals in Marketing Communication and related fields to a two-day event that promoted fresh understanding in the study and practice of Marketing Communication in the digital era.

Papers presented at this event will be for publication in the Journal of Creative Media (JCM) in December 2024. JCM is published by the Pan-Atlantic University Press and managed by the Centre for Media and Communication Research (CMCR).

What do you consider to be the burning issues in Nigerian marketing communications industry today?

It's how keep on connecting with the consumer. The consumer is always changing. We've had a very long streak with Gen Zs, but then you have the Gen Alphas that are coming up with a different set of values and expectations. 20 years ago, the TV was fulcrum for the typical consumer. In the last 10 years, it's been the mobile phone. What's it going to be in the next five, ten years? We're talking about immersive experiences. Look at artificial intelligence, virtual reality, and augmented reality. These are the big issues for advancing complications. As people become less and less dependent on mass messages and more focused on customized experiences, how will marketing communications connect people who are

very used to individualized experiences? These are the burning issues.

In one sentence, who is Dipo Adesida?

Dipo Adesida is a man of faith and deep conviction in God, people and country; a great storyteller, passionate Nigerian, focused marketing professional and the silkiest voice ever.

What are you passionate about?

I'm very passionate about Nigeria, great storytelling and positive values. As you can tell, the media is filled with all sorts of voices, but as brand custodians and storytellers, we have a bigger responsibility to ensure that the correct stories are told out there, especially about Nigeria. I love Nigeria so much, and Nigeria needs a lot more vocal advocates to defend its positive values and attributes.

What are your management and marketing mantras?

A leader should set the vision, inspire action and encourage initiative. I'm not big micromanagement. I like to have people focus on their own responsibilities. Set the vision and let people work their way there for marketing. Focus on the consumer and focus on solving the right problem. That's my marketing mantra; the focus on solving the right problem.

What are you looking forward to in terms of your personal brand and company's growth in the future?

For Verdant Zeal's growth, the focus really will be dominating the content space with new products and new things that will connect with audiences. For me, to stay hungry, keep learning and keep conquering new territories.

Banks recapitalization to fuel advertising boom, industry growth

groundbreaking shift has been projected in the Nigeria's advertising industry with the latest decision of the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN), mandating all banks to increase their capital reserves, a move that indicates a possible surge in advertising spend.

The Apex Bank had in a circular released on its official website late last month, directed all commercial banks with international authorization to jack up their capital base to 500 billion naira while those with national licences are required to meet 200 billion naira threshold.

The statement, which was signed by its Acting Director of Corporate Communications, Sidi Ali, also compelled banks with regional authorization to increase their capital floor to 50 billion naira while noninterest banks with national and regional authorization are expected to meet 20 billion and 10 billion naira capital base respectively.

Reacting to the development, the Managing Partner and Chief Executive Officer of MediaFuse Dentsu Nigeria, Emeke Okeke posited that, while the decision will have a crunching effect on the manufacturers, it is going to be a boom to the advertising industry.

Okeke disclosed this while speaking in an exclusive interview with MARKETING EDGE on how the advertising industry had fared in the first quarter of 2024 and the prospects it holds for its players in the second quarter.

According to him, advertisers are steadily coming back in this second quarter.

"As soon as SEC starts approving petitions for Initial Public Offers (IPO), we are going to go back to the trenches for a piece of the action as we say it. There will be initial public offers and there will be private placement. I think the worst is over . I like to remain optimistic about our market. It's going to grow and the growth is going to come out of heightened activities."

Continuing, the Dentsu Boss said: "The extended part of it is that a lot of these multinationals because they were edging against losses, have lots of inventory of naira in the market. So there is likelihood that many of them are going to approach agencies that have regional clouts in Nigeria to be able to buy across jurisdiction, and to be able to use their naira inventory in another jurisdiction. That's another massive opportunity for those who are playing at the continental level. So those are opportunities we will see in the marketplace," he stated.

Reflecting on first quarter, Okeke identified political upheavals, electioneering activities and policies that were churned out by government such as fuel subsidy removal without careful thinking, floating the naira without element of control as reasons for the high tension experienced in the first quarter. He, however, expressed confidence on how the government is rising up to the occasion by correcting some of the mistakes it made and churning out policies that have not been seen in the past.

"We can see it is already having positive effects on the local currency and invariably, bringing back confidence of advertisers and local manufacturers in the marketplace because the most crushing one was the insane free-floating of the local currency. We lost values, our lives, houses, foods and everything were devalued but thank God there is a relief and I hope it is not peace in the graveyard," he said.

CBN withdraws Heritage Bank's operating licence

n a significant move impacting Nigeria's banking landscape, the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) has taken decisive action by revoking the operating license of Heritage Bank. Effective immediately, this decision marked a pivotal moment in the banking sector and sent ripples through the financial community.

The Ag. Director of Corporate Communications at the appex bank, Hakama



Sidi Ali, said that the action was part of CBN's responsibility to enhance a stable financial system in Nigeria, and was done using the authority granted by Section 12 of the Banks and Other Financial Institutions Act (BOFIA) 2020.

Ali stated that the bank had violated Section 12 (1) of BOFIA, 2020, and noted that both the Board and Management of Heritage Bank failed to enhance their financial performance, posing a risk to financial stability.

He said, "After extensive engagement and implementation of supervisory measures by the CBN aimed at halting its decline, the bank, unfortunately, persists in its downturn with bleak prospects for recovery, necessitating the revocation of its license."

Ali expressed regret as he noted the persistent suffering of the bank, coupled with the absence of viable recovery prospects, thereby justifying the imminent necessity of license revocation.

The CBN mentioned that it acted to boost people's trust in the banking system to make sure the financial system stays strong.

Consequently, the CBN has designated the Nigeria Deposit Insurance Corporation (NDIC) as the liquidator of the bank in accordance with Section 12 (2) of BOFIA, 2020.

"We wish to assure the public that the Nigerian financial system remains on a solid footing. The action we are taking today reflects our continued commitment to take all necessary steps to ensure the safety and soundness of our financial system," the statement added.

As the news reverberated throughout the financial community, attention has now turned to the implications for Heritage Bank's customers, as well as the broader repercussions for Nigeria's banking industry as a whole.

Nigeria's crude oil plummets in May to 1.25 million bpd - OPEC

n its latest Monthly Oil Market Report (MOMR), the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) has revealed a significant decline in Nigeria's crude oil production for May 2024. The report shows that Nigeria's average daily output fell to 1.25 million barrels per day (bpd), down from 1.28 million bpd in April 2024. This drop of 30,000 bpd marks the second lowest production level for the country this year, only surpassing the 1.23 million bpd recorded in March.

Despite this downturn, Nigeria maintains its position as the largest crude oil producer in Africa, ahead of Angola and Libya. OPEC's report also highlighted that the total crude oil supply by OPEC+ members stood at 40.9 million bpd in May 2024.

Contradictory reports from within the sector suggest that Nigeria's crude oil production may have actually increased by 74,000 barrels during the same period, rising from 1.34 million bpd to 1.41 million bpd.

The report also indicated some discrepancies to ongoing complexities and challenges in accurately tracking oil production figures.



The decline in Nigeria's crude oil production comes amidst broader concerns about the stability and sustainability of oil output in the region. As OPEC and its allies continue to navigate the global oil market dynamics, Nigeria's production levels will be closely monitored in the coming months.

Akpabio assures Nigerians of selfsufficiency in fuel production

Godswill Akpabio, Nigeria's Senate President, has assured Nigerians that the country will become self-sufficient in Premium Motor Spirit (Petroleum) production in the next four weeks (July, 2024).

Commending President Bola Tinubu for having the courage to remove fuel subsidy,

Akpabio, who spoke in Calabar, the capital of Cross River State, during a one-day South-South APC conference, said he had conducted surveillance across many refineries before arriving at such conclusion.

"I went round the Dangote refinery and found out that by this July 2024, Nigeria is about to become self-sufficient in the production of PMS.

"As of today, it produces enough diesel and it's already exporting to other countries. Same with fertiliser and Urea. So we are getting to that era in the country where we produce what we consume and consume what we produce," he said.

"The economy we met was not in good shape at all, I call it a foamy economy. Despite that, the president consistently



tells me, 'I cannot complain; I campaigned and danced for this job, so I must do it and I must do it well," Akpabio stated.

NLNG's Train-7 reaches 67% completion



he Nigeria Liquefied Natural Gas Limited (NLNG) says its ongoing \$4.3 billion Train-7 project has reached 67% completion, and has employed over 9,000 Nigerians.

The plant expansion project, aimed at ramping up its production capacity to 30 million metric tons per annum (mtpa) from the current 22mtpa, has achieved a significant construction milestone of over 45 million man-hours without any Lost Time Injury (LTI), according to the natural gas giant.

Andy Odeh, the company's General Manager, External Relations and Sustainable Development, reaffirmed in a statement, NLNG's commitment to delivering economic benefits to Nigerians through the project.

The multi-billion-dollar project at Bonny Island, the

company's production location in Rivers State, was awarded to a consortium of three international Engineering, Procurement and Construction (EPC) firms, including Saipem, Chyodda and Daewoo, otherwise called the SCD consortium, led by Saipem.

NLNG said its officials, who spoke at a reconvened session of the Senate and House of Representatives Joint Committee on Gas, provided necessary information and clarifications to address issues raised by the committee.

"NLNG confirmed that the project, with a total contract sum of \$4.3 billion, has reached an overall progress of 67 per cent completion, achieving significant construction milestone of over 45 million man-hours without any Lost Time Injury (LTI).

"The project was already

delivering on one of its benefits with over 9,000 Nigerians working in the project on Bonny Island, and numerous indirect jobs and businesses emerging and booming as a result of the construction," the statement said.

The company stressed the significance of the project to the federal government's "Decade of Gas" initiative.

It emphasised that the project was aligned with Nigeria's gas development aspirations, as the outlined initiative was both timely and essential to secure the country's future, particularly as the global movement towards a net-zero future accelerated.

The liquefaction firm further expressed its respect for the National Assembly and committed to collaborate with the legislature to transform Nigeria's energy landscape.

Tesla shareholders approve Elon Musk's \$56bn compensation package



esla has announced that it's shareholders have approved CEO Elon Musk's \$56 billion compensation plan, reflecting strong endorsement of his leadership and motivation to maintain his focus on his primary source of wealth.

This approval highlights the significant backing Musk receives from Tesla's retail investors, many of whom are ardent supporters of the enigmatic billionaire. The proposal was approved despite resistance from several major institutional investors and proxy advisory firms. During the annual shareholder meeting in Austin, Texas, Elon Musk described himself as "pathologically optimistic." He said, "If I wasn't optimistic, this wouldn't exist; this factory wouldn't exist. But I do deliver in the end. That's the important thing." He that the proposals were receiving overwhelming support.

However, this approval doesn't settle the ongoing lawsuit concerning the pay package in a Delaware court. Some legal experts believe this legal battle could continue for months. In January, the judge invalidated the pay package, calling it "unfathomable.

Musk could encounter new lawsuits regarding the package, which would be the largest in U.S. corporate history. Shareholders had approved this package in 2018.

"This is not over," stated Brian Quinn, a professor at Boston College Law School. The Delaware judge will examine the vote and require Tesla to demonstrate that the process was free from coercion or improper influence by Musk, he explained.

The judge had previously criticized Tesla's board, calling it "beholden" to Musk, and noted that the plan was put forward by a conflicted board with close personal and financial ties to the top executive.

Shareholders also approved a proposal to relocate the company's legal headquarters from Delaware to Texas. They also endorsed other measures, including the re-election of two board members: Kimbal Musk, Elon Musk's brother, and James Murdoch, son of media magnate Rupert Murdoch.

Additionally, shareholders increased investor control by approving proposals to shorten board terms to one year and to reduce the voting threshold for proposals to a simple majority, despite the board's opposition to these changes.

Jeep anticipates up to 50% increase in Plug-in Hybrid SUV Sales in 2024

eep aims to increase U.S. sales of its plug-in hybrid electric vehicles (PHEVs) by up to 50% this year, leveraging the technology as an interim solution between its conventional gas-powered SUVs and future all-electric models, due to a slowerthan-anticipated pace of EV sales.

According to Jeep CEO Antonio Filosa, the Stellantis brand anticipates selling between 160,000 and 170,000 PHEVs in the U.S. this year, marking a 40% to 50% rise from last year's figures, he shared with CNBC.

Jeep aims to grow its U.S. sales of plugin hybrid electric vehicles (PHEVs) by up to 50% this year as it introduces its first all-electric SUVs in the country, starting with the Wagoneer S.

"It's the perfect time to remain adaptable, which we are," CEO Antonio Filosa stated in an interview on Thursday after unveiling the brand's new EV in New York. "One key to market growth will be offering freedom of choice."

PHEVs, which combine internal

combustion engines with electric vehicle technology, could serve as a transitional step towards fully electric vehicles, potentially speeding up consumer adoption of electrified cars.

Jeep's projected PHEV sales for this year would surpass Stellantis' total U.S. sales of PHEVs in 2023, which were around 143,000 units. This target would also exceed industry expectations for a 27.5% growth in the PHEV segment this year, according to AutoPacific, compared to the firm's 17% growth forecast for EVs.

Last year, Jeep sold 113,113 PHEVs, including 67,429 Jeep Wranglers and 45,684 Jeep Grand Cherokees. In the first quarter of this year, sales reached 31,750, a 47% increase from the same period last year, making Jeep the leader in U.S. PHEV sales.

Jeep has focused heavily on PHEVs to counterbalance the sales of its gas-powered SUVs amid stricter emissions and fuel economy regulations.

Upcoming Jeep models include the

Wagoneer S EV this fall, followed by an EV resembling the Wrangler called the Recon, and a replacement for the discontinued Cherokee midsize SUV in the first half of next year. Additionally, in 2025, the automaker will introduce new plug-in "range-extender" models for its gaspowered Wagoneer and Grand Wagoneer large SUVs.

"We have a game plan. We have a business plan, and we believe that price position and product wise, we are perfect to meet the volume we want to make," Filosa said.

Engaging media content grows audience, attracts advertisers - Hanlon & Redmond

In this interview with MARKETING EDGE, Andrew Hanlon and Ronan Redmond, former TVC Communication CEO and Commercial Director shared what media owners and professionals need to give the audience to maximize advertising profitability and growth.

ow would you describe your career adventure and sojourn in Nigeria as CEO of the leading broadcast station in Nigeria?

ANDREW: Well, nothing but fond memories. A huge amount that was achieved through partnership with the staff was a very important part. As I've explained, once we started listening to the problems and the issues that our staff had, we were able to transform the organisation. We worked together as a team, whereas before the staff and the management were totally divided. It was very, very important that we got that right. How did we do that? We did basic things like pay them on time every month and introduced a key performance indicator programme so that every member of staff was assessed every quarter. And if they hit certain markers, they would get a pay raise at the end of the year, depending on how well they scored. There weren't any smallish pay raises, but it could be anything between 3 and 10%.

But the great thing was for annual pay increases. Every year they knew if they worked well and scored highly, they would be in line for a pay increase. Then we were very transparent about promotions so that people understood that they could be promoted within the organisation. They knew they weren't going to stay at the same level. And therefore if they got promoted, they could earn even more money and take on more responsibilities. So, things like that were really important.

Another thing that we did, which was a huge contentious issue, was about different styles of management. One of the issues the staff had was that they felt there was an indiscriminate policy of sacking people, which is quite a common thing. So we introduced a policy straight off that nobody could be fired unless there was a thorough examination of the issue, of the particular member of staff. So I think in the seven years that I've been in the seat, I could count on one hand



the number of people that were sacked. And then if there were, of course, there were always going to be disciplinary issues. But the people would get a fair hearing from their management and from other members of staff and senior management. Then ultimately I would get involved as the CEO and I would make the ultimate judgement. That made the staff feel that they were very secure. Some of them did screw up. They had to go. But the number of people being forced out of the company was dramatically reduced. That again instilled trust between the management and the staff. So things like that were very, very important.

And then as you know, we had some very trying moments. We all suffered through COVID. But then we also had the fire which followed during the ENDSARS or at the end of the ENDSARS issue. So when our business was burned to the ground, our beautiful facilities that we had invested so much money in, we were able to get back on the air within three days. When everybody, including all of our competitors had us written off, the industry said, that's the end of TVC. But because of the relationship that we had built, and the trust we built with the staff, they came to our rescue. They all came in, and within three days they got us back on the air. So that's how that partnership paid off. And it just goes to show you that if there is a trust between management and staff, and if there is goodwill between them, and if you look after your staff, your staff will look after your company.

What really inspired you to come to Nigeria?

ANDREW: Well I've worked in broadcasting all my life as a young reporter, journalist, news anchor, all of those things. So I worked at the coalface for years. And then I worked in management for many years as well, in broadcasting. So when I got a call from a recruiter in London, and they said, we've got this job opportunity down in Africa. And I said, oh where? And they said Nigeria. I laughed because I said there's no way I'd be going to Nigeria. That's one of the most unsafe countries in the world. You've got to be kidding. I put the phone down and I thought about it driving home that night.

I said I should talk to them about this. I rang them back the next day and said, tell me about it. And over a period of six months, there were a lot of interviews and discussions. I came in, I visited the board, I made a presentation to the board. As soon as I got here, I realized very quickly that this was a very hospitable place, and that my perceptions of Nigeria were wrong, even though I know the country had a lot of problems. But the biggest selling point to me was the strength of the people. Nigerians are very like the Irish; very open, warm and kind people. And that to me was the biggest selling point of all.

Then as far as the business was concerned it was in a bad place, but I knew that the board had the determination and will to invest in the company and for us to bring it to the level that they wanted it at. So I knew from the outset that they were prepared and ready to invest. For me, it was a huge challenge to do that. And I said, this is a challenge that I don't want to turn down.

What really gave you that courage and boldness to face the task given the challenges on ground?

ANDREW: I believed that we had the capacity and the capability to turn on TVC Communications. It wasn't TVC Communications as at that time. It was Continental Broadcasting. At that point, I knew the first challenge that we had was to clean up our commercial division.

Ronan read about me coming down here. He called me and said, look, if you're looking for somebody to come and take a look at the commercial side of the business, I'll come down and take a look. And I said, fantastic, because we'd worked together in TV and radio back in Ireland. So Ronan came down. I asked him to give me a report within three weeks. He gave me the report and it wasn't pretty. And he and I spoke about it. We knew what we had to do. He said, look, my family is on the continent. If you're interested, I'll come in here with you and help you do this. So this man was an integral part of the turnaround of the company. He was invaluable.

We worked together as a team and we achieved a lot. But I couldn't have done it without him because I know if I'd have had to find somebody else from commercial broadcasting, it would have been very difficult, if not impossible, with the same skill set and experience. So I was blessed that he was available and that he wanted to come down and do it.

Upon your arrival, how did you see the Nigerian media market, particularly the broadcast sector, and the challenges as well as the opportunities?

ANDREW: Well, it was quite clear very early on that whilst there were a lot of broadcasting companies, television broadcasters, radio broadcasters, upon closer inspection, there was actually only a handful of them that were performing in any reasonable way that we would want to be aligned with. I think when we started, Radio Continental was our radio station at the time. Lagos, I think, was a 35 station market. There are now 57 stations in Lagos, which is an incredible number. But again, there's only two stations in the market and there's only one group besides ourselves that is profitable in radio. Whilst there are many, many broadcasters, and you can say the same for television stations. Channels is an excellent business. Ourselves, one or two others may be making some money, but a lot of other broadcasters are just not generating enough revenue, aren't commercially focused enough, and they are funded by their shareholders on an ongoing basis. We didn't want that. We had to stand on our own two feet and get out there and sell.

To a very large extent in your period of stay, you've been able to minimise, if not reduce, the ownership influence on the editorial policy and direction of the media group. How were you able to achieve this?

ANDREW: It's a very simple one to answer. With my hand on my heart, I never suffered one bit of editorial interference, and the board was absolute from day one. You're an editorial man, Andrew, you understand the business. We're handing this over to you. Do what you need to do and just run it as a professional company. We do not want any accusations or claims of bias one way or the other and I said well that's if we all understand each other, that's how I'm going to proceed and that's it.

RONAN: That's what the agencies want, and then your customers and others say, okay, we have to be there, we have to advertise with these guys. They know what they're doing and they've got big audiences.

In the seven years that you've been here, what would you say is your biggest achievement till

now?

ANDREW: Well, it's what I said earlier. It was bringing the staff along with us. If we'd have continued the style of management that existed before, the staff would have run a mile from us. They would just come in, do their job, probably not very well, and go home. But because we built a relationship with them, and we trusted them, and it was mutual trust and respect, that changed everything. Because the staff then felt invested in the business, and they became proud of the business, and they, as you guys say over here, felt they had power and bragging rights. They wanted to tell people they worked for TVC Communications.

What were the strategies you put in place to achieve commercial turnaround and growth for the TVC Group?

RONAN: Well, it comes from what Andrew said. The commercial model is very, very simple. First and foremost, you focus on your audience. You've got to give the audience what they're looking for, and they're looking for engaging content. When you give them engaging content, you'll find that they will engage with you, and the audience will grow. Once you can demonstrate that you're growing your audience, then you have a strong proposition to give to the advertisers. But that's only the first part of the story. When you're talking to the advertisers and the agencies, especially in a recessionary market, they all need value. An agency needs to be able to demonstrate to its client that it can find them value within a recessionary market. That was one thing that we didn't do prior to our arrival in TVC. That skill set wasn't there - to be empathetic with the advertisers, to understand that they had a job to do as well - to try and reach agreements and deals and partnerships that were win-win for both parties.

When we got there, Andrew and I, as Andrew said, went to all the advertisers. We tried to understand what they were trying to achieve, the challenges their business had, and then we tried to reach win-win partnerships with them. They wanted more than spot advertising. They wanted product placement. They wanted branded content opportunities and activation. Over a period of time, we grew the audience and were able to offer them more robust content and cross-platform solutions. And as Andrew and I often joke, we built it, and eventually they came.

Coming from a different



background into the African market, what would you say was the greatest challenge in breaking into the market?

RONAN: For me, because I have been coming to the continent since 2005, I understand and like Africa. But business is business, no matter where in the world you are. The media market is fragmented and within that there's an opportunity to build a company that can offer an engaged mass audience. That's where we saw the opportunity.

The cultural differences were more within the company. I think what Andrew and I saw, in particular, was that we had a huge young workforce. I think what Andrew did was certainly feeling that it was our responsibility to create the environment that would enable us to do business and allow the workforce to be the most productive. In particular, we allowed the young people to have a voice, whereas prior to our arrival, they didn't. And by that I mean some of the best business solutions that we have created have come from the young people being given a voice and saying, should we not do it this way? And when we listen to what they say, we look at the research and say, in actual fact, they're right.

I think our experience from abroad allowed us to come in. We didn't try to bring a European perspective to Nigeria. We tried to bring our media experience, because Andrew and I have travelled a long road in the media business, and we tried to ally that experience with the best talent that we had on the ground.

Seven years down the line, how would you say you have positioned the group, the corporate brand in the market and in the minds of stakeholders?

RONAN: Our objective was to create one of Nigeria's leading media broadcasters, commercial media broadcasters. I think we have done that regardless of the scale and breadth of competition out there. Whether you talk about the media agencies or on our side in terms of broadcast. If you want entertainment, you go to DStv. If you want news, you go to Channels, Arise or TVC Communications. If you want radio you go to Wazobia or you go to Max FM. That is it in a nutshell because, certainly under Andrew's guidance at TVC communications, everything we make gets invested back into the business to make it better, so that we can keep offering better content to the audiences and more value to the advertisers.

What we have done is to position TVC communications to be one of those very few leading broadcasters in Nigeria that can stand on its own two feet and hold its own fire when juxtaposed with all the international media outlets that operate in this market as well.

ANDREW: We wanted the company to be a mass-market media company. The audience growth went from 5.3 million audience a day to 22.6 million audience a day, so that firmly put us into the mass media camp. You don't need to have a set-up box in your house with access to the internet to watch us or to listen to us. So free-to-air media in Africa throughout the continent I believe is going to be here for another 20 or 30 years because people just can't afford data. They can afford a very small amount of it, but they can't afford huge chunks of it because incomes are quite low and you've got better things to be spending your money on, like food and shelter and putting your kids to school. Unlike the rest of the Western world, it's all about subscribers.

For as long as people want free-to-air media advertisers will buy it from you because you're mass media. So we achieved what we set out to do.

If you look at the Nigerian Media market, oftentimes, the privately owned establishment tends to be more successful than the public owned institution, what would you say is responsible?

ANDREW: You've got to bring in enough revenue to pay the bills, to pay everybody, and with a bit of luck make a profit. Public broadcasters all over the world, not just Nigeria, have a different mindset. They're subsidised, they're paid for by the central government, a lot of them, or by taxpayers. And that's a completely different environment. That breeds a different type of culture, the commercial broadcast culture, which Ronan and I have worked in all our lives. It's a very different results.

What would you want to say about the partners that you formed to achieve your objective and goals?

RONAN: In the last couple of weeks, we've been saying goodbye and I have gone around with Andrew to meet all of our big clients. They're not clients anymore, they're actually friends. Andrew and I came from a marketplace in Ireland that had been through a recession. We understood how commercial broadcasters need to operate through recessions. That's giving value to your partners who themselves are suffering in the recession. We brought that philosophy into this marketplace.

What would you say are your most memorable contributions to the growth and development of the Nigerian media market within the period you have been an active participant?

RONAN: As the commercial director of TVC, first and foremost, my responsibility was to TVC. But again, in a recessionary marketplace, you've got to look beyond your own company. You've

got to look at the sector and you've got to try and understand why the sector is suffering.

It happens everywhere in the world, we're in the advertising communications business, but we're very poor communicators. So we don't tell enough stories of what advertising can do and the benefits it can bring return of investments to advertisers. One of the jobs I thought we could do was telling the advertisers the value they can get from the advertising and the media sector.

ANDREW: I think trust with clients is what Ronan and the team had to build up, and once trust was established then you have a partnership with your clients. But it took several years to do that because it's about, as he said, delivering on the campaigns you promised and not lying to people, not telling people a false narrative, not trying to tell them something that you can't actually deliver. And that's one of the hallmarks of how Ronan operates. Don't over promise, and he and I would both subscribe to that. Over deliver and then show people that you can really produce the results for them, that leads to trust and partnership and a great relationship between both parties.

During the ENDSARS, how did you feel seeing yourself at the helm with that kind of unexpected calamity befalling an institution in which you are highly devoted and dedicated to?

ANDREW: I was frightened, I was watching it on TV down at the Toll Plaza, just like everybody else. But first and foremost, our thoughts were for our staff. Thankfully none of our staff died or were badly injured in that attack. My immediate thoughts were for the staff and then how we get our business back up and running very, very quickly. it goes back to what I said then earlier; having the relationship and the trust with our staff is what got us back on the air within three days. There wasn't time to be in a state of shock for any long period of time. We just had to get back on the air. We had to make sure we salvaged what we could for the business and the funny thing is that despite ENDSARS and COVID we still managed to grow the business in terms of revenue and audience that year. It was quite something we never expected but we kept selling until we got back on the air. Our content was still good but it was compromised.

To some extent because our facilities had been damaged so we were operating at a subper level but our numbers continued to rise because we had partnerships with our advertisers and our viewers and our listeners were fans and we had their loyalty and they stayed with us.

RONAN: Just to follow on that, we had a lot of credit in the bank from our advertisers post COVID and ENDSARS happened after COVID. Because during COVID, when again, there was a lockdown and people stopped, you know, consumers couldn't go around. They weren't purchasing. Advertisers couldn't get their messages out there because people weren't purchasing. We changed our strategy over March and April during COVID, whereby we reached out to each of our corporate partners who themselves were engaging in huge CSR campaigns, if you remember. Because the world was suffering, Nigeria was suffering, so the likes of the Airtels, the MTNs, the Dangotes, were all doing great work around CSR.



I have positioned Eat 'N'GO to be Africa's largest QSR company, says McMichael

From being just a very small company of 63 stores in 2018, today, Eat N'GO, a leading Quick Service Restaurant has grown to become a market leader with 175 stores in twenty states of the Nigerian federation. This is no mean feat, especially against the backdrop of different economic headwinds. However, the sailor behind the ship Mr. Patrick McMichael out -going Chief Executive Officer of the topmost QSR company has completed his tour of duty and on his way out of the Country. In a no-hold-barred interactive chat with MARKETING EDGE

team, the iconic leader and astute manager of men and resources, Mr. Patrick McMichael disclosed to MARKETING EDGE team that he has successfully built and positioned Eat N'GO to become Africa's largest QSR. He spoke glowingly about team Eat'N'GO, huge opportunities in the Nigerian market and all the exciting moments working in Nigeria. He also advised other prospective investors in Nigeria to take the bull by the horn as the future of the Nigerian market is bright and beautiful. He spoke on several other issues as well. Excerpts:

ow will you assess the Nigerian economy in terms of opportunities and potentials for growth?

The Nigerian economy: The Nigerian economy offers so much opportunity. Nigeria has a big population that is very young. As the country continues to develop these opportunities will only become bigger opportunities with more and more customers. The opportunities within Nigeria were the main reason that I accepted the role of CEO for Eat'n'Go in 2018. When I joined the company had 63 stores. My team and I have built the company up to 175 stores in Nigeria in 20 states through some very challenging times. Imagine where we could have built to with stability globally and locally. My view is that we have at least 200 more stores to develop in Nigeria. As the new policies of the current government settle in I believe stability will improve and opportunities will accelerate. There are exciting times ahead for Nigeria. Big infrastructure falling into place that will certainly help.

Would you say Nigeria offers any hope for foreign investors?

Foreign Investors: I believe that foreign investors need to have a long-term view on investing into developing countries. There are great opportunities that require patient capital structures. There have been many companies that have left Nigeria recently. I expect that they will return in the years to come as the opportunity of Nigeria has not gone away. Many companies had the wrong supply chain or capital structure to handle the shock of the last five years globally and domestically. There is a huge developing customer base in Nigeria. As the national power grid becomes solid and fuel is refined locally things will change. The more that Nigeria can reduce imports and become a producer, more companies will want to be in business in Nigeria. This will then lead to Nigeria becoming a multiindustry exporter to the world.

What was your first impression about the country Nigeria when you came almost 10 years ago?

My first impressions: Despite so many people arguing that Nigeria has not developed over the last decade, I would disagree with this. I recall when I first arrived in Nigeria driving on the dirt road from the airport to the office on Victoria Island. I saw buildings cut in half etc That road is now a proper freeway. The third mainland bridge is now impressive. I remember running the Lagos marathon across that bridge. It was in bad shape. The new international airports are open, several big rail projects have been completed. I always judge development by how many cranes I can see across the city skyline. Despite the recent economic challenges that have faced Nigeria, there are quite a few cranes for new buildings coming up. My first impressions were that this is a developing country, and it is going



to take time. Having worked in Indonesia as CEO of Domino's Pizza, I was already well conditioned to developing countries. I actually felt quite at home when I arrived in Nigeria. Everyone spoke English which was very different to Indonesia. Secondly Nigeria has a great vibe. The people were all very welcoming everywhere that I went. I will miss this a lot when I leave.

Were you apprehensive or anxious about anything when you first heard you would be posted to Nigeria? If Yes, how did you resolve this?

Working in Nigeria as an expat: I get this question all the time here in Nigeria when I am overseas. Working in any country you have to take time to understand the country and culture of your host country. You then need to respect the culture and the people of the country. I have found that a simple smile and a "hello" is a great ice breaker in whatever situation I am in. I had a sign up in my office that I feel is critical to understand. It read very simply; " I don't care about your job title, how much money you have or your social status. I only care about how you treat people" As an expat in a developing country you often live a life of privilege that demands that you be courteous and have manners. Beyond this basic rule, I have had a very enjoyable life as an expat in Nigeria. I have made a lot of friends that are a mixture of expats and Nigerians. I was lucky enough to meet my partner Ania here in Lagos. We have an amazing life here for five years now. I have found the local population to be so welcoming. I have had some awkward moments for sure, however I have managed to break them down with a smile. I hope that that is something that I am remembered for in Nigeria.

How will you assess the state of Eat'n'Go which you were to head when you came? How will you assess the growth and development of this company in this past one decade?

Eat'n'Go: As I previously stated Eat'n'Go was a much smaller company when I arrived. It has 63 stores between Lagos, Abuja and Ibadan. There were 4 commissaries to support the business and a small warehouse. During my time with Eat'n'Go, my team I were able to build the company up to 193 stores in two countries with the acquisition of the Dominos and Cold Stone franchises in Kenya during

the pandemic. We have expanded from 4 commissaries to 11 commissaries and relocated to a much larger warehouse to create a proper national distribution centre to support the company's operation in 20 states of Nigeria. We created employment opportunities for over 3000 people in Nigeria. This does not count the employment that was created in companies that supported the growth of Eat'n'Go. The ripple effect of the success of Eat'n'Go has further benefited the Nigerian economy. As the company was growing quickly, we further developed the operating systems of the company to support the growth through strong operations. The Eat'n'Go of today is a much bigger and more complex business than it was in 2018 when I arrived. I am very proud that we have grown our sales every year during my tenure. We have maintained our margins despite strong headwinds in the economy. We were able to raise funds through bonds to drive our expansion on three occasions maintaining an investment grade rating at all times. It is a credit to the hard work of the entire Eat'n'Go team.

You were said to have brought several innovations and creativity to grow this business during your term of office. What inspired you to achieve these?

Innovation: Innovation has been a key pillar in the success of Eat'n'Go. The management team has been very focussed on ensuring that we remain at the forefront of customers thoughts during my time with Eat'n'Go. We have continued to innovate with new products. We quite often infused local flavour into the new products which has been very popular. We launched the very popular jollof rice and roasted chicken to the Dominos menu. Rice is served in many Dominos markets around the world. We introduced hot dogs into Cold Stone to get more lunch trade. We launched the very successful Smallie pizza which took the market by storm as it was very affordable for the general population. We were able to introduce a call centre to help our customers order from better trained agents. This has worked really well. It also allows us to call our customers back to get feedback on our products and service. We introduced QR code customer feedback options. We win customers one at a time and we have to do everything we can to keep our customers happy. We further partnered with aggregators to be more convenient to our customers. I have a big sign on the wall of the marketing office. It is very simple, "Think like a customer". So many companies forget to do this. They tell customers what they want and how they will buy it. My view is just the opposite. Listen to customers and create options that work for customers. Innovate in ways that work for your customers and make your company faster and better. Dominos Pizza Nigeria was the first market globally to launch the 20-minute delivery guarantee for customers. This really brought a lot of focus in the stores to making sure that we provided the best possible service.

How will you describe or assess the workforce you met on ground? And how will you assess the workforce and the management you are leaving behind as legacy?

Team: I have been blessed to have worked with some excellent team members in Eat'n'Go at all levels of the company. One of the first things that we agreed on in 2018 was that whenever possible we will promote from within. This has created a career path for our team to grow as the company grows. It has been very successful. It is great to watch your team enjoy career success as the company has success. This is so critical in building positive culture in any company. There is a lot of talented and well-educated people in Nigeria that are looking for the right opportunity. When I arrived in Nigeria, we employed 14 expats in Eat'n'Go. As of today, with my departure we have only four. We were described as a textbook case study in developing local talent in the resent senate inquiry into expat employment in Nigeria. I am very proud of the focus that we have had on developing our team.

What were the most memorable things you did while you were in the saddle?

Most memorable: I have really enjoyed working with the Eat'n'Go team for so many reasons, however if I have to narrow down to my most memorable activity, it will have to be our involvement with the Slum to School charity. I believe that when you are succeeding in business that you must give back to those less fortunate. Over the last six years Eat'n'Go has donated over 80 million Naira to support thousands of Children to
